### The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

As we approach Holy Week each year, we are challenged with all the events of that traumatic week in Jesus' Life - Palm Sunday, betrayal, denial, the Last Supper and Good Friday.

We can only imagine how the two travellers on the

road to Emmaus felt knowing that Jesus had died. Gone were their hopes for a bright future. They thought that God had let them down. In their grief, the risen Jesus came alongside them and spoke with them at length, but somehow they did not recognise Him. Why was this, and why did Jesus intend to leave them at Emmaus without first revealing who He was? The answers may be found by looking back at the encounters Jesus had with people. He never forced His true nature onto anyone. Every individual had to make up their own mind as to who He was, and to decide if the things He said were true. Today, Jesus does not 'gate-crash' into our lives. In a number of ways He gently and persuasively reveals Himself. So, the story of the walk to Emmaus should encourage us each time we feel His absence; at those times when we thought He would step in and immediately solve our problems! On our journey of life, we can have times of sadness and it can seem as though God is far away, but while we are thinking that Jesus has left us alone, He is actually with us. He knows where we are and what we are feeling. He can quietly draw alongside us. Surprisingly, it can sometimes be in situations of sadness and solitude that Jesus 'speaks' to us more clearly.

We do not have to go off in search of some 'religious experience' or to a special 'holy place'. He is present in the here and now. Jesus is the unseen companion on every journey and the unseen guest at every meal. In His way and in His time, our Lord reveals Himself to us in different situations. We may not be aware of His presence in surprising circumstances and on un-expected occasions.

Jesus was on the road with the two disciples, without any recognition on their part. He is also with us even when we fail to realise it and that is what faith is all about, trusting that God will keep his promise to never leave us or forsake us. The Easter Resurrection conquers hopelessness. It gives you hope, purpose and meaning. It gives you a reason to live. So do not settle for another nice little Easter – accept the challenge. If you are a regular attender at church that is a good start, however if you are irregular or have not been for a while pick up that challenge and join a vibrant band of worshippers in the Cathedral on a Sunday morning. Experience a new beginning this Easter – experience the life, hope, and faith that Christ brings – experience the Lord's presence as He walks with you along the pathway of life.

As a parish together we need to help each other on that road. That is the task and calling for each Christian, to help each other along that road, to work, to love and to serve the Lord – and all together because we are the one body! This year we celebrate 400 years of Parish life and look forward to many more years, however we need to keep our 'shoulder to the wheel' – keep all moving! There is no time for spectators, all are needed as a team on the playing field - to work and to witness for Him in this great Cathedral Parish dedicated to Saint Macartin, St Patrick's strong man and let us remain strong and resolute in our efforts.

May the Lord bless you with courage and peace so that you may have an Easter filled with joy and hope.

#### Presentation to Water Drops



A presentation of £6,000 was made to Ronnie & Maggie Briggs who run the Water Drops Project in the Diocese of Kajiado in Kenya. This was one third of the Dean of Clogher's 'Sit out' at St Macartin's Cathedral, Enniskillen, prior to Christmas, that realised over £18,000.

The money will go towards providing clean water for a forgotten people in a very remote place. Water Drops works alongside the Bishop of Kajiado, the Rt Rev Gaddiel Lenni, to identify those communities that are struggling to find access to clean water.





The Coronation of King Charles III is a historic moment in the life of our nation. His Majesty King Charles III will be crowned alongside The Queen Consort at the Ceremony, which will take place at Westminster Abbey on Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> May. The service which will be conducted by The Archbishop of Canterbury, will be the centrepiece of the Coronation weekend (6-8<sup>th</sup> May). It will be a service rooted in Christian symbolism, reflecting the King's role today whilst looking to the future. Building on themes of community, faith and service, the Coronation weekend will be a celebratory moment, a chance for people to come together and for churches to share an invitational message about the Christian faith.

At St Macartin's Cathedral we will have a special service to mark the Coronation at 11.00am on Sunday 7th May and the special preacher will be the Bishop of Clogher. This will be followed by a Sunday Lunch in the Cathedral Hall. Please fill in the enclosed leaflet to book your place. The cost for parishioners will be £20.00 per person and children under 12, £7.50. Early booking is essential as there will be a limit to the numbers that can be catered for.

### **Quadricentennial Year**

The current Church of Ireland parish of Enniskillen is much smaller now than in former times. The parish originally had its base in a monastery (dating from the sixth century) on Inishkeen Island, which is located a short dis-



tance upstream from Enniskillen in the River Erne. The parish boundary at that time extended to the border of County Tyrone, near the village of Clabby. In 1622, the Rev James Slacke was the incumbent of Inishkeen, which was stated to be ruinous and that a new church was to be built in Enniskillen. The church in Enniskillen, St Anne's, then replaced Inishkeen as the main church in the parish. The country part of the parish at that time was served by a chapel at Pubble, near Tempo. In the late eighteenth and nineteenth century, churches were built in Tempo (to replace Pubble Chapel), Garvary and Clabby, each with its own parish boundary. As a consequence, the current Enniskillen parish extends little beyond the town boundary.

#### A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE CATHEDRAL

The first church was built during the 1620s with the tower being completed in 1637. This date, together with the Agnus Dei (Lamb of God), is carved on a stone over the doorway of the south porch. After undergoing extension in the early nineteenth century, the then Saint Anne's Parish Church was reconsecrated in 1842. The church was later dedicated as Saint Macartin's Cathedral in 1923, as the second cathedral in the Diocese of Clogher. While little of the original church building remains, part of its tower was in-

entrance door, where there is a small three-light lattice window and a stone with the date 1637. By the beginning of the nineteenth century, a larger building was needed to accommodate the growing number of parishioners. In 1832, the spire was deemed to be unsafe, and the opportunity was taken to rebuild it completely. That work was finished in 1842. The chancel was enlarged in 1889. In 1970, the north aisle was converted into a Regimental Chapel of the Inniskilling Regiments.

The Cathedral was refurbished in 1995. The church building was closed from 31<sup>st</sup> December of that year to facilitate this project. Services were planned to resume on Saint Patrick's Day in 1996, but – in the early hours of 5<sup>th</sup> March – a fire was discovered in the then almost completely redecorated building. While fire damage was contained to a relatively small area of both the gallery and the rear of the Regimental Chapel below it, there was extensive damage from both water and smoke. After undergoing considerable restoration work, the Cathedral was finally reopened for public worship on 25<sup>th</sup> September 1997.

To facilitate the worship of God's people in future generations, the Select Vestry recognised the need for extensive redecoration and refurbishment in 2019. Since then, the Cathedral has undergone major restoration work, costing in excess of £550,000. The work involved re-roofing, the repair of stonework, internal redecoration, a rebuild of the organ, and enhancement of the Cathedral precincts. The generous financial support of the parishioners, members of the community, and local businesses, together with grants from The National Churches Trust and AllChurches Trust, enabled this major project to be undertaken.


Today, the Feast Day of Saint Macartin, we pray that this Cathedral dedicated to his name, may continue to be a place where the people of this Parish, Diocese, and wider community can encounter the living God, enter into worship, and find a sense of belonging.

### **Quadricentennial Cathedral Prayer**

Almighty God, you have made us members of Christ and of his Church here in this Cathedral Parish of Enniskillen. We thank you for 400 years of rich heritage handed down to us from former generations, and we pray that we can hand that on to the generations to come. May we as a congregation reach upwards to your throne in worship and adoration; inwards to one another in understanding and fellowship; and outwards to the world in evangelism and social compassion. Make this Cathedral Parish like a city set on a hill whose light cannot be hidden, so that men and women may find Christ as the light of the world, and his Church as the family of the redeemed, and eternal life as the gift of God, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

## The Graveyard Wall

Work has progressed well with facing in natural stone the unsightly section of concrete block walling on top of the original graveyard boundary wall. This wall, in all probability, has been in existence from the time the church was built. The wall enclosed the graveyard and separated it from the site of the Enniskillen Royal School in Schoolhouse Lane, now Market Street, before the School moved to the site on Portora Hill.



The work on the wall has been undertaken by Mr Ryan Milligan from Kesh who is a specialist in stonework.

Mr Ryan Milligan is pictured below at work on the wall.

The new stonework is impressive and enhances the appearance of that part of the Cathedral estate in which the Garden of Remembrance, for the burial of ashes, and the UDR memorial are located.

Mr Milligan, at his own expense, has built a stone incorporating a red poppy image into the wall adjacent to the UDR memorial.

When the new stonework has been added and nicely pointed it shows up the old wall which badly needs re-pointing. The Select Vestry has decided that the old section of wall associated with the new stonework should be re-pointed.

wall as a whole but would secure its structure into the future.

When the old section of wall is being re-pointed the opportunity will be

taken to replace stones which have become dislodged over the centuries. The contract for the original stonework and wall stabilisation amounted to  $\pounds7,880$ . The additional repointing will cost a further  $\pounds4,000$ . The Select Vestry considers that the total cost represents good value for money and is a good investment. Contributions to help meeting the costs involved would be most welcome.


### Sunday Lights


