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#### The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

Easter Sunday of 2020 was an Easter like no other, with empty pews, online services, and no family gatherings. The coronavirus outbreak had forced Christians to celebrate Easter at home. Now as we



approach Easter of 2021, we still are uncertain of what may or may not happen. COVID-19 has spread around the globe. Millions of people are infected, and thousands have died from it. Many countries have imposed stringent measures to contain the outbreak and have set up strict regulations that place severe restrictions on people's daily lives, social interactions, and religious activities. The pandemic has dealt a ruthless blow to the economic system, which people took pride in, and has posed challenges to social security systems, and governments' ability to govern. Countless people now live in dire circumstances because of the damages done to the economy. This must surely be one of the most challenging crisis and the gravest disaster that humanity has ever faced.

Although economic contraction and deteriorating livelihood are the main causes for anxiety, the loss of lives is an even greater cause for sadness and fear. In the face of such suffering and difficulties, people's faith is inevitably challenged, and their trust in God is also shaken. Many may ask 'Where is God in all of this?', 'Why did God watch us suffer without helping us?', and 'When will the pandemic end so that people can return to their normal lives?' These are difficult questions to answer! Perhaps we can learn from Easter about our relationship with God at this time of difficult circumstances, and how to face this unprecedented challenge and disaster.

Jesus faced the darkness of death and waited for his Resurrection with obedience, and God raised him from the dead. Jesus rose from the dead because he was obedient to God and could therefore experience this leap in faith. As Christians, we must also learn to experience this lesson in obedience. Jesus returned in triumph from the darkness of death. He triumphed because he de-

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Jesus' Resurrection gives Christians hope. This hope is not merely a superficial and exaggerated optimism that is unconfirmed by facts. This hope is our trust in God. Good Friday is a day of darkness and death filled with suffering and disappointment, but Easter Sunday is a day filled with life and joy, like the dawn that is certain to come after the darkness of the night.

Today, we are living under the shadow of the pandemic and are in the middle of darkness. It is like experiencing Good Friday, a day for pain, sadness, fear, and death. However, Easter gives us the strength and faith to face all difficulties and the hope to triumph over all. This is because we know that every Good Friday is followed by an Easter Sunday, just as the dawn arrives after the darkness of the night. The good news is that we do not have to wait until death to experience resurrection but can experience the resurrected life during these difficult times. Therefore, we need to trust in God, and share our faith with others.

Let us live courageously and face the future with faith and hope, because Jesus, who loves us, had already walked this path before. He comforts and encourages us by saying 'Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest.' (Matthew 11:28). May that rest, free us from anxiety and worry from this deadly virus as we start to see light at the end of the tunnel; start to see some hope again in community life as we slowly return to some degree of normality!

May the Lord bless every one of you with courage and peace so that you may have an Easter filled with joy and hope even at this stage of the pandemic.

Christ is alive! Let Christians sing.

His cross stands empty to the sky.

Let streets and homes with praises ring.

His love in death shall never die. (Hymn 260)

five grandchildren. His son Trevor, daughter-in-law Sylvia and grandchildren Sophie and James are members of our Cathedral.



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### **Church Envelopes**

Re-roofing the cathedral is a massive project costing approximately £400,000. The project of selling slates for the roof (see pages 8 and 9), if every parishioner plays their part, should bring in £100,000 from outside sources and not from parishioner's own income. That leaves us with a further £300,000 to raise.

If this were to be divided equally among our contributing families it would be an exorbitant amount each, however we hope that every family will contribute as much as they can afford to see our magnificent building fully restored. I am not asking you to contribute above your means, but what I am asking you to do is to consider what you spent on non-essential items and give accordingly to the church – we know God loves a cheerful giver (2 Corinthians 9: 6-7). We are all well aware of the real financial struggles and hardship that many are facing with the on-going crisis of COVID-19; the result of this is that giving can often be squeezed and church giving sometimes falls victim to this. Therefore, we really appreciate parishioners' ongoing commitment to the work of Almighty God here in Enniskillen.



In each box of FWO Envelopes there are twelve additional yellow envelopes – one for each month. They are placed at the start of each month in hope that more funds are available at that stage of the month. Please give as generously as you can. The white envelopes are the regular weekly envelope and we very much depend on your generosity in these to keep our day-to-day expenses covered.

If you wish to pay to either the Roof Fund or the regular weekly contributions by Standing Order that can be arranged by contacting the Cathedral Office. Details of all contributions will be recorded in the end of the year Report and you can remain anonymous if you so request.

Thank you for your co-operation and your continued support for the parish.


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# Holy Week and Easter Services Holy Week Services

#### **Announcement**

The Church of Ireland have agreed to further assess the situation immediately after the next NI Executive review of current lockdown provisions on Tuesday 16th March 2021, in the cautious anticipation that, from Friday 2nd April (Good Friday) onwards, our parishioners in Northern Ireland could return to in-person gatherings for worship, with all necessary precautions and mitigations in place. This recognises the importance of Easter, the significance of which was acknowledged by the Minister for Health and the Chief Medical Officer at their most recent meeting with Church representatives. A similar approach is also being taken by the Methodist Church, the Presbyterian Church and, in a slightly different form, by the Roman Catholic Church.

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# **Cathedral Restoration Project**

Dear Parishioner/s

Very soon the scaffolding will be erected around our Cathedral building which commences the major task of reroofing our historic building dedicated to St Macartin, which has stood the test of time for 400 years and is now a well-known landmark in Enniskillen town, as well as a witness to the Christian Faith handed on to us from generations past!

This is an ambitious and mighty task to gather in over £400,000 during a pandemic. Had circumstances been different we would have been able to hold many fund-raising activities – concerts, coffee mornings, sales etc, but all of that is not now possible. Coupled with that, many families are struggling to make ends meet after a very difficult period with finance not plentiful at present, and we do appreciate what you can affordably give the church in your Free Will Offering. This year we have also asked each family to contribute what they can afford in twelve yellow monthly envelopes at the start of each month towards the Cathedral Roof Fund. Thank you to those who are using these, and we are grateful to those who have already very generously contributed single donations to the Cathedral



Roof Fund.

Rather than try to raise all the money from parishioners, we are asking parishioners to help to raise some money from non parishioners by selling slates. In doing so you could provide us with twenty slates for the roof!

There are 10,000 slates on the roof and if we ask each family to provide twenty slates, we could raise £100,000 in this venture alone and this will bring in about 25% of the overall cost.

This is an opportunity for you to do something in Christian service and provide something extra for God's House by selling some slates at £10 each to family members, friends, acquaintances, or neighbours who are not parishioners – just twenty slates to sell. When doing so please fill in the stubs with name, address, and postcode of the buyer, and tick the box if a taxpayer so that we can reclaim tax at no extra cost to the buyer of the slate. When you have completed the sale of the twenty slates, please return the stubs and money to the Cathedral Office, The Churchwardens, The Treasurer or myself as Dean of the Cathedral. Please do not give any money or stubs to anyone not personally known to you. We really appreciate your

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



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# **Cathedral Restoration Project**

Plans for the work to be undertaken in restoring the cathedral roof and stonework are progressing satisfactorily. Specifications for the work to be undertaken have been prepared and tender documents have been issued to six contractors who had expressed interest in the work. Contractors have been asked to submit their tenders by 3rd March. These will be received by McCollum Conservation who, within one week, should make a recommendation regarding the appointment of a contractor




to the Select Vestry. If what has been recommended to the select Vestry is acceptable the contractor will be appointed and should then be in a position to undertake the work. Whilst the contractor appointed will undertake most of the work the firm will be required to employ specialists for the lead work and stone restoration.

Stone restoration will involve work on the east window where two sections of the stone work surrounding the stained glass window will need to be replaced. The attached diagram shows where the work is required.

Some of the stone pinnacles require total or partial rebuilding. Originally the stonework was secured using iron pins or dowels. When the iron rusts it swells and impacts adversely on the stone structure. When the stones are being rebuilt stainless steel dowels will be used which will protect the stonework.


Plan (on right) of a rebuilt pinnacle showing the location of the stainless steel dowels.



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#### Psalm 34

Amid the current coronavirus pandemic, we all live with fear and uncertainty. How do we deal with fear? 'I sought the Lord, and He answered me; He delivered me from all my fears.' (Ps 34:4). In this psalm, David expresses real fears. He was on the run from Saul, who was trying to murder him! Yet David points to three simple habits that help overcome fear.






Praising God always: 'I will extol the Lord at all times; His praise will always be on my lips. (1). It was David's pattern of life to praise God daily, whatever his circumstances. He was acknowledging God's lordship over his life. Praise affirms that my circumstances are in His hands and He is with me in all that I am going through.

Seeking God continually: 'This poor man called, and the Lord heard him; He saved him out of all his troubles.' (6). David looked to God, who released him from all his fears. It's easy for our fears to overwhelm us and rob us of the assurance that God loves us and wants the best for us. When we seek God, He hears us and responds, as He is not powerless to act.





Finding refuge in God: 'Taste and see that

the Lord is good; blessed is the one who takes refuge in Him.' (8). David's personal invitation is to taste and see that God is good. Our fears often tell us that the opposite is true for us. Fear tells us that God cannot be trusted and that He will abandon us. We can make God our secure refuge and not be afraid.

This psalm helps us to see fear from a totally different perspective: 'Fear the Lord, you His holy people, for those who fear Him lack nothing.' (9).

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# Bishop Ellinah of Diocese of Swaziland



The Dean of Clogher, the Very Rev Kenneth Hall records his shock and sadness at the news of the death of the Right Rev Ellinah Wamukoya, the Bishop of the Diocese of Swaziland. He extends his deepest and heartfelt sympathy to her husband Okwaro, her children, grandchildren, and to the Diocese of Swaziland. Bishop Elliah was the first woman in the Anglican Church of South Africa to be elected Bishop, and the first female Bishop to preach in the Diocese of Clogher on her visit to St Macartin's Cathedral, Enniskillen in January 2015.




# **Prayer Books**

#### The Cathedral News



The Cathedral News has been a feature of St Macartin's Cathedral for over 50 years! During Dean Thomas Clement's time a News Sheet would have been produced periodically, originally on an A4 page, run off on a duplicator.

This later developed into a folded sheet on plain white paper until October 1996, and it was then produced in black ink on coloured paper. From October 2010 the format was changed, and extra pages were added. A colour front page was introduced in February 2011 and increased to 20 pages with coloured photographs. In September 2015 the Cathedral



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

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

#### Jesus Heals a Paralysed Man

- One day Jesus was teaching the people. The Pharisees and teachers of the law were sitting there too. They had come from every town in Galilee and Judea and from Jerusalem. The Lord was giving Jesus the power to heal people. In There was a man who was paralysed, and some other men were carrying him on a mat. They tried to bring him and put him down before Jesus. #### Interactive Activity

We are going to make a Place Mat. This place mat is a perfect reminder of th story! The paralysed man was brought in lying on it and left with it rolled up in h hands.

#### Resources:

- scissors
- glue, ruler
- coloured paper- at least A4 size as this piece will become the background colour for the placemat
- Is strips of coloured paper (either one or multiple colours but choose different colour than the background). These strips should be about 2.5 cr (I inch) wide by about 30 cm (I2 inches) long



- 1. Take the large piece of coloured paper and fold it in half across the width.

  2. Use your ruler to mark inch wide spaces all along the folded
- edge.
  3. Do the same along the open edge but the marks should be I
- 4. Draw a line connecting the marks.
- With the paper still tolded and starting at the fold cut along the lines being careful to stop one inch from the open edge.
   Unfold the paper to reveal the loom that you
- have created. 7. Weave the one-inch strips through the loom. If
- you are using multiple colours be sure to alternate them for the most colourful effect.

  8. Give the ends of the strips to the edges of the loom to hold them in place.

  9. If you have a laminate, you could use this to strengthen your placemat.
