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The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

Many people like to sing. No matter what we sound like, there can be a stirring within us on special occasions that prompts us to sing. In the Christmas story, singing is featured on three occa-



sions. When Mary visited her elderly relative, Elizabeth, she was so overwhelmed with happiness at the forthcoming miraculous birth of her Son, that she burst into a flow of praise. Her words are known as The Magnificat which we often sing at Evening Prayer. Her words have been set to music by numerous composers down the years, for example the Hymn 'Tell out my soul'. Mary recalled God's promise that He would rescue His people and, through the Messiah, save the world. So Mary sang of God's mercy and benevolence on the helpless, the humble and the hungry.

The next 'song' came from the angels, on the night of Jesus' birth. They appeared to the shepherds in the fields of Bethlehem, and were full of the glory of God. 'Peace on earth', 'goodwill toward man'. The final 'song' in the Nativity story came from the shepherds, who hurried to see the new-born baby. They were so overwhelmed by the implications for Israel, that they sang praises to God as they returned to their sheep.

Down the centuries, countless poets and musicians have composed music to describe a wondrous moment in history. At Christmas, around the world, people come together to sing carols and other songs that express the wonder of God's Gift to us. The Season of Advent is about preparation – preparation to receive the King. His time to return as the all-powerful Messiah is in the near future, but we so often rush into the season of Christmas and miss the Season of Advent. It is essential for all of us to make the proper preparations to have Jesus as Lord and King of our lives, and we can only do that by regularly worshipping Him and spending time in His presence. There are many opportunities for you to attend church during Advent and Christmas and truly worship our Heavenly King. As you draw close to Him may you experience that true heavenly joy! Let his grace and for-giveness give you hope. Let his mercy bring you joy.

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Letter from the Treasurer

Dear Parishioners

The end of the church's financial year is on 31 December 2016, after which date the annual accounts must be prepared and audited. For this reason it is necessary for all parishioners to return all their 2016 envelopes by that date. Any amounts received after December 31, 2016 will be added to the 2017 accounts.



Perhaps some parishioners may have fallen behind in their offerings to the church, so this is an opportunity to make up the shortfall. I urge everyone to do so before the end of December.

Every family is receiving a set of green 2017 envelopes with this magazine. Please do not use these 2017 envelopes until January. A letter also is enclosed with the envelopes stating the amount contributed as Free Will Offering, as Harvest Offering and as contributions to other church funds up to and including 13 November 2016.

I would encourage you to use the FWO envelopes instead of putting cash on the collection plate. By doing so, the church may be able to claim an additional 25% as Gift Aid and your giving to the church would be increased at no additional expense to yourselves. Where appropriate, gifts to the church will also be Gift Aided in order to maximise our income. Although each parishioner now has a number, your offerings will not be published if that is your wish.

A growing number of parishioners contribute by Standing Order. If this method is suitable for you, I strongly recommend it. Simply inform your bank of the amount you wish to give to the church and whether you wish to pay on an annual, monthly or weekly basis. You will need the Cathedral's bank details - these are available in the cathedral office or from me - give those details to your bank and it will look after the payments for you.

Thank you for your co-operation and your continued support for the parish.

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Rev Chris' Graduation

Graduation Day



On Thursday 10th November, I made the familiar journey to Dublin. However, it wasn't for lectures or dissertation supervision, but at long last to graduate from Trinity College Dublin with a Master's in Theology! The new system of training for ordained ministry has been going for a few years now. It's a long journey, not for the faint-hearted! It all began when I spoke to my rector about a possible vocation to ordained ministry. People had been telling me for years it was something I should consider, but I kept pushing it aside. But God is very persistent and hard to ignore. My rector agreed and sent me to the Diocesan Director of Ordinands, a member of clergy with special responsibility for helping people discern whether they are called to ordained ministry and supporting them through the process. He got me onto the one-year Foundation course, a distance learning course in ministry, Biblical studies and sys-

tematic theology. Anyone with experience of distance learning will know the special challenges involved: self-discipline and time management, and a feeling of isolation among them.

I had a very positive interview with Bishop Ken Good towards the end of the Foundation Course, and he sent me to a Bishops' Selection Conference. That was a nervewracking few days of interviews with panels of clergy, lay people and academic staff. It seemed a very long wait those two weeks before Bishop Ken called to say I had been recommended for training at the Church of Ireland Theological Institute in Dublin.

Rev Chris' Graduation


The Master's in Theology programme lasts three years in full-time residential mode. It was very hard to say goodbye to Sarah every Sunday evening and get the bus to Dublin until Thursday or Friday. College life was a mix of spiritual formation, with chapel services twice or three times a day, lectures and seminars, and all the fun and frustrations of communal living.

After the first two years, I was ordained deacon to serve in St Augustine's Church, Londonderry. Part of the week I spent leading services, visiting people in hospital and in their homes, helping to prepare confirmation candidates, and helping with the administrative side of parish life. The rest of the week was devoted to a dissertation. I wrote mine on how to preach on difficult texts about judgment in a pastorally responsible, biblically faithful way.

All that before I was ordained priest here in St Macartin's last September. I feel very grateful for all the Church of Ireland has invested in my training. You might wonder if

Master's level study is really necessary. I've heard both sides of the argument. Personally, I'm glad I got the training I did, because society today tends to ask more questions and not just accept uncritically what the Church says, and I think clergy need to be able to give a credible account of why we believe what we do. Academic study is one way of developing that skill.

I tell you all of this, I suppose, hoping that something I say might encourage someone reading this who is wondering if they might be called to ordained ministry too. I tried to ignore it for a long time, and often doubted that ordination and graduation day would come. But I can say, from experience, that God has a habit of getting His way in the end.



Cathedral Halls

Cathedral Hall work well advanced

The major work of renovating and extending St Macartin's Cathedral Hall is progressing towards completion. The extensive improvement scheme, which will bring great benefits to the parish and wider community, is being funded under the Executive Office's Social Investment Fund. Following a competitive process, Tracey Architects of Londonderry were appointed architects for the scheme, the original plans having been prepared by Robert Brown, Architectural Solutions Ltd, Lisbellaw. R. J. McKelvey Ltd, Castlederg, succeeded in obtaining the contract to carry out the construction work. Work on the site, supervised by Mr Darren McKelvey, director of the company, commenced in May. The external work involved an extension and reroofing of flat roofed area with pitched roofs. The main entrance area has been redesigned to provide for disability and user friendly access to the hall facilities. An attractive reception area has been included in the design. The minor hall has been improved to increase natural lighting and improved insulation and will incorporate new seating arrangements. The main and minor halls will be served by a new stainless steel fully equipped kitchen which will meet the needs of a wide range of catering requirements. The stage area in the main hall is being converted into storage areas with a first floor room on top which will accommodate youth group activities.

The cathedral office will have a separate photocopying room attached. An additional meeting room has been provided to supplement the facilities previously provided by the Hilliard Room. This part of the building will have its own kitchen. The main meeting rooms will have in-built data projection facilities. New toilet facilities have been provided to serve the building.

In the lower car park area, a fine suite of offices, including a meeting room, kitchen and toilet facilities, has been provided for use by the Church of Ireland Diocese of Clogher. The newly renovated and extended building will be complemented by an extended car park, providing an additional thirty car parking spaces. This will be an extremely valuable asset in the island town of Enniskillen. A wide range of

organisations are eagerly awaiting the reopening of these high quality facilities uniquely situated in the centre of the town.


Furnishings

When the contractor leaves the site, the building will need to be furnished appropriately. The intention is that the Minor Hall will be fitted out with suitable seating and tables to serve a range of purposes. The reception area will require soft seating and a literature display stand. The Hilliard Room will need new chairs. The office will need to be properly fitted out with desks and storage facilities. The 'Quiet Room or Prayer Room', located near the Hilliard Room, will need a nice table and suitable seating. All of this will cost a substantial amount of money (approximately £30,000). Financial contributions from parishioners towards this important aspect of the project will be most welcome. It is important that the hall is properly furnished and that it will be a credit to the Parish of St Macartin's. Donations can be earmarked for Cathedral Hall Furnishings.



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



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Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2017



The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is traditionally observed from the 18th to the 25th January – the octave of St. Peter and St. Paul.

There are fifty million Christians in Germany who, traditionally, have mostly belonged to the Roman Catholic Church or one of the Protestant State Churches. Recent developments, particularly

the reception of refugees and asylum seekers, have begun to change this balance and other Christian traditions are finding expression. Whilst that which unites the churches is stronger than that which divides, there are still areas of difference in which the churches remain selfabsorbed or construct new walls. The text from 2 Corinthians announces that God has, in Christ, reconciled the world to himself. The love of Christ compels us to be ambassadors of this reconciliation, which is enacted by dismantling the walls. With the fall of the Berlin Wall, Germany experienced how a seemingly insurmountable wall could be brought down. The fall of this wall is a symbol of hope that, with the love of God, nothing is impossible.

The Bishop of Clogher, The Rt Rev John McDowell says " 'Familiarity breeds contempt' and although it would be unfair to link the proverb with the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, there is no doubt that ecumenical engagement could do with some renewed enthusiasm. Perhaps some of that enthusiasm can be generated by looking back and simply being thankful for all that has been achieved so far- in official commissions and documents, in great symbolic events of mutual respect and recognition, but most of all in local collaboration, which is the true heart beat of ecumenism. Collaborative events are a demonstration to ourselves as much as to the world that wherever Christians meet for worship or any other activity they meet as a family. It is a family which has had its quarrels and reconciliations; a family separated by great distance and by the habits and temperaments of its many members. As in all families there can even be the suspicion that one member is doing something deliberately to annoy another. However, as with all families, its vigour and interest are generated both by what we have in common and by what distinguishes us from one another. Such is family life and the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is that fixed point of family reunion which perhaps we don't always look forward to but are always glad afterwards that we made the effort."

The Enniskillen Service this year will be held in St Macartin's Cathedral at 7.30pm on Thursday 19th January.

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
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Visit to Hillsborough Castle

The service was preceded with a singing masterclass and rehearsal for participating choirs, joining together with Christ Church Cathedral Choir and Christ Church Brass Ensemble. The combined choirs were directed by Ian Keatley, Director of Music at Christ Church, and accompanied by Dr David Bremner, Assistant Organist at the Cathedral. The service was conducted by the Dean of Christ Church, the Very Revd Dermot Dunne, and the preacher was the Archbishop of Dublin, the Most Revd Dr

Michael Jackson.

Cathedral Choral Evensong is essentially a service of reflection - of leaving ourselves open that God may speak to us through the psalms, readings and canticles, which are the core of the service. Worship has been offered at Christ Church for nearly a thousand years. Cathedrals with a great choral tradition draw upon a rich inheritance of music, much of it sung by the choir alone. In the Anglican tradition this music finds its natural setting in the office of Evensong, a combination of the medieval offices of Vespers and Compline. Here beauty in language and music can speak to us of God in a rich and diverse way. The processional hymn was Praise to the Lord, and the *Preces and Responses* were a setting by Richard Ayleward (1626-69). The Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis were settings by Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924), and the anthem was, I was glad when they said unto me by Hubert Parry (1848-1918). The final hymn was O praise ye the Lord.
