## The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

November is well and truly a 'month of remembrance'. You will see photographs in this edition of The Captain Oates Memorial, the anniversary of the Enniskillen bomb and the Remembrance Day Service. It is important that we remember that many still bear the scars of war today from those events and more recent ones, like the armed conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan, and our own 'Troubles' in Northern Ireland. Emotions run high, and for many a dark cloud hangs over their lives. In the world we live in, there are so many pressures in life that many people feel depressed, lonely and see little or no hope for the future.

About 700 years before Jesus was born, the prophet Isaiah spoke of His coming. There was something in Isaiah's words that spoke to his people. There was something in the message of this Child that was to be born, this Son that would be given, that gave Israel a reason to rejoice.

*"For unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given; And the government will be upon His shoulder. And His name will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."* (Isaiah 9:6)

Many in Isaiah's day were not godly people. In fact, the nation of Israel had messed up so badly, that God was bringing the nation of Assyria down upon them as punishment. They were walking in darkness - in the shadow of death



- because they had abandoned God. And it was to these people who walked in darkness that God gave the guarantee of a great light, a child of hope and promise, and a future for their people, a Wonderful Counsellor, a Mighty God, an Everlasting Father, and a Prince of Peace.

That promise still stands for all of us today, whether we are walking in light or darkness. If we are walking in light, following Him, then we will know His Peace and Presence with us, but if you are not and struggling through dark days or the 'pits of life' then that message is all the more important, because it was also written for you! The Child that was born at Bethlehem brings hope in an uncertain world to all who call upon Him, and acknowledge Him as their trusted Friend.

There are many opportunities for you to attend church during Advent and Christmas and truly worship our Heavenly Father. As you draw close to Him, may you experience that true Heavenly joy that He sent us through the Holy Child of Bethlehem.

Let His grace and forgiveness give you hope. Let His mercy bring you joy!

### Free Will Offering Envelopes for 2018

Every family is receiving a set of lilac 2018 envelopes with this magazine. Please do not use these 2018 envelopes until January.

We would encourage you to use the FWO envelopes instead of putting cash on the collection plate. By doing so, the church may be able to claim an additional 25% as Gift Aid and your giving to the church would be increased at no additional expense to yourselves. Where appropriate, gifts to the church will also be Gift Aided in order to maximise our income. Although each parishioner now has a number, your offerings will not be published if that is your wish.

A growing number of parishioners contribute by Standing Order. If this method is suitable for you, we strongly recommend it. Simply inform your bank of the amount you wish to give to the church and whether you wish to pay on an annual, monthly or weekly basis. You will need the Cathedral's bank details - these are available in the cathedral office or from the Treasurer - give those details to your bank and it will look after the payments for you.

## Dedication of Capt Laurence Edward Grace Oates Plaque



A plaque has been dedicated in St Macartin's Cathedral, Enniskillen in memory of Captain Laurence Edward Grace Oates, of The 6th Royal Inniskilling Dragoons and a member of Captain Scott's expedition to the South Pole. The service on Sunday, 29th October was attended by Viscount Brookeborough, Representative of Her Majesty the Queen for Fermanagh as well as Officers of the Inniskilling Dragoon Guards. It was conducted by the Dean, The Very Revd Kenneth Hall and the sermon was preached by the Revd Fr A E Strachan CF(RC), Chaplain to The Royal Dragoons Guards.



## Dedication of Diana Cairn Plaque for Rotary Club



THE Peace Cairn created by children from both sections of the community and completed by the late Princess Diana during her last visit to Enniskillen 24 years ago has been rededicated with a new memorial nearby.

In 1993, young people from Enniskillen Rotaract Club, with the help of Enniskillen Rotary Club and Fermanagh District Council, refurbished the area under the East Bridge with new seating, shrub beds and pathways to create 'Inis Ceithleann Island Park'.

Rotaract President Selwyn Johnston continued a further ambitious community project along with 60 young people to create a new park in the adjoining waste ground, officially named 'Plunkett's Park'. The completion of both parks helped transform the area, while helping to promote the passion young people had for their local community.

The late Princess Diana paid a surprise visit to Enniskillen on Sunday 14th November of that same year for Remembrance Day. She also visited Inis Ceithleann Island Park to take part in a service attended by young people from both traditions. The teenagers involved in the service had earlier built the Peace Cairn, showing the way of peace after the Enniskillen Remembrance Day bombing. Made from locally quarried granite, Princess Diana laid the last stone. However the inscription stone suffered with erosion and the writing became illegible. Given its close connection with the creation of Inis Ceithleann Island Park, Enniskillen Rotary Club felt it was appropriate to have Princess Diana's visit and the creation of the Peace Cairn recorded for posterity. To do this and with the generosity of two Rotarians, it was decided that the story should be inscribed on a durable surface for future generations.

A service of dedication of the replacement inscription stone for the Princess Diana Cairn took place on Monday at New Street conducted by Dean Kenneth Hall and Monsignor Peter O'Reilly.



## 30th Anniversary of Remembrance Day Bombing



The Dean of Clogher, the Very Revd Kenneth Hall has dedicated a memorial to the 12 victims of the Enniskillen Remembrance Day bomb and the scores of those injured on the 30th anniversary on 8th November.

The unveiling was performed by Her Majesty's Representative in Fermanagh, Viscount Brookeborough, who read a special message from The Queen who said the memorial was a poignant reminder of a terrible event.

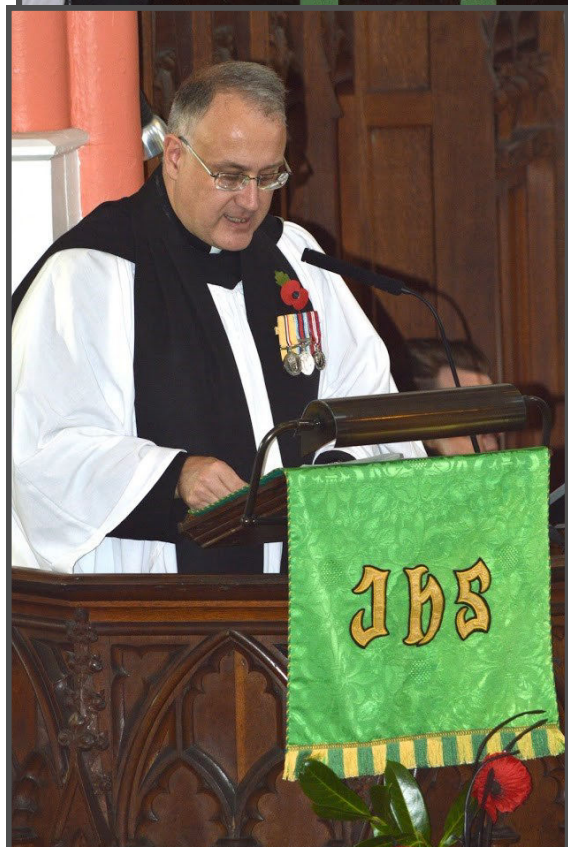
The First Lesson, Ecclesiastes 3: 1-8 was read by John Jones, pictured right, Chairman Royal British Legion, Enniskillen Branch.

## Collect of the Month by Rev. Chris Mac Bruithin

Our series exploring some of the Church's most beloved prayers continues with the collect appointed for the Seventeenth Sunday after Trinity.

*Almighty God, unto whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of thy Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love thee, and worthily magnify thy holy Name, through Christ our Lord. Amen.*

*- The Book of Common Prayer*

*Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.*

Many collects are appointed for a particular Sunday of the year. This 'Collect for Purity' is a suitable opening prayer for the service of Holy Communion throughout the year.

The Latin version of the prayer goes back to the 700s. It was reportedly prayed at the coronation of Charlemagne, ruler of

the Holy Roman Empire, by an English priest called Alcuin. Alcuin wanted to remind the great Emperor that even he was subject to God, who knows our secret desires and motivations.

It became a key part of a special vestry service of preparation for priests and their assistants. The idea was that leading worship was such a sacred responsibility that priests ought to get themselves in a pure state of mind before they processed in through the congregation.

When Thomas Cranmer translated the Latin texts into English for the first Book of Common Prayer, in line with Reformation thinking, he took this prayer of preparation out of the vestry and into the Holy Communion liturgy. Thus, not only the priest but all the people prepare their hearts for public worship.

When we gather in the Cathedral, God knows our hearts. Even if we put on a brave face for those seated in the pews around us, He knows what is really going on inside us. The phrase 'the thoughts of our hearts' is striking. We are integrated creatures, rational and emotional, and God knows us completely.

The outcome of the prayer is love and worship of God. In its setting at the beginning of our Holy Communion service, and in line with Cranmer's Reformation agenda, this collect reminds us that we are not a passive

audience when we meet together, but active worshippers.

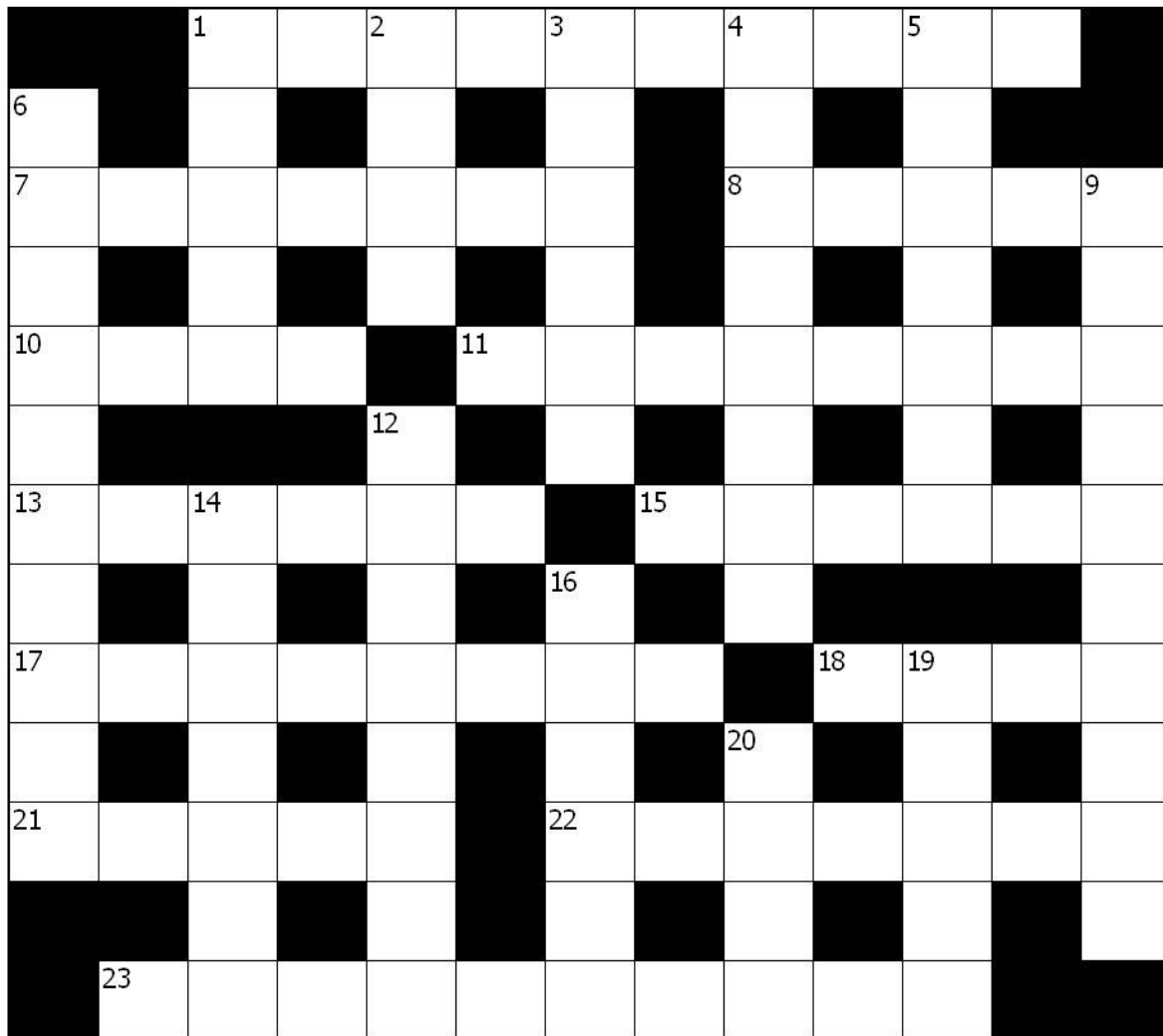
