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The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

Easter means different things to different people. For some it is about bunnies and eggs – completely secular. For others, it is about family get-togethers. To a few, it's just another day – completely atheistic and God is not involved. However to many it is much more than those things. For the Christian Easter is not just a day, it is a season that lasts until Pentecost, and in fact we should remain 'Easter People', who should continually live with the message of Easter in our lives!

We live in an uncertain world where people cause pain and suffering through words and actions and where people are divided because of difference. That is not the Christian way of life. That offers no hope. Without hope we lose our will to live. Without hope we lose purpose and meaning. Without hope we lose our enthusiasm, our joy, our peace. However the good news is that the resurrection of Christ gives us a fresh hope.

We can only imagine how the two travellers to Emmaus felt knowing that Jesus had died. Gone were their hopes for a bright future. They thought God had let them down. They had suffered a cruel blow and were bewildered and upset. In their grief, the risen Jesus came alongside them and spoke with them at length but somehow they did not recognise Him. Why was this, and why did Jesus intend to leave them at Emmaus without first revealing who He was? The answers may be found by looking back at the encounters Jesus had with people.




He never forced His true nature onto anyone. Every individual had to make up their own mind as to who He was, and to decide if the things He said were true.

Today, Jesus does not 'gate-crash' into our lives. In a number of ways He gently and persuasively reveals Himself. So, the story of the walk to Emmaus should encourage us each time we feel His absence; at those times when we thought He would step in and immediately solve our problems! On our journey of life, we can have times of sadness and it can seem as though God is far away, but while we are thinking that Jesus has left us alone, He is actually with us. He knows where we are and what we are feeling. He can quietly draw alongside us. Surprisingly, it can sometimes be in situations of sadness and solitude that Jesus 'speaks' to us more clearly.

We do not have to go off in search of some 'religious experience' or to a special 'holy place'. He is present in the here and now. Jesus is the unseen companion on every journey and the unseen guest at every meal. In His way and in His time, our Lord reveals Himself to us in different situations. We may be aware of His presence in surprising circumstances and on unexpected occasions. How important it is that we stay alert. There will be times when we will be like those two men on the Emmaus Road, searching for answers. We will earnestly desire clear and direct answers to our questions and the knowledge, understanding or revelation may be slow to come, but with Jesus, there are many lessons to be learned along our 'Emmaus Road' than would have been discovered any other way. May God bless you and may you experience His presence in your life this coming Holy Week and Easter Season.

Know your Cathedral

Statues in the chancel

The two fine white marble statues in the chancel of the cathedral attract a lot of attention. They were erected as memorials to two brothers who were the great, great, great, great grandsons of Captain William Cole, the founder of the town of Enniskillen and who built the first church on the cathedral site. On the south wall of the chancel, stands the statue of John Willoughby Cole, the 2nd Earl of Enniskillen, who was born in 1768 and died in 1840. The statue of the Earl shows him in his robes, with star and ribbon, as a Knight of St Patrick.

He was a strong supporter of the Orange Order after its foundation in 1795. He served as a member of the Irish Parliament from 1790 to 1801. He



opposed the Act of Union in 1801 which abolished the Irish Parliament and which led to the creation of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland. In 1793 the Militia Act was passed which, for the first time, entrusted the defence of Ireland to its own people. John Cole led the formation of the Fermanagh Militia and was its Lieutenant Colonel Commandant. From 1803 he served as an Irish Peer in the House of Lords and in 1815 he became a United Kingdom Peer.

Know your Cathedral

The General



On the opposite side of the chancel is the statue of General Sir Galbraith Lowry Cole (1772-1842), who was a distinguished soldier, politician and colonial governor. As well as the statue in the cathedral, the impressive Cole's monument on Forthill is another tribute to his distinguished military service.

The General served during the Peninsular War as one of the Duke of Wellington's senior commanders. He commanded a Division in seven major battles, and was wounded twice when a musket ball penetrated his upper chest. He missed the Battle of Waterloo in 1815 as he was on his honeymoon. From 1823 to 1828, Lowry Cole was governor of Mauritius and then served as governor of the Cape of Good Hope until 1833. He subsequently died in England, aged 70.

Like his brother, he was laid to rest in the family vault

under the cathedral. When his cortege arrived at Enniskillen church, his body was preceded into the church by The Hon and Rev J.C. Maude, rector, and the Rev R.R. Cleary, curate, where the funeral took place. After the service the cortege proceeded to the entrance of the family vault where three volleys were fired. It was claimed that he ranked among the bravest in military annals.

Psalm 12

It was about 30 years ago, perhaps a little more; it was a fine summer's day: dry and bright, but cool. I don't remember the date, but I'll never forget the events of that day. Suddenly, with no warning, and in a way that I could do nothing about, my life was plunged into crisis. In an unpleasantly immediate way every earthly certainty, but one, slipped from me.

I had fallen over the side of a boat, far out into the Irish Sea. Even in June the deep Irish Sea is bone chilling and, as a child who couldn't swim very well, I was overcome with panic. As I fell from boat to water time slowed down for me; my short life didn't flash before me, but I did have time to wonder why I wasn't screaming as I was sure someone in a movie would do in those circumstances. By the time I hit the water I had somersaulted to fall head first, and I still remember the solid utter blackness that enveloped me.

As I rose again to the surface I looked up and saw the boat I had just left, sailing, impossibly high above me, and moving onwards, at an alarming pace. I was unable to catch up with the boat. I was stuck if you like, between the horror of the situation around me, and my imagined wonder at getting onto the boat.

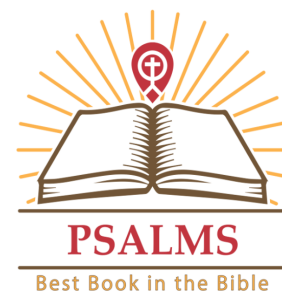
Maybe the church lives in a similar situation: like me, wanting to be on the boat, but stuck in the water, we all have a strong sense that something is wrong in this world. The world just isn't fair. We hear about it all the time, we experience it in our own lives: the bad do well for themselves, the good suffer and perish. That's how the world so often is, and it hurts. It offends our sense of justice, of what is right, and our feelings about how things should be. We're in the water, but we want to be on the boat. We're stuck in a place we don't want to be.

Given the apparent unfairness of life and the way that this makes people hurt, we can all sympathize, and indeed empathize, with someone who's at the sharp end of an injustice: someone whose suffering becomes particularly acute, someone who calls out for help.

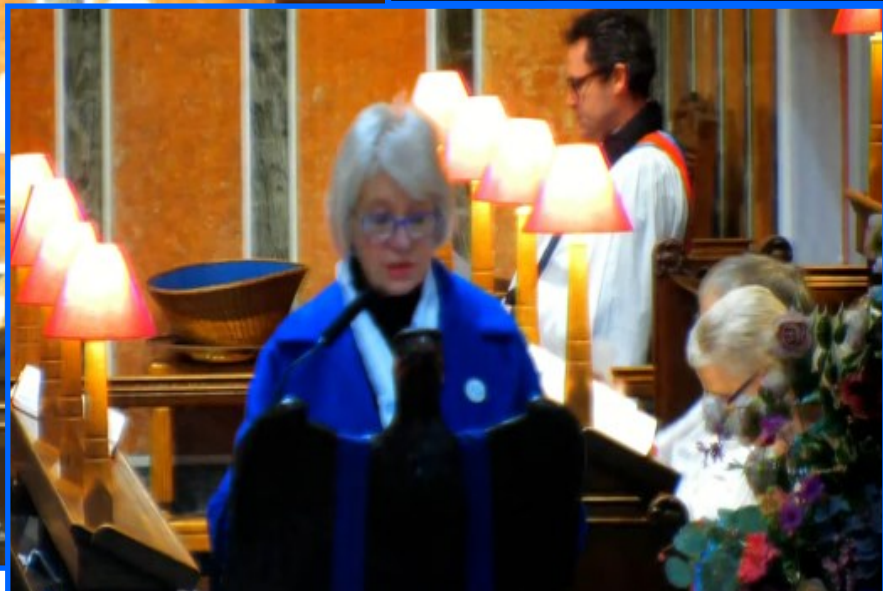
"Help!" That most basic and pained of human cries gets different responses, but it's always heard. If you're feeling the injustice of life right now, if your disappointed, angry, impatient with God, then Psalm 12 gives you permission to be in that place.

Yes in Psalm 12 things are a bit overplayed, but we all recognize the picture. Life just isn't as we hope it might be. And yet Psalm 12 is part of what reminds us that life will not always be like this. Now we wait, struggling in the water, for the boat to pick us up again, but we know that that boat is coming back. And that's what Psalm 12 points to: "'I will rise up now', says the Lord, 'and set them in the safety that they long for.'" (v. 5). We can indeed feel the pain of injustice, the emptiness and loneliness, but we can look forward to the eventual safety of a new heaven and a new earth.

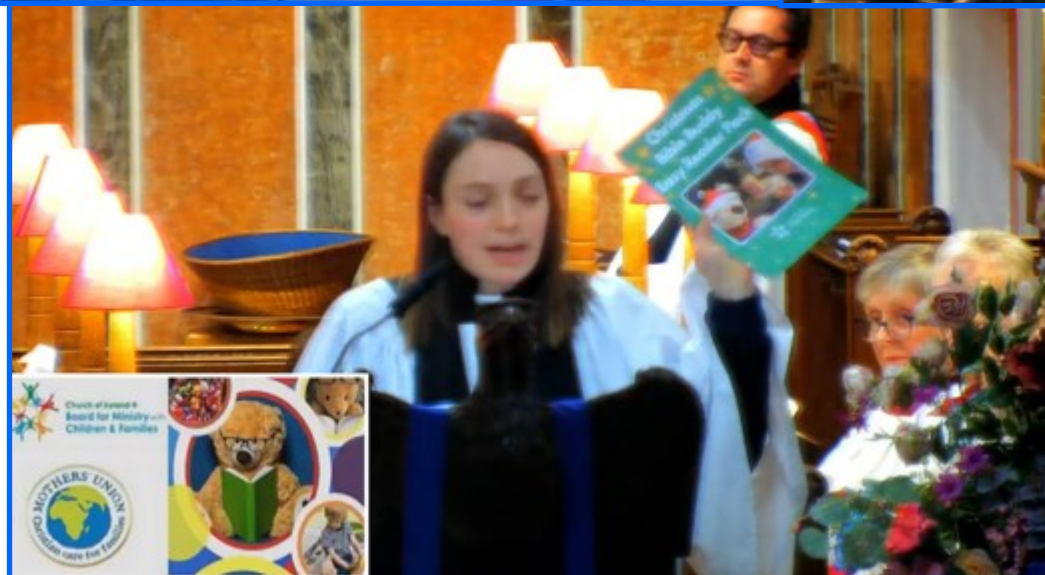

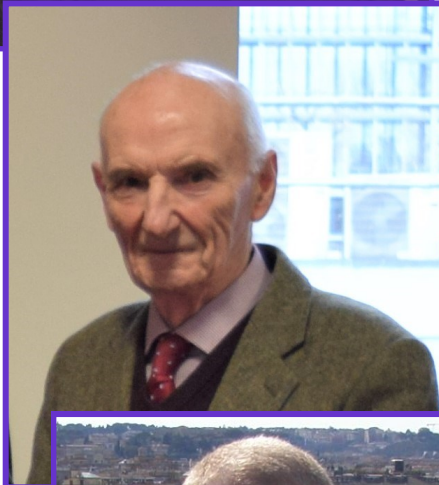

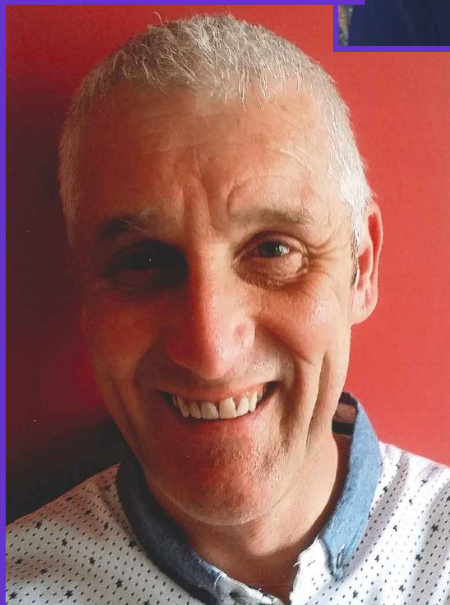

We approach the Bible with an open minded perspective and everyone's opinions and views are welcome.

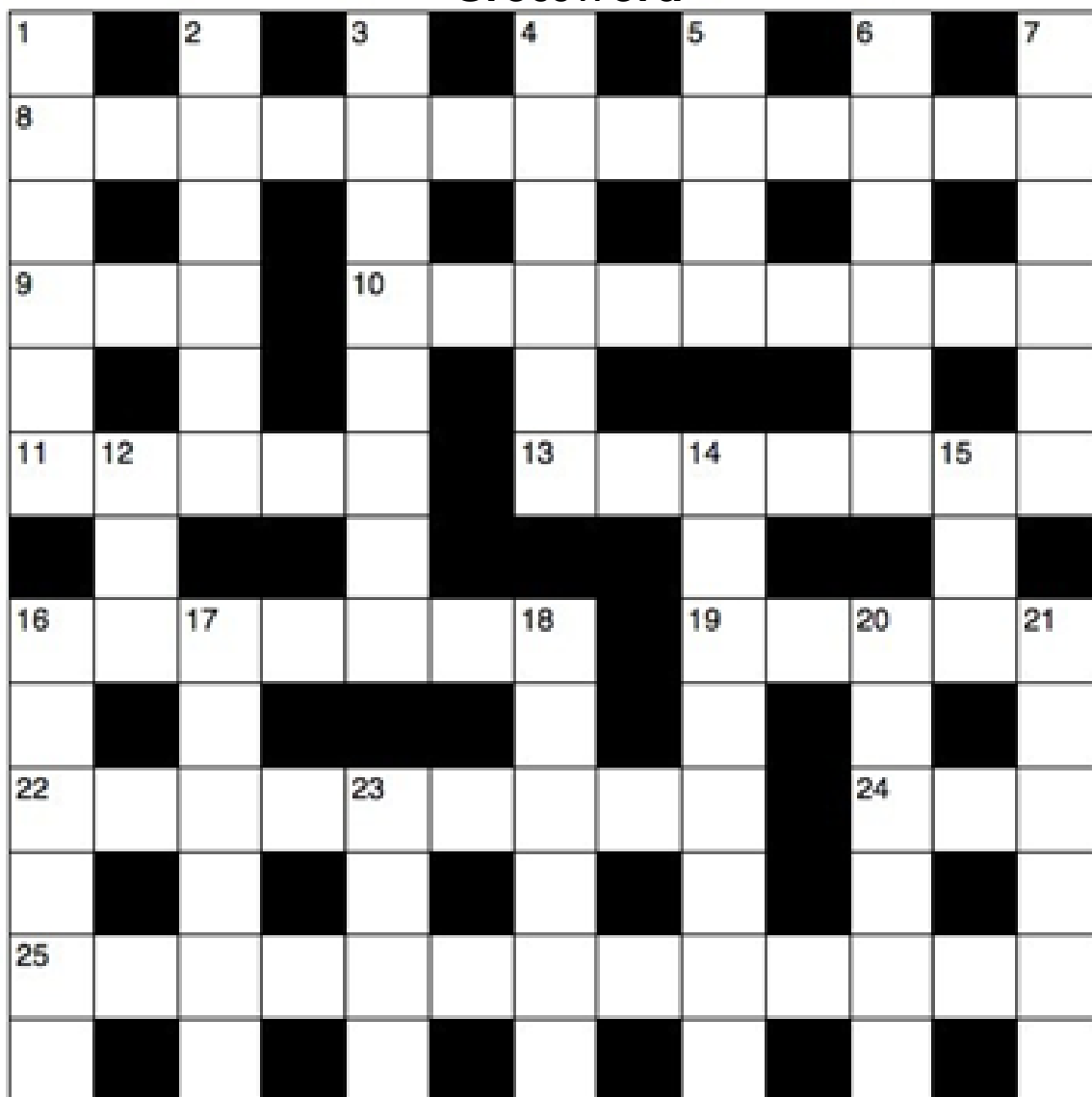
Our course is suited to people from any background. No prior knowledge is assumed and everyone is free to contribute and ask questions, though there is no pressure to do so.
