### The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

This month both Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day fall on the same day! The link between the two can be summed up in terms of the nature of real love! Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday, focuses on learning to love God more, as we give Him



space in our lives. This is what Jesus found when He was led into the desert by the Spirit to be tempted by Satan. (Luke 4:1-13).

Jesus was tempted to turn stones into bread. Yet loving God and His word comes before satisfying physical desires.

Satan tempted Jesus to worship him. However, worshipping God is an expression of loving God and serving Him.

Finally, He was tempted to put God to the test, by jumping off the Temple. Real love for God does not put Him to the test, but wants to obey Him. Lent also teaches us how to live out the love of God in practical ways, as we follow Jesus in the in the way of the Cross. We see this clearly demonstrated in the life and death of Saint Valentine.

Valentine was a Christian who demonstrated the importance of sharing God's love with others. We know little about him, except that he was a priest who lived in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Century AD and that he was martyred on 14<sup>th</sup>February.

Rev Dr Edwin James Aiken BSc, MTh, PhD



We extend a very warm welcome to Rev. Edwin James Aiken who has been appointed Curate for St. Macartin's Cathedral Enniskillen from 1st February 2024. The Rev Aiken has a PhD in geography from Queen's University, Belfast as well as postgraduate certificate in Theology, Mission and Ministry and a Master of Theology from Trinity College, Dublin, achieving many academic awards. He is a former leader of Boys' Brigade and youth club and has worked in many spheres of church life, leading various groups and initiatives. A warm welcome is also extended to his wife Alex and young son Orion.

# **Cathedral Family**

#### What did you do before you were ordained?

Before I started ordination training my main work was teaching geography in Bristol University and in Queen's in Belfast. My interests were in Middle East geography, particularly the Holy Land, the history and philosophy of geography, hermeneutics and humanistic thought. I particularly enjoyed meeting students from all around the world, journeying with them through their university experience and caring for them pastorally. I also spent some time working for publishing firms and managed to pick up a bit of post-primary school teacher training along the way.

#### How did you sense God's call to ministry?

My call to ordination was with me for quite some time before I answered. It was quite a gradual and developing sense that I found more fulfilment in my activities with the church than with my secular employment. Opportunities which arose due to a vacancy in my home parish allowed me to take on more and more leadership roles, and from there the momentum built towards a selection conference, formation at the Church of Ireland Theological Institute in Dublin and then ordination.

What are you looking forward to most about coming to Enniskillen? I'm very keen to meet and get to know everyone in the St Macartin's family; to journey with you all as we explore God's love together in the easy and difficult seasons of life; to grow and learn together and to reach out to our community with that love.

## What are your hobbies and interests

I like to relax by reading, walking in the hills, cooking, playing the organ (fairly badly) and spending time with my family. I'm married to Alex and we have a baby son called Orion.

## Do you have a favourite prayer or hymn?

My favourite prayer is the Collect for Ash Wednesday. It says so much about our God's love and mercy, particularly the line 'you hate nothing that you have made', which speaks so powerfully about the allencompassing nature of God's love and care for all people and the whole of creation.

My favourite hymn is 'Jerusalem the Golden', where the writer talks enthusiastically about the Christian hope of the new heaven and earth.

## All Ireland Mothers' Union Holy Communion Service



# The Presentation of Christ in the Temple

In bygone centuries, Christians said their last farewells to the Christmas season on Candlemas, 2ndFebruary. This is exactly 40 days after Christmas Day itself.

In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'.

Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to



the Temple with Jesus, her first male child—to 'present Him to the Lord'. At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Thus, we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple.

So, where does the Candlemas bit come in? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World, and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day. The Church also fell into the custom of blessing the year's supply of candles for the church on this day–hence the name, Candlemas.

The story of how Candlemas began can be found in Luke 2: 22-40. Simeon's great declaration of faith and recognition of who Jesus was is of course found in the Nunc Dimittis, which is embedded in the Office of Evening Prayer in the West. But in medieval times, the Nunc Dimittis was mostly used just on this day, during the distribution of candles before the Eucharist. Only gradually did it win a place in the daily prayer life of the Church.

## **Nunc dimittis**

- 1 Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace: according to thy word.
- 2 For mine eyes have seen: thy salvation;
- 3 Which thou hast prepared:before the face of all people;
- 4 To be a light to lighten the Gentiles: and to be the glory of thy people Israel. Glory be to the Father, and to the Son:

and to the Holy Ghost;

as it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be: world without end. Amen. (Luke 2.29-32)

## Cathedral Bells and Cathedral Clock

### **Automation of the Cathedral bells**

In the Cathedral News, at this time last year, it was indicated that John Taylor and Company, bell founders, had been invited to look at the possibility of automating the bells in the tower and at the same time automating the tower clock. Parishioners and the general public will have noticed that the clock has been stopped at ten minutes to twelve for a long time due to difficulties with the mechanism.



Taylors' representative visited the cathedral and had detailed discussions with representatives of the Cathedral's bell ringing team and of the Select Vestry. An agreement was reached to follow the recommendations of Taylors' representative to install an electrically operated chiming system and clock dial drive motor. This work is in progress as this piece is being written and may well be completed with both systems in operation by the

time you read this.

The new system for the clock has an atomic regulated aerial which should ensure that the clock keeps perfect time and will change from winter to summer time automatically.




In future the bells can be rung automatically according to whatever programme is chosen on the master control panel. The main memory system can store up to 125 different tunes/melodies. The time clock can be set to strike the hours and quarters with a programmable night silence function.

This installation results in the bells and clock mechanisms being updated using the very latest technology. It should be noted that the bells can still be rung manually as before.

This has been a costly development and generous donations have been received towards it. However, there still remains a significant deficit in this account and any further donations would be most welcome.

# Ash Wednesday and Lent


Lent serves as a time of preparation in the run-up to Easter and is observed from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday. In many churches the bright colours which followed Christmas will be replaced by the more somber colour of purple, and it is the custom to move flowers (during Holy Week) and to choose hymns which also reflect the season. On Easter day the brightness of the flowers, the hymns and alleluia will be re-instated, thus



adding to the joy and celebration of the day. Lasting forty days, many Christians draw inspiration from the account of Jesus being tempted in the desert, where for forty days Jesus, 'full of the Holy Spirit', was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing and at the end of the time 'was hungry'. For Jesus, this time in the desert immediately pre-fixed what is seen as the start of His ministry, it was for Him, a time of preparation. Lent should not be viewed as a legalistic or compulsory act, rather as a fantastic opportunity to set time apart for spiritual cleansing, renewal, and preparation. Christians believe that because it was the sin of man that led Jesus to be crucified, Lent should be used as a time to reflect on the significance of Christ's death, both for humanity as a whole and for their own lives. Furthermore, the season should serve as a time of self-examination and confession of sins, of overcoming faults through penance, self-denial from certain items (fasting), of prayer and repentance, and of giving (both financially and in time).

# The Pilgrim Course (What is the Bible and how should we read it)

Pilgrim is a teaching and discipleship resource that helps inquirers and Christians explore what it means to travel through life with Christ. A Christian course for the twenty-first century, Pilgrim offers an approach of participation, not persuasion. Following the practice of the ancient disciplines of biblical reflection and prayer with quotes from the Christian tradition throughout the ages, Pilgrim assumes little or no knowledge of the Christian faith. Individuals or small groups on the journey of discipleship in the Anglican tradition can use Pilgrim at any point.



The Bible: What is it, how was it given to us, and how should we read it? These six sessions combine simple prayer, Bible reflection and time for questions and reflection. By the end of the six sessions, it is hoped that participants will have learned how to make reading the Bible a part of everyday life, with the ability to read, pray, and listen to what God might be saying, allowing the words to change each participant. The course begins in the Hilliard Room, Cathedral Hall, on Tuesday 20th February from 7.30pm – 9.00pm (and fortnightly thereafter). A warm welcome awaits you, and refreshments will be served at each session. We look forward to journeying with you.




# **Daily Reading for Lent**


