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## The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

We have just celebrated the season of Epiphany and later this month we move into the season of Lent. In Epiphany we remember the Magi from the East who followed a star and with great joy found the baby Jesus.

At the start of a New Year, amid the uncertainty of the pandemic, are we asking the same question? The gifts they offered show us how we can find Him in the uncertainty of the coming year: 'they presented Him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.' (Matthew 2: 11).

The gift of gold reflects that the Magi saw in the baby a king, destined to rule over us all. In this coming year we need to remember that Jesus is on the throne, the seat of power and authority in the whole universe. Will we crown Him king of our lives and dedicate all that we are and do to Him?

The gift of frankincense reflects that the visitors saw not just an earthly king, but God in human flesh. Incense symbolises the prayers of God's people and so this gift reminds us that God is worthy of our worship and prayer. Will we offer our praise and prayer, as we seek God to guide us through the uncertainties of this time?

The gift of myrrh reflects that these astrologers saw beyond the baby's birth and life, to His death which would secure life for all. Jesus was offered myrrh on the cross and it was a spice used in His tomb. As we face the sufferings of this New Year, we can be confident that Jesus knows and understands our experience.

The season of Lent is also about finding true and lasting joys. A joy that can be present even in situations of suffering losses. The disciplines of Lent do sound rigorous, but sometimes we need to abstain from the shallow entertainment in life to be able to get to the true happiness. That true happiness can be found in the exciting (even adventurous) purpose God has for our lives, in the loving and caring relationship between God and us and between us and all those he also created in His image regardless of any difference!



So, this season, I invite you to come to church during Lent (in person or join us on-line through our webcam), expecting to find answers you may never have expected to get, to find joy in all - even hard situations, and possibilities for your life you never thought possible!

In this season of Lent 2021, let us celebrate our awesome God, our Cathedral Church Family, and our faith in Christ.

## Church Envelopes


Our FWO envelopes for 2021 were delivered to every home at the beginning of December. If you have not received any, please contact the Cathedral Office. You will be aware that we have the added commitment of restoring the cathedral roof this year. Re-roofing the cathedral is a massive project costing approximately £400,000. If this were to be divided

equally among our contributing families it would be an exorbitant amount each, however we hope that every family will contribute as much as they can afford to see our magnificent building fully restored. I am not asking you to contribute above your means, but what I am asking you to do is to consider what you spent on non-essential items and give accordingly to the church – we know God loves a cheerful giver (2 Corinthians 9:6-7). All of us are well aware of the real financial struggles and hardship that many are facing with the on-going crisis of COVID-19; the result of this is that giving can often be squeezed and church giving sometimes falls victim to this. Therefore, we really appreciate parishioners' on-going commitment to the work of Almighty God here in Enniskillen.

In each box there are twelve additional yellow envelopes – one for each month. They are placed at the start of each month in the hope that more funds are available then. Please give as generously as you can. The white envelopes are the regular weekly envelopes and we very much depend on your generosity in these to keep our day-to-day expenses covered.

If you wish to pay to either the Roof Fund or the regular weekly contributions by Standing Order that can be arranged by contacting the Cathedral Office. Details of all contributions will be recorded in the end of the year Annual Accounts and you can remain anonymous if you so request.





## Prayer Books

## End of Life Care in the Year 2020

Death is never easy to come to terms with, at any stage of life, but this past year has proved to be an exceptionally difficult year in end-of-life ministry, both for the families concerned and myself. In my twenty-two years since ordination, I have witnessed things that I thought would never happen. Praying with the dying by video and seeing someone lying on their death bed surrounded by medical staff all gowned up with masks and visors – how scary that must be for a dying person, and seeing, or maybe only hearing me, not in person, but through some form of technology. How demoralizing that can be for both patient and cleric.

Often, I had to get a member of the medical profession to sign the dying person with the sign of the cross as I prayed the final blessing, committing them into God's eternal care.

We have underestimated, and often taken for granted, the

privilege of being able to be present at bedsides, to touch a person, to hold their hand and to comfort them in their hour of need. Likewise, being able to put one's arms around a grieving family member is now also denied by this deadly virus, that has stripped us of many things that we once took for granted.

Words often fail to express sympathy to grieving family members, and many people do not know what to say. And what do you say to those immediately affected? What we used to do was just to be there to support those greatest affected, to forget about words if necessary and to just offer a shoulder to lean on or to cry on. Very often words do not matter anyway - just being there is what counts – even that is now not possible with social distancing.

This past year has been a year like no other. Even arranging funerals by telephone, not meeting close relatives until they arrive at the grave side and even then, it has to be a 'nod of sympathy' at a distance.

How I, and many other clergy long to return to the role we were ordained to fulfill by being able to offer a caring pastoral and priestly ministry.

## Cathedral Restoration Project

As pointed out in earlier features, McCollum Construction, led by Mr Chris McCollum, has been appointed to plan and supervise this major project. Progress has been slower than planned due to the firm's staff absences due to Covid-19. However, the detailed drawings required by Building Control have now been completed and submitted. This is an important first step in the approval process required for the work.

It is hoped that invitations to tender, together with detailed specifications of the work involved, will be issued to selected contractors during February. Work will therefore not start until March at the very earliest. It will be most important that a contractor with the right skills is appointed for this important work.

Complex scaffolding arrangements will be required for the cathedral's complex roof structure. This will be arranged in such a way that it will not interfere with access to the cathedral which will be available for worship



Access will be maintained during the work.


Health and Safety aspects will be major considerations for Mr McCollum and the contractor. The Cathedral's insurance company will be informed in advance of commencement of the work.

Despite the initial delay, it is still the intention to have the external work and the internal redecoration completed in time for major celebrations of the cathedral's 400 year history during 2022.

## Ash Wednesday and Lent



Each year, Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent and is always forty six days before Easter Sunday. Lent is a forty day season (not counting Sundays) marked by repentance, fasting, reflection, and ultimately celebration. The forty day period represents Christ's time of temptation in the wilderness, where he fasted and where Satan tempted him. Lent asks believers to set aside a time each year for similar fasting, marking an intentional season of focus on Christ's life, ministry, sacrifice and resurrection.

Ash Wednesday starts Lent by focusing the Christian's heart on repentance and prayer, usually through personal and communal confession.





## Lent

Lent serves as a time of preparation in the run-up to Easter and is observed from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday. In many churches the bright colours which followed Christmas will be replaced by the more sombre colour of purple, and it is the custom to remove flowers (during Holy Week) and to choose hymns which also reflect the season. On Easter day the brightness of the flowers, the hymns and alleluia will be re-instated, thus adding to the joy and celebration of the day.



Lasting forty days, many Christians draw inspiration from the account of Jesus being tempted in the desert, where for forty days Jesus, 'full of the Holy Spirit', was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing and at the end of the time 'was hungry'. For Jesus, this time in the desert immediately pre-fixed what is seen as the start of His ministry. It was for Him, a time of preparation. Lent should not be viewed as a legalistic or compulsory act, rather as a fantastic opportunity to set time apart for spiritual cleansing, renewal, and preparation. Christians believe that because it was the sin of man that led Jesus to be crucified, Lent should be used as a time to reflect on the significance of Christ's death, both for humanity as a whole and for their own lives. Furthermore, the season should serve as a time of self-examination and confession of sins, of overcoming faults through penance, self-denial from certain items (fasting), of prayer and repentance, and of giving (both financially and in time).

## Prayer

Almighty God, You promise to hear us when we come to you in prayer. We so need Your listening ear at this time as the pandemic continues. When we are afraid, or lonely, or grieving, or in despair, help us to trust You and to know that You are with us in the middle of it all, sustaining us. You are not social-distancing, You are very, very close, full of love and compassion. We pray for our NHS and ask for Your special strength and protection for all staff. Thank you for the hope which the vaccines bring. Most of all thank You for the hope which Jesus brings. This earthly life is a whisper in the light of eternity and Jesus is the key to that eternal life. Thank You, Father, for meeting all our needs in Jesus. Amen.

**Have you a favourite bible verse/hymn?**


My favourite verse is Ephesians 4:32 "Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you."

(Between 3rd December 2020 and 3rd January 2021 there were approximately 5,900 visits) On YouTube, there were 56,591 views in 2020, (9400 hours) though that only dates from Easter. Easter Sunday, where only the Dean and Jane were present had 1702 views. The most popular video of the year was the funeral of Shirley Rowland in November (6405). Remembrance Sunday has 5150 despite technical difficulties on the day. In December the most popular video was the wedding of Amy Marshall and Michael Hall (2708) followed by the Carol Service (916). Christmas Eve evening was 396 and Christmas morning was 391. The number of live viewers each week is currently between 100 and 150 but during severe lockdown restrictions there were around 300. Interestingly, views of recordings afterwards far outweigh the live ones. Most range between 400 and 800 for normal services but occasionally go well over 1200. Viewers watched 502,912 minutes in 2020.

## Streaming

With the introduction of our webcam to stream our services we want to make parishioners aware that at some stage you may be on camera during the service. This could be either in the pew or in the line-up to receive Holy Communion. If anyone has any issues with this please speak to the Dean as there are 'blind spots' in the cathedral that the camera does not see and Holy Communion can be taken down to you in your seat.



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## Renewal of Car Park Fobs

We wish to remind parishioners who use the car park that their fobs need to be renewed now. Fobs cost £25 per year. Thank you to those who have already renewed and for using the car park responsibly.





## Overcoming Disappointment

**'We must accept finite disappointment, but never lose infinite hope.'** (Martin Luther King, Jr).

During this current pandemic, one of the dominant emotions is disappointment. It comes out of our expectations of life, even as people of faith. The life story that we adopt for ourselves is that life should be long and healthy; we can be-




come anything we want, and we have perfect families, homes, holidays and retirement! No wonder we are disappointed when things do not work out like this, especially during the pandemic.

Jesus tells the story of a wealthy farmer, living the good life (Luke: 12:13-21), when God says: 'You fool! This very night your life will be demanded from you. Then who will get what you have prepared for yourself?' It is a very modern story, as this farmer's expectations of the future took no account of death or God. Like death, there are unexpected moments that interrupt our life story, including illness, redundancy, divorce, or the pandemic.

If we pay more attention to how Covid upsets us, we can discern where we have set our hearts. What life story are we really living for? What are our expectations for work, family and friends, health, God or church? At the end of His parable, Jesus offers this challenge: '*This is how it will be with whoever stores up things for themselves but is not rich toward God.*' (Verse 21). At the beginning of a New Year, are we ready to align our story more to God's story for us? Reflect on Jesus' parable, asking how God can be at the heart of our life story.

What words would we like to see written on our gravestone when we die, describing the way that we have lived our life? With God's help, those words can reflect our life today!

## Psalm



*'I waited patiently for the Lord; he turned to me and heard my cry.'* (Psalm 40:1).

*'Dear God, I pray for patience, and I want it now!'* Most of us can identify with this prayer, especially as we face an uncertain future. Psalm 40:1-3 describes how David waited *patiently* on God (*'I waited, waited for the Lord.'*). Do we also intensively wait on

God?

David speaks of falling into a deep, dark well and sinking deep into the sludge: *'a slimy pit of mud and mire'*. This expresses his desperate helplessness that threatened to take his life. We do not know what David was going through, but in our current situation we can easily identify with him.


David cried out to God, who answered his prayer: *'He lifted me out of the slimy pit, he*

*set my feet on a rock'*. There is a world of difference between quicksand and rock, as God lifts us from desperation to security. Waiting on God is not inactivity, but it means engaging in service to God and others, as we discern His will and accept His wisdom and timing.


In response, David offers praise to God: *'He put a new song in my mouth. Many will see and fear the Lord and put their trust in him.'* His song is an expression of

gratitude and trust in God, who can deliver us from every sort of pit and mire. People of praise never take their life for granted and they are credible witnesses to others, with a personal story of faith to tell.

*'Blessed is the one who trusts in the Lord, who does not look to the proud.'* Whatever our current circumstances, we can confidently turn to God alone for help, as our loving heavenly Father.






