The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

The New Year begins with the season of Epiphany. The term 'epiphany' means "to show" or "to make known" or even "to reveal." It remembers the coming of the wise men bringing gifts to visit the Christ child, who by so doing, "reveal" Jesus to the world



as Lord and King. But scripture doesn't tell us who they were or how many of them came. We do not know why, but I would suggest that all of this detail is left out of the picture in order that the full emphasis may be placed on the one thing that is central to this story, namely their statement '**we have come to worship**'. That is the main point of this particular story as St Matthew tells it to us – '**we have come to worship**'. The challenge for us today, is whether we will be wise men and women. I believe that wise men and women still seek Him, wise men and women still serve Him, and wise men and women still worship Him!

Wise men and women still seek Him.

This year we had record breaking attendance at all our Christmas Services, but as always there is room for improvement! For those who do not come - we cannot drag them out - it has got to be voluntary, but isn't it sad that some people have no desire to worship! Well it was no different 2000 years ago. The Apostle John says (The 9th Lesson at our Carol services) that, 'Jesus came to his own but his own did not receive him'. Literally, he is saying that Jesus came into this world that He had specially prepared for Himself. He came into the world He had created, walked the land He made and came to the people He had chosen as his special people, and He was rejected. However, the good news is that St John went on to say 'that to as many as received him he gave the right to be his sons and daughters'. Many out there are seeking for something to fill the void in their lives. There are lots of ways to fill that feeling of emptiness, and many turn to all the wrong means, but there is only one way to fill that void in a way that will last. God sent Jesus to fill that void. He came to earth as a man, lived a perfect life, died for our sins and rose from the dead.

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He offers forgiveness, fulfilment and peace and happiness. If only people would take time to seek after it and find it. It is important for us as Christians that we continue to seek him, to know him each day of our lives, and that we have that forgiveness, fulfilment and peace and happiness. We need to realise that all of us need help in this, and as we begin a new year we need to have a special emphasis on seeking to know God in a greater way and continue to grow in our relationship with God all through the year.

Wise men and women still serve Him.

Are we faithfully serving Him? What has He called us to do? I don't claim to know specifically, but I do know that serving God involves serving others. There are a lotsof opportunities to serve others. We are called to serve God by doing acts of kindness to those around us. We are called to give time to serving God and others either through our church or other avenues of service. God blesses those who serve him!

Wise men and women still worship Him.

The wise men brought with them expensive gifts fit for a king. They brought gold, a gift of wealth for royalty, frankincense, a gift for a man living a hard-working life, and myrrh, a gift suited for one's burial. They brought gifts, expensive gifts, because they knew they were going to worship a king. Nothing was too much for the Glory of God - do we think the same when we fill our envelopes on a Sunday Morning? Are you giving generously, extravagantly to God's work? Giving is an act of worship. As we come to the start of a year, I want to simply ask you whether or not you are giving gifts to your church that are sacrificial and worthy to be given to the one born a King? In faith the Wise Men gave gifts to a baby. In faith we give gifts to our Risen Lord.

My prayer for us is that we will be a church of wise men and women, **seeking him, serving him and worshipping him** as he leads us every day to become more and more a growing family of believers being transformed to wholeness and joy. Every blessing for 2020.

Programme of Safety Checks of Headstones and Memorials

Fermanagh and Omagh District Council is undertaking a programme of safety checks of headstones and memorials in its five operational cemeteries at Fintona, Greenhill and Dublin Road,, Omagh and Cross and Breandrum, Enniskillen. The inspections began in December 2019 and will include a visual inspection and a physical hand test to check the stability of a memorial or headstone. If a headstone or memorial is deemed unstable the Council will contact the propri-

etor of the right of burial to advise them that remedial works are required to make it permanently safe. If action is not taken in the specified time-frame, the Council will as a temporary measure, make the memorial safe. 



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Ash Wednesday and Lent

Each year, Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent and is always forty six days before Easter Sunday. Lent is a forty day season (not counting Sundays) marked by repentance, fasting, reflection, and ultimately celebration. The forty day period represents Christ's time of temptation in the wilderness, where he fasted and where Satan tempted him. Lent asks believers to set aside a time each year for similar fasting, marking an intentional season of focus on Christ's life, ministry, sacrifice, and resurrection.

Ash Wednesday starts Lent by focusing the Christian's heart on repentance and prayer, usually through personal and communal confession.



Lent – a good time to deepen your prayer life

Lent is a time to take stock of ourselves spiritually. This includes setting aside extra time for prayer. Here are some helpful things to remember as you settle down to it:

People have been praying since Adam had a grandson named Enosh. The Bible tells us (Genesis 4:26) that it was during his days when 'men began to call on the name of the Lord'. They have been doing it ever since.

People have had their prayers answered by God since Genesis, too. But if you want to read some beautiful prayers – and answers to them, browse through the Psalms. Again and again the psalmist writes: "the Lord heard my cry".

So – what do you need to bring to prayer? Just the tiniest amount of faith that God is even there.... Jesus assures us that even faith as big as a tiny mustard seed will be effective.

What gives you the right to come before Almighty God? Jesus does. The Bible is clear that "there is one mediator between God and men, the man Jesus Christ". (1 Timothy 2:5)

The Bible makes clear that God does not stand on ceremony – in fact, He prefers our personal, spontaneous prayers. Jesus was very matter of fact about it: "When you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you." (Matthew 6:6)

The Bible assures us that prayer will bring us good things: "we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need". (Hebrews 4:16)


Above all, prayer must be made with a pure heart. "If I had cherished sin in my heart, the Lord would not have listened." (Psalm 66:18) That simply means that if you know you are doing something wrong, and intend to keep right on doing it, don't waste your time praying.

Finally, what can be the results of your prayers this Lent? Well, here are seven, for starters....

- 1. Joy and deep happiness. (John 16:24)
- 2. Relief from your worry, stress and tension (Philippians 4:6,7)
- 3. Wisdom and more mental clarity (James 1:5,6)
- 4. Protection and deliverance from temptations (Matthew 26:41)
- 5. An ability to share the Good News of Jesus to other people (Matthew 9:38)
- 6. Strength to persevere when you feel under spiritual attack (Ephesians 6:18)
- 7. A growing thankfulness to God, who is worthy of all glory (Revelation 4:11)


We begin at 11am each week in Church and leave for Sunday Lights and Sunday Lights Café during the service. Family Services are important and we encourage the whole family to come and worship together.



24th February @ 7.30pm!





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The Beatitudes

Matthew 5:1-12 'Blessed are the meek'


Jesus calls those who live for His kingdom to demonstrate His character: 'Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.' (5:5). Meekness can come over as being 'weak or feeble', hence 'Gentle Jesus, meek and mild.' However, the Greek word means being tamed: 'Blessed are those who are tamed, under control.' The picture is that of a horse brought under control: strength under submission.



Meekness begins with an honest view of ourselves, where we don't have to worry about what others think of us, but trust in what God is able to do in us. Moses is described as 'very meek, more than all men that were on the face of the earth' (Numbers 12:3, RSV). Moses was certainly not a weak leader, but he submitted to God's plans for his life. Meekness accepts what comes, even if it hurts, knowing that it's for our good.

A meek person will tame themselves to listen to the promptings of the Holy Spirit, who shows us how to respond in any situation practically and prayerfully. It means being careful about how we respond to those who provoke us by not being angry or striking out. When we encounter difficult situations or people who wind us up, are we prepared to pray before speaking? We should not be out of control, but under God's control!

Let's not forget the promise of this beatitude, that the meek person will 'inherit the earth.' Those who are prepared to let go their rights in this world, will be made infinitely rich in the future.




'The meek man knows at the same time that he is in the sight of God of more importance than angels. In himself, nothing; in God, everything. That is his motto.' (AW Tozer).

Psalm



Psalm 116

'I love the Lord, for he has heard the voice of my supplication.' (v. 1)

'I was brought very low and he saved me' (v.5) The translation of verse 5 says it all in words of one syllable. This is the psalm for anyone who has been

brought 'low', brought

even to the brink of death and then, against the odds, and by sheer grace, restored. Everything is different after that. You look at life as one who could have been dead. Each new day dawns as an unexpected bonus, and all you do that day, all you receive, and all you give, comes as a gracious and unexpected ex-



tra. Recovery after trauma is strangely liberating; there is a lightness and freedom, a sense of free over-abundance, and this lovely psalm is full of it. Even if we have not come so close to death, this psalm may bless us with a helpful memento mori.

When you have received a grace you can't possibly repay, the specifics and calculations of debt fall away and every act is graced with gratitude. How shall I repay? 'I will lift up the cup of salvation' (v. 11). Whatever temple ritual or cultic gesture that verse first pointed to, for the Christian reader now it rightly points to the mystery of that communion to which love bids us welcome. We cannot repay our host, but all we need do to make him happy is take up the cup of salvation, share the feast, sit and eat.

What reward shall I give unto the Lord : for all the benefits that he hath done unto me?

I will receive the cup of salvation : and call upon the Name of the Lord.

I will pay my vows now in the presence of all his people : right dear in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints.


Behold, O Lord, how that I am thy servant : I am thy servant, and the son of thine handmaid; thou hast broken my bonds in sunder. I will offer to thee the sacrifice of thanksgiving : and will call upon the Name of the Lord.


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Prayer Books

Mothers' Union All-Ireland President to visit Enniskillen Cathedral on Sunday 9th February for Morning Prayer



June Butler was recently elected All-Ireland President of the Mothers' Union. Before that, she was, for nine years, assistant chief electoral officer for Northern Ireland. She was married to Kevin for almost 40 years until his death in 2017. She was brought up on a farm outside Donaghadee. After her post-primary education at Regent House, she obtained

a degree in English at the then new University of Ulster in Coleraine. Subsequently, for 37 years, she held various full-time posts in the public sector, in agriculture, housing, training, educational research and elections, eventually leaving in 2009 after nine years as assistant chief electoral officer for Northern Ireland. She was then appointed the diocesan secretary of the two Church of Ireland dioceses of Connor and Down and Dromore, and served in that role until she retired at the end of 2016. Now taking on the role of All-Ireland President of the Mothers' Union.

Speaking of her election June said: "Mothers' Union is a member-led organisation and I feel both humbled and privileged to have been elected by members throughout Ireland as their next President. I will try my best, with God's guidance and with support from all my talented colleagues, to lead Mothers' Union in Ireland in a way that will encourage all our members to make a difference in their parishes and in their communities, as well as supporting projects worldwide. As ever, we will focus on the MU aims and objectives which are essentially to support family life in every context." **Parish Lunch**


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What do we do when we doubt our faith?

Can a Christian have doubts? The father in St Mark's Gospel (Mark 9:17-27) speaks for many people. He knew that Jesus could heal his son, but just wasn't quite sure *if* He would.

Doubt comes in many forms. It may be intellectual, a form of



wrestling with the truth of certain key Christian beliefs like the Virgin Birth or the inerrancy of the Bible. It may be philosophical, a pondering of the problem of evil and why God allows bad things to happen to good people. Sometimes it is spiritual, and doubting whether or not we are saved. Occasionally it is emotional, wondering if we are loveable, if we have any worth or value in God's sight.

Such doubts are painful and debilitating, but true faith does not exclude the possibility of doubt. Indeed, we could say that faith would not be faith if there was not an element of doubt! Often doubt is a way by which we discover the truth in a deeper way as we wrestle honestly with the questions we have. For many it is a way by which faith grows and matures, leading us to a greater understanding of the mystery of God and the reality that with our finite minds we can never understand everything about God or the way in which He works.

Doubt is not the same as unbelief, which is a stubborn refusal to believe what the Bible says to be true. Doubt is more a normal part of faith devel-




opment and is not to be feared, especially if we bring our questions to God. A Methodist minister Dr William Sangster was asked if he ever doubted. "Yes," he replied, "of course I have doubts. But I also doubt my doubts!"
