The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

The Parish of Enniskillen has just had one of the most important events in 400 years – the production and launch of our new history book by Mr Samuel B Morrow OBE. We are grateful to Sam for his time and effort to put in print and picture all these years



so that we are able to reflect on the past. If it were not for the faithful Christians of generations before us, we would have nothing to record or inherit. The challenge for each one of us is to make sure we hand on that rich Christian heritage, which we have received, to the generations that follow! We are now beginning the season of Advent. The seasons of the church's year are important to us and we should value the annual cycle as we start a new Church year on the first Sunday in December - Advent Sunday. Advent is a time of reflective waiting and preparing for Christmas. The Liturgical colour for the Advent Season is purple, the mood is more sombre and no Gloria is sung in our services. In Advent, we are reminded of God's promise to his people that one would come to break into the darkness and bring light and hope to all. We hear the message delivered by the prophets, by John the Baptist, by the angel visiting Mary. This is a two-fold message of expectant waiting –for the birth of a Messiah and for the time when Christ will return to earth. As we wait, we are called to be ready and to prepare ourselves for the celebrations ahead and that time when Jesus returns as our judge. Our Sunday and Thursday services during Advent will help us in this time of preparation. Then on Christmas Eve we change to a beautifully decorated church, with joyful carols and white furnishings. This signals the excitement of the celebration of the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The seasons in the church's year also remind us that life is never static, that it is always changing, but that underlying this there is one constant –that our God is never changing, ever faithful and always with us. It is this fact that sustains our church community in our life together through the inevitable changes that we face. As we watch the seasons come and go, as we move through the

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
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Advent season into Christmas, as we experience changes in our own lives, our church and our community, may we remember that we have a faithful God, who promises never to leave us or forsake us. For this is the hope that truly will sustain us, and it is this faith and hope that we need to pass on to the generations to follow. If the Christian message of faith and hope depended only on you and on me, would we pass it on? Or would it end abruptly with us? Each one of us has that responsibility to be faithful witnesses in the way we speak and act, not least in showing an example to others to be regular worshippers at church, and to make absolutely certain that St Macartin's Cathedral has hundreds more years of history yet to be written!

There are many opportunities for you to attend church during Advent and Christ-mas and truly worship our Heavenly King. As you draw close to Him may you experience that true Heavenly joy. Let His grace and forgiveness give you hope. Let His mercy bring you joy.





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

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The Beatitudes – a new series

Matthew 5: 1-12 'Blessed are those who mourn'

The Beatitudes, at the beginning of the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5:1-12), present the values of the kingdom of God. In 'Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted' (5:4), Jesus appears to be saying 'Happy are the unhappy'!

It's not wrong for Christians to be sad or grieve, as we can still experience God's blessing ('blessed'). Jesus promises God's comfort for our loss, mourning, pain and



hurt. This is the work of the Holy Spirit into our lives. He is described as the 'Comforter' (John 14:16) ie 'the one who comes alongside us to help'. He assures us of Jesus' presence to share our sadness, make us aware of His love and strengthen us in our sorrows. Jesus has been in this place Himself, when He shed tears at the tomb of His close friend Lazarus (John 11:35).

There is also a godly grief which the Spirit brings into our lives, as we reflect on our messy lives. Peter wept bitterly after denying that he knew Jesus (Matthew 26:75). He makes us aware of our spiritual poverty, including our failures and shortcomings when it comes to loving and serving God. The Holy Spirit is also alongside to assure us of God's forgiveness and cleansing as God's children (Romans 8:16).

The Spirit also helps us to share the Father's broken heart for our suffering world and for the communities of which we are part. Jesus Himself wept over Jerusalem, because its inhabitants failed to see what was happening in their midst (Luke 19:41).

We can live under God's blessing in sadness, as He is able to turn our tears to joy, even though our comfort will only truly be complete in heaven. 'God comforts the disturbed and disturbs the comfortable.'

Meaning:

Being blessed, or at least feeling blessed, is often linked to beatitude. Beatitude inherited its blessedness from the Latin word beatus, meaning both "happy" and "blessed." In the Bible, the Beatitudes are a series of eight blessings, such as "Blessed are those poor in spirit; theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

Next month we will look at the third Beatitude.....


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Psalm

Psalm 4

This evening psalm, often used in Night Prayer, gives us reassuring words to say as we entrust ourselves to sleep. It forms a pair with Psalm 3 and speaks of the betrayal and insult experienced by the psalmist and the foolishness of those who 'seek after false-

It fits David's time as a fugitive hounded by the 'nobles' who turned from him in favour of Saul. It chimes with the life of believers today as we see so much love of 'vain things' - an obsession with that which is empty—in our world. We are surrounded by false promises of satisfaction from sources that cannot deliver.

The test of faith comes when Saul seems to be winning, when sin seems to be paying, when emptiness seems to fill its supplicants with what they need — 'when their corn and wine and oil increase' (v.7). It is in those moments that we are called upon to exercise the strength of faith, believing that God can be trusted to 'lift up the light of [his] countenance upon us' (v.6).

The first dawn of God's light is gladness of heart (v. 7), a deep inner joy that overrides outward difficulties. The fullness of God's light upon us and our world, though, is the promised shalom, the peace of God that penetrates every dimension of human life, putting right that which is wrong and proving that it is the Lord, only, who secures life for humanity.

Our own Christian unity will be discovered not only through showing hospitality to one another, but also through loving encounters with those who do not share our language, culture or faith. In such tempestuous journeys and chance encounters, God's will for his Church and all people comes to fulfilment. As Paul will proclaim in Rome, this salvation of God has been sent to all peoples (see Acts 28:28). All are welcome to this service

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Happy New Year

The Christian faith teaches that a new start is endlessly possible. It is provided by a personal encounter with the risen and living Jesus Christ. He offers us the opportunity and the resources to make a new start, despite all our circumstances or failings.

The Bible records many encouraging examples of people who were able to start again after encountering Jesus. These include a woman caught in adultery who was facing execution by an outraged community, a hated tax collector named Zacchaeus who had been collaborating with the enemy, and Peter, the close friend of Jesus who publicly disowned him.

God's provision of a new start liberates people from the powerful hold that guilt, fear and memories of failure can have over a human. The life, death and resurrection of Jesus have made a way for humans to find




God's forgiveness. A Christian is someone who has accepted God's forgiveness and now has the freedom to reject the old habits of bitterness, anger or revenge, like disposing of a 'shabby old coat'. Many Christians experience this as such a new beginning that they describe it as feeling like a different kind of life.

Forgiveness, however, is not the same as per-

fection. Although many Christians can look back to a specific time at which they made a decision to make a new start as a follower of the way of Jesus Christ, living up to a new way of being is an ongoing struggle. There is a frequent need to revisit and remember the new start. Church services almost always include a point at which worshippers are encouraged to think about recent failures, confess them, and ask for the mercy of God in absolute certainty that He will forgive.

The Bible describes God's promises of mercy as 'new every morning'. It is in the gracious nature of God that mistakes and failures are not a stick to be beaten with, but an opportunity to change into something better.
