



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Letter from the Treasurer

Dear Parishioners,

The end of the church's financial year is 31 December 2020, after which date the annual accounts must be prepared and audited. For this reason it is necessary for all parishioners to return all their 2020 envelopes by that date. Any amounts received after December 31, 2020 will be added to the 2021 accounts.



Perhaps some parishioners may have fallen behind in their offerings to the church, so this letter should serve as a reminder, and an opportunity to make up the shortfall. I urge everyone to do so before the end of December. There is also a number of families who feel no responsibility for the church and do not contribute – hopefully you will re-consider.

Every family is receiving a set of white 2021 envelopes with this magazine. A letter also is enclosed stating the amount contributed by each family as Free Will Offering, as Harvest Offering and as contributions to other church funds up to, and including, 31 October 2020.

You will be aware that we have the added commitment of restoring the cathedral roof this year. Re-roofing the cathedral is a massive project costing approximately £400,000. As part of our fund-raising for the roof we have included twelve additional yellow envelopes in each box – one for each month. I would ask you to use these monthly envelopes as a contribution to the new roof.

I would encourage you to use your FWO envelopes instead of putting cash on the collection plate. By doing so, the church may be able to claim an additional 25% as Gift Aid and your giving to the church would be increased at no additional expense to yourselves. Where appropriate, gifts to the church will be Gift Aided in order to maximise our income. Your offerings will not be published in the Annual Report if that is your wish. A growing number of parishioners contribute by Standing Order. If this method is suitable for you, I strongly recommend it. Simply inform your bank of the amount you wish to give to the church and whether you wish to pay on an annual, monthly or weekly basis. You will need the Cathedral's bank details - these are available in the cathedral office or from me - give those details to your bank and it will look after the payments for you. Thank you for your co-operation and your continued support for the parish.

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The Revd Canon Dr Ian W Ellis has been elected Bishop of Clogher

He was elected by the Episcopal Electoral College for the Diocese of Clogher which met via Zoom on Monday, 9th November. Canon Ellis succeeds the Most Revd John McDowell who was elected Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland by the House of Bishops earlier this year.

The new Bishop-elect is currently rector of Rossorry Parish in the Diocese of Clogher, where he has served since 2015.

Canon Ellis is married to Heather, a HR consultant and they have three grown-up children, Mark, Timothy and Naomi.
After graduating from Queen's University,



Canon Ellis taught Physics in Antrim Grammar School until he entered the ordained ministry, being ordained in 1989 for St Mark's Parish, Armagh, serving as Curate Assistant. From 1991 Canon Ellis served as Rector of Loughgall and Grange for 11 years in the Diocese of Armagh, during this time he was Editor of the Armagh Diocesan Magazine for eight years, a member of Armagh Diocesan Ordinands' Committee, General Synod, Standing Committee, Armagh Diocesan Board of Education and Armagh Diocesan Council.

Canon Ellis is well known for his subsequent role as Secretary to the Church's Board of Education where he served for 13 years, bringing together his experience as a schoolteacher and his time in parochial ministry. He also served as the Church of Ireland's representative on the Transferors' Representative Council and as secretary of that body, and in 2013 he achieved a Doctorate in Education from Queen's University Belfast. Since moving to Rossorry, Canon Ellis has served as clerk of the Cathedral Chapter, a member of Diocesan Council and is currently one of its Clerical Honorary Secretaries. He is a member of the Diocesan Board of Education, a Diocesan Nominator and a member of General Synod. He is a clerical representative on the General Synod Safeguarding Board and the Clogher representative Canon on the chapter of St Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin since 2015. He is a member of the Board of Governors of Enniskillen Royal Grammar School where he is vice-chairman of the Board of Governors and chairman of the Education Committee, in addition to being a governor of Jones Memorial Primary School.

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Archbishop John McDowell said: 'I am delighted to announce the election of Canon Ian Ellis as my successor as Bishop of Clogher. Everyone who knows Canon Ellis will have been impressed by the dedication, pastoral care and intelligence which he has brought to his vocation in the Church and in education. I look forward to welcoming him into the House of Bishops and to arranging for his consecration as soon as is practicable.'

The bishop-elect said: 'I am deeply humbled to be elected today by the Electoral College as Bishop-elect of Clogher and intensely conscious of the honour and responsibility bestowed upon me. I pray that I may fulfil the trust that has been placed in me and I look forward to working with the great team of diocesan clergy and laity. This is a wonderful diocese and Heather and I have been so happy serving here during my ministry as Rector of Rossorry, and I look forward to getting to know the people of the wider diocese in the near future. I pray that God may guide us all to serve him in this part of the Kingdom of God.'

Following the ratification of his election by the House of Bishops, Canon Ellis will be consecrated as a bishop on a date to be determined.

The Dean offers his personal congratulations to Bishop Ian and wishes him every Blessing in the years ahead. This is not only a great appointment for the Diocese of Clogher but for the whole of the Church of Ireland. He also looks forward to enthroning him in the cathedra (the bishop's throne in the cathedral) very soon. Bishop Ian and the Dean have known each other for over 30 years.

The parishioners of St Macartin's Cathedral also send their good wishes to Bishop Ian and look forward to seeing him on many occasions.

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'Hall Together Now' project

When an application was made, under the Office of the First and Deputy First Ministers' Social Investment Fund, for grant aid on the renovation of the cathedral hall, the project was given the title 'Hall Together Now'. This was a catchy title that obviously impressed the funders as the name has stuck. The grant application was successful and attracted generous funding. One of the conditions associated with the offer of grant aid was that a three year post construction evaluation would be carried out to check if the objects of the Social Investment Fund had been met.

The evaluation involved detailed record keeping by the Parish Secretary, Mrs Beth Rennick, and by the Diocesan Office staff. Details of all the events held in the hall were kept over the three year period. The names of the organisations, the attendance, and the number of volunteers involved in organising each event, were recorded. In addition, random surveys were carried out during each quarter asking those in attendance at

functions in the hall to express their satisfaction with the facilities and the reception they received. Respondents were asked to indicate their level of satisfaction with the facilities, how they were treated in the hall, and whether their visit helped them. Throughout the three year survey period not one person surveyed indicated anything other than satisfaction. At the end of each quarter, during the three year period, the information collected was submitted to the Office of the First and Deputy First Minister. Now that the period of evaluation has come to an end the Office has produced the attached summary of the 'Hall Together Now' project. The comparisons given are with the pre scheme usage of the hall. The outcome is most satisfying.

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Cathedral Roof Repair & Repainting Fund

As we embark upon this major undertaking of a £400,000 project to re-roof our beautiful historic cathedral, we are faced with a major problem with the Covid-19 pandemic. Due to the present restrictions, and other restrictions that may arise it will be highly unlikely we will be able to do any fund raising events in the first half of 2021 that would cause people to gather together. That alone will severely affect our cash flow and reduce the ability to reach the certain funding levels at certain stages throughout the year that are necessary in a building project.

To postpone the re-roofing would only cause increased problems and result in increased costs therefore we have no other option but to proceed and trust that the Lord will provide through his people – that is us, the parishioners! We the present generation of worshippers have inherited the most wonderful historic building on a site with 400 years of history, and it falls upon us as our duty to hand it on the generations to come as a beacon of light and witness to the Christian Faith in this town.

We thank all those who have already contributed with lump sums so generously to this fund and would really appreciate it if many more parishioners would help us out by donating to the fund. There are two ways of doing it.

- A lump sum donation
- 12 monthly payments (the envelopes are included with your yearly FWO envelopes)

We are well aware of the real financial struggles and hardship that many are facing with the on-going crisis of Covid 19; the result of this is that giving can often be squeezed and church giving sometimes falls victim to this. Therefore, we really appreciate parishioners' on-going commitment to the work of Almighty God here in Enniskillen.

The Cathedral Roof Repairs (update)

Cathedral restoration project

Work is progressing in preparation for the major works on the cathedral roof and stonework. Chris McCollum and staff have spent time at the cathedral preparing plans and specifications for the work to be undertaken. When the plans and specifications are finalised they will be submitted to Building Control for approval. Tenders will then be invited from competent contractors to undertake the specified work within given timescales. Chris McCollum and the select vestry will have to be satisfied that the appointed contractor has the nec-



essary skills and resources to undertake the work. If all goes to plan it should be possible to award the contract for the work during January 2021. Work on site should start around early February and progress during the spring and summer months. However, it is difficult, especially during the present pandemic, to be precise about timing of the various operations but it is hoped that the work including internal redecoration, should be completed in time for the 400 year celebrations by Easter 2022.

Special skill will be required when replacing the copper gutters with lead.

Hopefully, the cathedral will be weatherproof throughout the period when the work is being carried out and that acts of worship within the cathedral will continue as normal. Have you a favourites bible verse/hymn?



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


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The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2021

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is traditionally observed from the 18th – 25th January and has been prepared by the Monastic Community of Grand-champ in Switzerland. The theme that was chosen, "Abide in my love and you shall bear much fruit", is based on John 15:1-17 and expresses Grandchamp Community's vocation to prayer, reconciliation and unity in the Church and the human family.

The Grandchamp Community has its origins in Europe in the 1930s, when a group of women of the Reformed tradition sought to rediscover the importance of silence and listening to the Word of God. Today



the community has fifty sisters, all women from different generations, Church traditions, countries and continents.

Jesus said to the disciples, "abide in my love" (Jn 15:9). He abides in the love of the Father (Jn 15:10) and desires nothing other than to share this love with us: "I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father" (Jn 15:15b). Grafted into the vine, which is Jesus himself, the Father becomes our vinedresser who prunes us to make us grow. This describes what happens in prayer. The Father is the centre of our lives, who centres our lives. He prunes us and makes us whole, and whole human beings give glory to the Father. Abiding in Christ is an inner attitude that takes root in us over time. It demands space to grow. It can be overtaken by the struggle for the necessities of life and it is threatened by the distractions, noise, activity and the challenges of life. We live in a time that is both troubling and magnificent, an often dangerous time where we are challenged by pandemics, wars, violence, poverty, ractive and dispare to the proof of the pandemics.

time where we are challenged by pandemics, wars, violence, poverty, racism and climate change. Yet as Christians seeking reconciliation, justice and peace, we also know the full value of a spiritual life, have an immense responsibility and must realize it, unite and help each other create forces of calmness, refuges of peace, vital centres where the silence of people calls on the creative word of God. Spirituality and solidarity are inseparably linked. Abiding in Christ, we receive the strength and wisdom to act against structures of injustice and oppression, to fully recognize ourselves as brothers and sisters in humanity, and to be creators of a new way of living, with respect for and communion with all of creation.

On going to print we do not have any details of the service in Enniskillen which will depend very much on the circumstances and restrictions in place at the time.

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The Beatitudes

Matthew 5:1-12

Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.' (Matthew 5:10).

Somebody once described a Christian as one who is 'completely fearless, continually cheerful and constantly in trouble.' Living the life that Jesus presents in the Beatitudes

will not necessarily make us

universally popular. We must be prepared for opposition, insults and ridicule or even worse. Of course, persecution is the daily experience for Christians in many parts of our world today.

Jesus did not tell us to seek persecution, but He did say that when it comes, we should regard it as a blessing:

Firstly, because we are identifying with Jesus: If we identify as fully as we can with Jesus, then we will experience suffering like

Him. It is 'because of me' (v11) we are opposed or criticised.

Secondly, it shows our faith is gen- uine: To suffer for our faith is typical of God people, 'for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.' (v12).

Thirdly, because of our reward in





heaven: we will not lose out in the future, as Jesus reminds us that 'great is your reward in heaven' (v12).

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Psalm

Psalm 46

To say that we are living in uncertain times is an understatement! Psalm 46 speaks into our anxiety and fear, just as it did to Israel originally. At this time, we must focus on God, who alone can deliver us in such times.





He is our refuge: 'God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble.' (1). In the midst of our difficulties, God promises Himself to be our refuge, strength and help. A 'refuge' is a place of trust, where God promises to protect us. When the whole world is turned upside


down, we can come to Him without fear.

He is our resource: 'There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God, the holy place where the Most High dwells.' (4,5). Jerusalem was able to withstand enemy attack, because of the water that resourced it. For us, this is a picture of the presence of God's Spirit, who resources us when we are under pressure. This psalm promises that God's is with is in all our troubles on a daily basis: 'The Lord Almighty is with us...' (7,11).

He is our ruler: 'He says, 'Be still, and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth.' (10). When we consider

all that God has done in the past, we can see the way in which He has worked among us to provide, protect, and deliver us. We are called to 'cease fighting' God and surrender our lives to God.

Let us worship Him, as we let go fear and as we depend on Him in this current time of crisis.
