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The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

As we look back on another difficult year dominated by the pandemic, how should we look forward to 2022 with fresh hope? The apostle Paul writes: 'But one thing I do: forgetting what is behind and



straining towards what is ahead, I press on towards the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenwards in Christ Jesus.' (Philippians 3:13,14).

Firstly, to make a new start, you need to forget the things which are behind. St Paul saw himself as an athlete running for Christ and purposely not looking back. He refused to allow his past difficulties to define who he was. The same can be true of ourselves, as we confess our sins and failures to receive God's forgiveness.

Secondly, we need to focus on the things that lie ahead. The athlete is entirely focused on winning the race and gaining the prize. Like St Paul, we have to be single-minded in making our faith the focus of everything we do. What will it mean to better serve God in our workplace or neighbourhood, or family or friends?

St Paul looked forward to the day when he would stand before God, who would say 'well done, good and faithful servant'. In light of all that God had done through Jesus for him, St Paul wanted to give his very best to God. As we begin a New Year, let us ask ourselves, 'What can I do this year that will help

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me bring glory and honour to God?'

As you read this letter the Season of Epiphany is almost over, and the first celebration of this month is the Feast of Candlemas. That celebrates the Presentation of Christ in the Temple. The date 'set' for Candlemas is the 2nd February each year and it marks the midpoint of winter, halfway between the shortest day and the spring equinox. So, from that date onwards the days begin to get noticeably longer and the nights shorter. It is the day when we celebrate Mary and Joseph taking their baby, Jesus, to the Temple. The custom was set down in Leviticus chapter 12, where the parents presented the child to the Lord, and received a blessing from the priests. It was a picture of the sacrifice of the first-born son, giving him to the Lord.

Your Christmas decorations will by now have been carefully packed away and ready for use next Christmas. The baby Jesus fits very neatly into a lot of homes at Christmas time, but have a think about where you put Jesus after Christmas? Not the figure but the 'real' person. Very often He is easily left in a virtual crib as a baby in the minds of many people, just like the wooden or plastic figure in our attics or under the stairs. If we keep Him as that cute baby boy we miss out on His teaching and miracles, we will fail to understand and engage with His massive love and compassion for each of us on the cross – and most importantly His resurrection. Therefore, we lose the true meaning of life – life in this world and the next! Death is not the end. Not for Him. Not for us, and not for our loved ones who have died in faith!

This new year can we forget the things which are behind? This new year can we focus on the things that lie ahead?


This new year can we live in faith, live in hope, live in love, serving God and all people who are made in the image of God, regardless of difference?

Tribute to the late Bishop Hannon



A parochial nominator for a parish carries heavy responsibilities in the appointment of a rector. I, along with three others, had the privilege of being a nominator for Enniskillen in 1982. Dean Clements, after a very distinguished period of service as rector of Enniskillen, had retired. The nominators had done their homework and had identified the Rev Brian Hannon, rector of Christ Church in Derry, as someone who could carry on the high standard of ministry in Enniskillen. An approach to Rev Brian bore fruit and he and his wife, Maeve, and their three sons, were very happy to come to the south west. I had the privilege of being his first churchwarden. His reputation as a preacher in Christ Church was known to be without equal – his sermons delivered a practical message for daily living. Our parishioners immediately found warmth and guidance from his new leadership and it

was not long until people were saying 'this man will go far'. He gave unfailing attention to the sick and elderly in the parish and his daily visits to hospital gave comfort and encouragement. He had rich musical talents and his rendition of 'Phil the Fluter's Ball', at social functions, brought pleasure to many. His great abilities were soon recognised in the diocese and he was appointed Canon in September 1982 and two years later was made Dean of Clogher.

He was deeply involved in education, being a member of The Fermanagh Protestant Board of Education and a Governor of Portora Royal School. He served the wider education interests as a member and later as chairman of the Western Education and Library Board.

His gifts were not limited to the parish and he served the Church more widely. He was elected as a representative to The World Council of Churches and to that body's Central Committee.

As a former rector, bishop and friend of many he will be sadly missed. The parish community of Enniskillen wishes to express deepest sympathy to Maeve, Desmond, Brendan and Neil, and the wider family circle.

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Cathedral Restoration Project

Re-roofing and repair of weather damaged stonework and associated items on the cathedral have all been completed to a high standard in good time and on budget. The work to be undertaken was specified and supervised by Mr Chris McCollum, historic buildings specialist, and expertly carried out by Mr Harold Graham, contractor, and his team. Now that this major work on the roof has been undertaken to such a high standard it is hoped that further expenditure on this part of the building will not be required for the greater part of the next century.

People with special skills were employed to undertake certain aspects of the work. Stonemasons from Kilkeel undertook the work in restoring stonework that

had deteriorated through age. Right: Kyle Thompson and Jay Morton of S McConnell and Sons Ltd, replacing a section of weather damaged stone stonework at the outside entrance to the Chapter room.

Cleaning of the outside of the windows and fit-



ting secondary glazing was undertaken by a firm from Belfast. The guttering on the rather complex roof structure was undertaken by Mr Gerald Wilson, a lead specialist, from Belfast. All of this work required careful coordination to ensure that tasks were undertaken in a proper order. Much of the responsibility for the day-to-day operations fell to Mr David Hall, Harold Graham's site manager.

Sequence of operations

The first stage of the work was the erection of scaffolding so as to enable the old slates, laths and felt to be removed. When this had been done the opportunity was taken to fit insulation to the ceilings – this should result in a warmer building and reduced heating costs. New roofing felt and laths were then fitted prior to the re-slating process being undertaken.


As the slating progressed, new lead guttering, fabricated on site to meet the needs of the building, replaced the old copper guttering. This process was carried out first on the main roof, followed by similar action on the lower roof over the south aisle and then on the roof over the chapel. The opportunity was taken when designing the lead gutters to provide additional outfalls.

There is now an additional outlet and down pipe half way along each roof. Previously there was only an outlet for rainfall at each end of the roof. The additional outlets should cater for any increase in rainfall intensity that may occur in future.

Stonework

Whilst the roof work was progressing, repairs to the stonework on the pinnacles, windows and at an outside door was being undertaken.

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Cathedral Redecoration

Now that the external restoration of the cathedral has been completed, work can begin on the major project of redecoration. It was important that any structural improvements on the inside should be carried out prior to the redecoration starting. The select vestry decided that access to the main body the church should be improved. A row of pews has therefore been removed at the back of the nave. This creates much



needed room for baptismal parties. It also provides much more greeting space and improves the access for pall bearers at funerals and also for bridal parties. The floor area that has been cleared will be tiled in keeping with the patterns and colours of the tiles on the existing floors.

The advice of Mr Chris McCollum, buildings conservation specialist, was sought regarding the organisation of a painting contract. He advised that Mr Harold Graham, who very successfully executed the restoration contract, should be employed to erect the scaffolding inside the building and carry out any necessary preparation, cleaning, and repair work in preparation for the painters. A contract has been provisionally agreed with Mr Graham. Six painting contractors were invited to tender for the work which will involve the application of a primer coat, two undercoats and a finishing coat. Only three of these contractors submitted quotations - the tender of Ross Scott Painting Contractors from Castlederg has been accepted subject to agreement on a timescale for the work. Needless to say, due to ever increasing prices, the contract figures have exceeded the budget prices by fifty percent.

Colours are very important. Mr McCollum has advised that historically correct colours should be used. In keeping with the age of the building, he has suggested using a shade of white for the ceiling, and a slightly darker shade of white for the walls. He points out that originally the pillars and arches would have been painted to simulate natural sandstone. Consequently, a light mushroom colour has been chosen for these features. He has emphasised that the east wall and that part of the chancel extending to the first arch should be in a strong colour and has suggested a shade of red. Trial panels will be painted before the final colours are chosen.

Hopefully, the work will be completed well in advance of Easter. Whilst the redecoration is taking place in the cathedral services will be held in the cathedral hall. Arrangements have been made to have the services streamed for online viewers from the hall.

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



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Myrtle Irvine wins UK Air Ambulance Volunteer of the Year



I am from Enniskillen in County Fermanagh, married to George and next year we will be celebrating fifty years of married life together. We had five of a family, four sons and one daughter. Sadly though, we lost one of our sons in February 21st 2016. He died suddenly with a heart condition.

On Sat 20th February 2016 we attended a Rotary Club function in a local hotel. The Rotary Club charity, that night was raising funds for Air Ambulance. Most other regions in the UK had an Air Ambulance so it was naturally thought essential to have an Air Ambulance in Northern Ireland. That very night we learnt our son, Alistair had gone in to hospital in England. He had obtained his Dr's. Degree and

worked as a Research Scientist in Rothhamstead Research Institute, Harpenden. The very next morning came the sad news. He was only 37. My husband, George and I decided rather than have wreaths, with donations we would purchase a defibrillator for our local church, Enniskillen Cathedral with all the remainder of the donations going towards the NI Air ambulance.

On the Christmas of 2016 I decided to do something in memory of Alistair. I handmade forty wreaths and sold them, donating £600 to the charity. The grief of losing our son at this stage was very raw, so it was one of my memorable fundraisers that I did with tears in my eyes.

It was good news that in July 2017 the new Air Ambulance for Northern Ireland was launched, alongside a back up Air Ambulance.

The fact that it costs in the region of £5,500 per day in order to keep the Air Ambulance operational made us think of getting a Volunteer Group together. We began asking our friends to help and now have twenty seven volunteers in our Fermanagh Group. This means we can help in the organising of large fundraising events, like the weekend Vintage Car Exhibition in Irvinestown which raised over £19,000

In fact the Air Ambulance are hoping, one day they will be able to mirror large groups like ourselves in the various regions throughout N.I.

Our Fermanagh group have raised around £120,000 so far, despite the interruption of Covid.

We know the Air Ambulance has been tasked over 2600 times since they first began. The Team consists of a doctor and a paramedic which brings urgent medical assistance to the scene of the incident. It takes only twenty five minutes to reach anywhere in Northern Ireland which is very important to us here in the West of the Province.

If we can save other families from going through the grief of losing a loved one then we will continue to be kept motivated in raising funds. I am proud to have won the Award and I am dedicating it, not only to the memory of our son, Alistair but to all those Volunteers in our Group who have lost loved ones too.

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A fresh start for the New Year

Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousand rivers of olive oil? Shall I offer my firstborn for my transgression...? He has shown you, O mortal, what is good, and what does the Lord require of you: To act justly and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God. (Micah 6: 7-8)



A favourite Bible passage, and it is an ideal one for a new year as it sums up in a very simple but helpful way what true religion should be. That makes it a good verse to start the year. The message is simple: God does not want empty promises or lip service, but our real devotion, from our heart.

What does it mean for us?

To act justly – Be honest and open in our dealings with others this year. Be dependable. We should say when things are going wrong and be appreciative when they go well. Be fair in our dealings, whether at home or at work or in church. Keep confidences and never pass on gossip.

To love mercy – Give people the benefit of doubt, do not take advantage of others and do not always criticise or complain. Accept apologies and explanations where we can, and be generous.

To walk humbly – Quietly get on with things. Do not make a big show of what we do. Lastly, we are required to do these things. They are not options or choices but requirements. Like many requirements in the Bible, they are simple to understand, but not always simple to do.






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
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400th Anniversary History Books

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


We all have those times, days, weeks even when there is nothing about our life we like. We can be in a situation where turmoil is unending. We go through the low times



of routine that become wearisome. We look at where we are at and wonder, "How did I get here?" In such times when we move to such dire hopelessness, we want to give up. It just does not seem worth it any longer. Cries for change go unanswered. Some light, any light for that matter, seemingly is lost as we look toward to the future and see absolutely nothing changing. David was in

such a place. He is overwhelmed on every level. Yet in this instance he chooses not to give up on God and he prays for God to bring him into His shelter, His strong tower, His tabernacle, and he desires so greatly to rest and be comforted in His wings.

O set me up upon the rock that is higher than I: for Thou hast been my hope, and a strong tower for me against the enemy. I will dwell in Thy tabernacle for ever: and my trust shall be under the covering of Thy wings. (verse 3,4)




Beginning his prayer in desperation he ends with praise for his God and chooses to honour who He is. He will cling to God's unchanging character and name. He chooses to praise rather than complain in the end.

This is the challenge for each of us. David makes a vow to praise His God every single day. He promises to thank His God and go forward believing He will honour His promise of love. He would praise God through all the hard and good times. This is our challenge no matter what is going on in our lives or how meaningless things have become, or when we feel at a loss. Make it a habit to praise God and say Yes. He is present even in those hard times which we are going through.




