The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

We are now beginning the season of Advent. The seasons of the Church's year are important to us and we should value the annual cycle as we start a new Church year on the first Sunday in December -



Advent Sunday. Advent is a time of reflective waiting and preparing for Christmas. The Liturgical colour for the Advent Season is purple, the mood more somber and no Gloria sung in our services. Then on Christmas Eve we change to a beautifully decorated church, with joyful carols and white furnishings. This signals the excitement of the celebration of the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ. In Advent, we are reminded of God's promise to his people that one would come to break into the darkness and bring light and hope to all. We hear the message delivered by the prophets, by John the Baptist, by the angel visiting Mary. This is a two-fold message of expectant waiting –for the birth of a Messiah and for the time when Christ will return to earth. As we wait, we are called to be ready and to prepare ourselves for the celebrations ahead and that time when Jesus returns as our judge. Our Sunday and Thursday services during Advent will help us in this time of preparation. The seasons in the Church's year also remind us that life is never static, that it

is always changing, but that underlying this there is one constant –that our God is never changing, ever faithful and always with us. It is this fact that sustains our church community in our life together through the inevitable changes that we face. As we watch the seasons come and go, as we move through the Advent season into Christmas, as we experience changes in our

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own lives, and in our church and community, may we remember that we have a faithful God, who promises never to leave us or forsake us. For this is the hope that truly will sustain us, and it this faith and hope that we need to pass on to the generations to follow. If the Christian message of faith and hope depended only on you and me, would we pass it on? Or would it end abruptly with us? Each one of us has that responsibility to be faithful witnesses in the way we speak and act, not least in showing an example to others to be regular worshippers at church.

There are many opportunities for you to attend church during Advent and Christmas and truly worship our Heavenly King. As you draw close to Him may you experience that true Heavenly joy. Let His grace and forgiveness give you hope. Let His mercy bring you joy.

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Letter from the Treasurer

Dear Parishioners,

2023 has been a challenging year for all of us in our private lives as we have coped with the escalating cost of living for such essentials as food and fuel. Obviously some people are affected more seriously than others and we pray especially for such groups as young families, the ill and disabled, the frail and elderly and those on low income or without work. Unfortunately, this is a world-wide crisis, caused largely by war and greed, and shows no sign of improvement in the immediate future. St Macartin's also has had to meet additional financial challenges in 2023 when we undertook expensive and necessary work on the organ and the graveyard wall. Both projects have been successfully completed and are fully paid. As Treasurer, I want to say how much I admire the way in which so many parishioners have risen to these challenges, the result of which is the magnificent premises we now have. Without your support and dedication this work could not have been completed, so please accept my thanks and those of the Dean, and Select Vestry. Sadly, however, there are still too many parishioners who do not share the responsibility of the church. Hopefully you will re-consider – there is still time to contribute whatever you can afford.

Our on-going challenge, which we hope to complete by the end of 2024, is the electrification of the cathedral bells, coupled with work on the cathedral clock. We are immensely proud of our faithful bell-ringers who ring the bells every week. Unfortunately, very few parishioners volunteer to do this work, therefore it has been decided to electrify the bells and we look forward to hearing all ten bells chime again! The cathedral clock has not been working for some time. This work on the bells and the clock will be completed at the same time, but it also raises the question of finance for these new projects. We hope that parishioners will continue to be generous. Each family is receiving a new set of purple 2024 envelopes with this magazine. A letter also is enclosed stating the amount contributed as Free Will Offering, as Harvest Offering and as contributions to other church funds up to, and including, 31 October 2023. I would encourage you to use your FWO envelopes instead of putting cash in the collection baskets. By doing so, the church may be able to claim an additional 25% as Gift Aid and your giving to the church would be increased at no additional expense to yourselves. Your offerings will remain anonymous in the Annual Report if you wish.

I strongly recommend using Standing Orders for your Freewill Offerings. You simply inform your bank of the amount you wish to contribute and whether you wish to pay on an annual or monthly basis. The Cathedral's bank details are available in the cathedral office - give those details to your bank and it will look after the payments for you. Thank you for your co-operation and your continued support for the Parish.

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Cathedral 100 Years Old


Cathedral status for Enniskillen Church

It had been felt for some time, in the early years of the twentieth century, that Enniskillen Church merited a higher status than that of St Anne's Parish Church. This was due to the central position of Enniskillen, with regard to the Church of Ireland population in the Diocese of Clogher. This idea was strongly promoted by the Enniskillen rector at the time, Archdeacon James MacManaway, later Bishop of Clogher (Photo right).



In 1920, plans were prepared which would bring the church up to cathedral standard. This involved the extension of the chancel, creation of the present choir stalls, and the enclosing of a robing room. In May 1921, the decision was made in the parish to proceed with upgrading the church and the approval of the General Synod of the Church of Ireland was obtained. Colonel Madden and Mr J. Whiteside Dane had made generous financial contributions


towards the upgrading of the church. Colonel and Mrs Madden of Hilton Park, Clones, donated the bishop's throne. The marble lining of the chancel walls and the Communion rail and step were placed in the cathedral by Bishop MacManaway in memory of his son, Lancelot, and his dear wife. The upgrading of the porch and staircase, including the First World War memorial, were part of the work undertaken at that time. The memorial has inscribed upon it the names of 238 men who served in the war, 50 of whom gave up their lives. The memorial was unveiled by Sir Charles F. Falls on the day of consecration of the cathedral. The cathedral was consecrated and reopened on Wednesday 12th December 1923 by The Most Reverend Charles D'Arcy, Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland.

The cathedral was consecrated as The Cathedral Church of St Macartan at Enniskillen. The name was subsequently changed to

St MacCartin and later to the present usage, St Macartin.

The church's elevation to the status of a cathedral will be celebrated at the concert in the cathedral on the evening of Tuesday 12th December.

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Messy Church

Messy Church is a form of church for children and adults that involves creativity, celebration and hospitality. It meets at a time that suits people who don't already belong to church.

It typically includes a welcome, then a long creative time to explore a biblical theme through getting messy. It also involves a short celebration time involving story, prayer, song, games and similar. It con-

cludes with a sit-down meal together at tables. It is a programme that caters for adults and of primary school age.

It's fun.

It's a church for people at all stages of their faith journey and of any age. It models and promotes good ways of growing as a family: a nuclear family, an extended family, and a global and local church family. Its aim is to introduce Jesus, to give an opportunity to encounter him and to grow closer to him.



Messy Church is a church, but not as most people know it. Children of primary school age come together to discover Jesus, including those who have never been to church before. A warm welcome awaits you. The next Messy Church is a Family Fun Day in the Cathe-

Enniskillen Workhouse



The Workhouse was open for inmates on 15 March 1844. The Workhouse in Enniskillen was built for 1,000 people. The first inmates were admitted on 1 December 1845. During this time (The Great Famine) over 10,000 people were admitted to Enniskillen Workhouse. 2,040 of them did not survive. In 1845 the potato crop was hit by a fungus, commonly called 'potato blight' or Phytophthora Infestans. The potato disappeared from the Workhouse menu, replaced with buttermilk and 'stirabout' (maize with water and milk). In May 1847, the worst

time during the famine, 156 inmates died, 107 orphans were sent from The Workhouse to Australia on the Earl Grey Emigration Scheme (The third highest number of girls to leave from a single Workhouse, outnumbered only by Dublin and Skibbereen). The Board of Governors of the Union held its last meeting and was abolished in 1948 to be replaced by the new NHS – The National Health Service. The 30 remaining inmates were transferred to the

Workhouse in Armagh. The Workhouse which later had served as a General Hospital was largely demolished to make way for the 'Erne Hospital'. After a 2 year restoration programme the Administration Block, as the only re-

maining original Workhouse building, was reopened as a Heritage and Business Incubation Hub in 2023. The Tuesday Club visited the hub on 24th October.

like to attend return it nearer the time.




Renewal of Car Park Fobs



Cathedral History Books





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The Dean's Sit Out for Charity

Bishops' Appeal contributes to relief of suffering in time of emergencies whether natural or man-made.

Aims:

- To educate the Church at home about the needs and concerns of people in the less developed world and the causes of poverty;
- To encourage Church members to examine the reasons for the problems facing the less fortunate in the world and to consider what we can do to change conditions:
- To reach out in God's name to those who need our help;
- To encourage informed prayer and prayerful action aimed at strengthening the poor; and
- To raise the funds needed to allow Bishops' Appeal to support development projects and alleviate the suffering caused by disasters, both natural and man-made. The Church of Ireland Bishops' Appeal for World Aid and Development has released €10,000 (equivalent to £8,650) in emergency funds to the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem. The Diocese includes 7,000 Anglicans worshipping within 28 congregations in Israel, Palestine, Lebanon, Syria, and Jordan. It is responsible for more than 30 institutions, including hospitals, schools, clinics, rehabilitation centres, guesthouses, and retirement homes. The Diocese runs Al Ahli Arab Hospital in Gaza which provides medical care and support to all people, regardless of their faith or ethnicity.

We urge the people of the Church of Ireland to pray for peace in the Land of the Holy One and pray for wisdom for those in positions of authority to work towards an end to all violence. We uphold to God in prayer all who are affected by the current conflict. All human life is the gift of God. The Church of Ireland, in its daily prayers, prays for people suffering in conflict, those who seek to bring care and relief, and the peace of the world.

Air Ambulance NI is a charity in Northern Ireland. They work in partnership with the Northern Ireland Ambulance Service, to provide the Helicopter Emergency Medical Service for the region. Serious or life-threatening situations can happen to anyone at any time and on average, every single day in Northern Ireland, two individuals find themselves in critical need of an Air Ambulance.

The charity's operational helicopter carries a crew compiling pilot, doctor, and paramedic, 365 days of the year operating for twelve hours every day. They attend some of the most traumatic medical incidents across the province and are dedicated to delivering the very best possible pre-hospital critical care, both at the scene and whilst transferring the patient to the most appropriate hospital for their specific injuries.

St Macartin's Cathedral Outreach Fund is specifically designed to be 'people focused' and not building focused'. It helps fund groups like Parenting and Wellbeing, Messy Church, Xplore, Supper at Six and Senior Citizens. It also provides assistance for those in need and to assist with projects that reach out to people in the locality.


