Dear Parishioners,

We are very aware of how special the arrival of a new baby is to a family! This Christmas we celebrate again God's gift of Jesus: 'Thanks be to God for His indescribable gift!' (2 Corinthians 9:15).



What can we say about this baby?

He is God Himself:

The unthinkable has happened: God has become a human being! The eternal, creator God enters the world of time and space, both fully human and fully divine. conducted by the Dean of Clogher, the Very Rev Kenneth Hall and the preacher was the Rt Rev David Chillingworth, the former Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church, a former pupil of Portora Royal School and a former choir boy in St Macartin's Cathedral.

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The Battle's Over

A Nation's tribute is now complete and it was marked in style in Enniskillen, the most Westerly location in the UK to take part. We replicated some of the events of 100 years ago, when Enniskillen was the first place to learn of the armistice, with search lights, sky rockets and the peal of St Macartin's Cathedral bells. The clock face on the Cathedral was backlit for the first time and now will shine for evermore as a sign of peace, hope and reconciliation in our community symbolising the light of Christ shining forth from our lives! A united morning service for all denominations was held in St Macartin's Cathedral, recorded live on RTE. It was conducted by





the Dean, the Very Rev Kenneth Hall and the preacher was the Bishop of Clogher, the Right Rev John McDowell. Afterwards the Cathedral bells rang out at 12.30pm as suggested by Her Majesty's Government to move from a mood of 'remembrance' to that of 'celebration' that the Great War had ended.



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The Battle's Over

In the evening time the four main churches joined in a united service of 'Hope, Peace, Light and Love' as Church of Ireland, Presbyterian and Methodist congregations processed to St Michael's Roman Catholic

Church following their lanterns of light, which were given to all four clergy by Her Majesty's Lord Lieutenant for Co Fermanagh at the 6.00am service at Enniskillen Castle. St Michael's was filled to capacity with almost 1000 people. A massive crowd outside (estimated at another 1000) brought the town centre to a standstill. After a moving service in St Michael's Church a flame of light led the way to St Mac-



artin's Cathedral grounds (across the street) where Viscount Brookebor-



the night sky. Two beams of light one from each side of the street crossed over each other symbolising two churches, two beams of light but one community united in love and respect for each other and for those who gave their lives 100 years ago, that we might celebrate freedom!

ough HML lit a beacon. The crowds crossing the street were greeted by a massed band of 100 pipers and drummers drawn from all bands throughout the county. A spectacle to behold! At the same time as the beacon was lit the Cathedral Clock was lit, the Cathedral bells pealed again and sky rockets lit up

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Canticles in Worship by Rev Chris Mac Bruithin A new series of reflections on the Canticles in the Book of Common Prayer

Magnificat!

What canticle can we look at over the Christmas season? There are a few contenders, but perhaps the best known is the canticle Magnificat, or Mary's Song. I'm sure you know the story in Luke 1. Mary has just been told by an angel that she is pregnant, even though she's a virgin. The angel knows she'll need family support and sends her to visit her cousin Elizabeth, who is also pregnant with John the Baptist. When Mary arrives, Elizabeth's baby jumps for joy in her womb, rec-

ognizing Jesus even before his birth.

Inspired by the Holy Spirit, Mary sings a song. It seems to be modelled on Hannah's song (1 Samuel 2:10) in which she praises God for granting her a child after years of infertility. Likewise, Mary thanks God personally for the wonderful thing he is doing in her life. With Mary, we recall joyfully that 'the Almighty has done great things for me'.

As well as this personal blessing, *Magnificat* is also full of Old Testament allusions about God's promise of mercy throughout history. Mary is living in a dangerous, violent world, full of corruption and political power struggles. She sings of God fulfilling his promises to his people, especially his reversal of intolerable situations. He raises up the 'poor and lowly', and

'scattered the proud'. In fact, it is a very subversive political song. Imagine if the Roman governor or corrupt temple priest heard it!

At the Anglican Reformation, Cranmer retained the prominent place of this gospel canticle at Evening Prayer. There are many wonderful settings of *Magnificat* and these are a particular treasure of Anglican heritage, especially as sung by choirs in cathedrals all over Britain and Ireland.

Not all churches have a choir like ours. Of course, we might say this canticle together, but if there is no choir to lead us, there are two metrical versions in the liturgical material section of the Church Hymnal. 'Mary sang a song' is number 704. But surely one of the most rousing hymns is number 712: 'Tell out, my soul'. I was surprised to discover how recently it was written by Timothy Dudley-Smith, in 1961. It has quickly become a classic.

This Christmas, like Mary, may we sing for joy as we recollect all that God has done, for us personally and for all the world, through the Incartation of God's Word – Jesus Christ.



Psalm

Psalm 8 – and the wonders of Creation

'Lord, our Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth!' (Psalm 8:1).



What did David see? 'When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place' (3). David was moved to worship as he meditated on the night sky and saw the moon and stars

pointing to their Maker. His words point to the

work of a great artist, whose art reflects the character of the artist Himself. How vast is the universe in which we live! It speaks of a creation shot through with meaning and purpose, demonstrating the tremendous wisdom and power of God. As creation speaks of the greatness of God, it demands our allegiance and loyalty to Him in all aspects of our lives. What did David feel? 'what is mankind that you are mindful of them, human beings that you care for them?' (4). In the



light of creation's vastness, we can feel a little insignificant! Why do human beings exist on this tiny planet in such a vast universe? However, David goes on to answer his own question: 'You have made them a little lower than the angels and crowned them with glory and honour.' (5). Human



beings have a unique relationship to God, because we are created in His image. We are the means by which the invisible God is made visible to His creation. We are called to be partners with God in doing His work in the world, to care for the earth rather than exploiting it. It is a precious resource, along with the creatures it contains!

'The glory of God is the human person fully alive' (Irenaeus of Lyons).
