# The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

After the long months of winter, it is wonderful to see longer and brighter days and everything suddenly springing back to life, much helped by the increasing warmth of the days. As Winter turns to Spring



and Lent gives way to Easter, so we celebrate a 'turning-point,' not only in the natural world, but in our spiritual journey. Amidst all the new growth, there is God and His call again to new and revitalised life!

The message of Easter is that there is a new creation at work among us. A new creation, full of beauty and hope, where previously there has been darkness and despair. It is not only a new creation full of hope but full of love as well, and it is here that we are able to understand the wondrous exchange which takes place on that first Easter morning between Jesus and Mary Magdalene at the tomb, when she imagines him to be the gardener. Jesus calls her tenderly and gently by her name. There is a moment of recognition, and he commissions her to tell the other disciples, that in him and in the events now taking place, a new dawn is quite literally breaking through. The Risen Christ is freed from the darkness of death and he walks in the sunshine of a garden. He emerges from the tomb and the awe and beauty of that moment will generate new possibilities and new delights - new forms of life for all people everywhere! Perhaps like Mary Magdalene, we need a voice and touch; we need the kindness and the companionship of others -

- but most of all, we need the assurance of the Easter message.

The Easter Resurrection, and the message it brings, conquers hopelessness. It gives you hope, purpose and meaning. It gives you a reason to live. Therefore, do not settle for another nice little Easter – accept the challenge. If you are a regular attender at church that is a good start, however if you are irregular or have not been for a while pick up that challenge and join a vibrant band of worshippers in the Cathedral on a Sunday morning. In recent years our Cathedral has had a major transformation so may the lives of all our parishioners be transformed too as we meet in beautiful surroundings. Then as we experience this beauty may we also experience the beauty of a new beginning– experience the life, hope, and faith that the Risen Christ brings – experience the Lord's presence as He walks with us along the pathway of life!

The Easter Collect sums it all up:

Almighty God through your only-begotten Son Jesus Christ you have overcome death and opened to us the gate of everlasting life: Grant that, as by your grace going before us you put into our minds good desires, so by your continual help we may bring them to good effect; through Jesus Christ our risen Lord who is alive and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

# Lent and Holy Week


#### 13th April – Palm Sunday:

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, when the Church remembers how Jesus arrived at the gates of Jerusalem just a few days before the Passover was due to be held. He was the Messiah come to his own people in their capital city, and yet he came in humility, riding on a young



donkey, not in triumph, riding on a war-horse. As Jesus entered the city, the crowds gave him a rapturous welcome, throwing palm branches into his path. They knew his reputation as a healer, and welcomed him. Sadly the welcome was short-lived and shallow, for Jerusalem would soon reject her Messiah, and put him to death.

#### 17th April – Maundy Thursday:



Maundy Thursday is famous for two things. The first is one of the final acts that Jesus did before his death: the washing of his own disciples' feet (see John 13). Jesus washed his disciples' feet for a purpose: "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." His disciples were to love through service, not domination, of one another. Thursday was also important because it was on that night that Jesus first in-

troduced the Lord's Supper, or what we call Holy Communion. Jesus and his close friends had met in a secret upper room to share the Passover meal together – for the last time. Jesus transformed the Passover into the Lord's Supper, saying, 'this is my body' and 'this is my blood' as he, the Lamb of God, prepared to die for the sins of the whole world.




#### 18th April – Good Friday:

Good Friday is the day on which Jesus died on the cross. He was crucified at 9.00 in the morning, and died six hours later, at 3.00pm. It is the most solemn day in the Christian year, and is widely marked by the removal of all decorations from churches.

#### 20th April – Easter Day:

Easter is the most joyful day of the year for Christians. Christ has died for our sins. We are forgiven. Christ has risen! We look forward to an eternity in His joy! Hallelujah!

# **Clodagh Dunlop**

Clodagh Dunlop, had a brainstem stroke ten years ago. This left her paralysed with locked-in syndrome and only able to communicate by

blinking one eye. After seven and a half months in hospital, then learning to walk and talk again in intensive rehab, Clodagh continues to make a recovery, though she still has disabilities. Now back working as a serving PSNI officer, she was honoured in the King's Birthday Honours List with a MBE for her work with stroke survivors. She highlighted the danger of younger people with strokes being misdiagnosed, and the importance of fast access to life-saving surgery. Clodagh says, "Many people tell me I have a great story, but as great as the story is and as remarkable as my recovery has been, I really don't want anybody else to have the same story." 



# **Donations to Charites**

### Air Ambulance (Northern Ireland) - £5,000



Air Ambulance attends some of the most traumatic medical incidents across the province and is dedicated to delivering the very best possible pre-hospital critical care, both at the scene and whilst transferring the patient to the most appropriate hospital for their specific injuries. The helicopter can get anywhere in the province in approximately twenty-five minutes and the rapid response is vital in an emergency situation. If a patient

reaches hospital within the Golden Hour (60 minutes after their injury) their chances of survival are dramatically increased. Each day costs it costs £6,850 and £2.5m is needed each year to keep the Air Ambulance service operational, and is fortunate to count on tremendous public support.


support ongoing development in the fields of sustainable agriculture, health, including HIV/AIDS, and education in many parts of the world. Their aim is to enable people to have more control over their own lives and futures so that they are less dependent on others than they are today.



### Psalm

#### Psalm 106

The Hebrew scriptures are quite insistent on stories. Stories can have a multifaceted power over us: they not only fascinate and intrigue and entertain; they also comfort and teach and challenge and



rebuke us. Right from the fictions of the likes of Esther and Job to the historical stories of people like Daniel and Nehemiah, the Bible bristles with rattling good reads. Who has ever forgotten the events of the imaginary they provide, who hasn't benefitted from the truths they subtly present, who has never passed one of them on? And so it's hardly surprising that stories feature prominently in ancient Jewish worship. Psalm 106 was sung regularly in the rebuilt Temple after the return from exile.



Here we consider, in grim, nothing-omitted detail, the story of a people's rather dynamic relationship with God. It's a poetic telling of the cyclical account of rescue, obedience, falling-away, repentance and rescue that the ancient Israelites followed for much of their history. Here are the famines, the slaveries, the

captivities, the battles, the exiles. Red Sea crossings, golden calves, plagues and pagan sacrifices are all in the plot. This however is not just the story of a huge family, this is the story of a God who journeys with people, who sees not just a nation, but individuals, as travelling souls, and always worthy of forgiveness, grace and love. This is the messy story of God and people. This is the gritty story of salvation.

# Parenting Wellness Group





# **Prayer Books**



# **Knowing Your Cathedral: The Irvine Window**


