The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

can is my own history. I was born into a family with established roots in the Church of Ireland, and I suppose prior to that established roots in the Anglican Church (Hall an old English surname dating back to 1090). It was



the Church of Ireland which nourished my faith, teaching me the word of God and giving me the fellowship of Christian people to encourage me in love of God and neighbour. Some years later it was the Church of Ireland that gave me the privilege of theological training which taught and equipped me for my life and ministry.

So I am a thoroughly cultural Anglican. I feel comfortable with the language, style, music, customs and structures of Anglican life, and I am greatly indebted to the many Anglicans who, through this form of Christian faith, have contributed so much to my life and training. It was in this context that I was baptised, confirmed and ordained, and in this context I was encouraged to grow and develop in faith.

However, personal history is not enough to maintain one in Anglicanism. That would not even be consistent with Anglicanism itself. I believe in civil and religious liberty (famous words for Orangemen!), and decisions about faith must be made on the basis of the gospel, not on personal culture. Therefore, I am an Anglican now by choice, not only by inheritance, and the choice is one of theology, not culture. I am an Anglican because I feel Anglican theology is an accurate expression of the

Gospel of Jesus Christ, and the Book of Common Prayer is not superimposed over the word of God, but very much reflects what the word of God says. We are a Prayer Book Church! The Prayer Book is a vital resource to help us grow and develop in faith.

The Church of Ireland is not the only way to be Christian—far from it. It is only one of many ways in which our Christian faith can be expressed, however it is the way many of you and myself are accustomed to. Have a read at pages 6, 7 and 8 of this Cathedral News and learn more about your faith, who you are and what you

believe. We hope over the next few editions of this Cathedral News to include an article related to an aspect of the liturgy of The Book of Common Prayer. The

challenge for all of us is how we live and practise that faith. The Church of Ireland regards worship as a priority and provides a context in which people of diverse views can live and worship together. The clergy and leadership of St Macartin's

Cathedral are striving hard to create this context for the parishioners and the people of Enniskillen. We want to reach out to anyone and everyone, especially those who have lapsed, lost their faith or simply given up on church! If you are not already a committed member of our congregation, or not a regular attender, please come and experience what is on offer!

We are disciples of Jesus Christ and we place ourselves as Our Vision states "At the heart of the Community, Strengthening Commitment, Outreach, Worship and Christian Love" to all.

Our Worship

Worship is central to the life of the Church. We have a rich variety of forms of worship through which we hear the Word of God read and preached and we receive the sacraments.

The Church of Ireland in its corporate worship makes use of *The Book of Common Prayer*, which was originally published in 1549 and has subsequently been revised on four occasions, most recently in 2004. Our most common forms of worship are the Holy Communion (or Eucharist) and Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer.


Holy Communion is the central act of worship of the Church of Ireland. We warmly invite all

communicant members of Christian churches to join us at the Lord's Table.

Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer date back to the Reformation when the medieval monastic daily prayer routine was adapted by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer and subsequently adopted by the Church of Ireland.

What we believe





We are disciples of Jesus Christ, worshippers of God the Holy Trinity (Father, Son and Holy Spirit) and subscribers to the Creeds of the early Church.

In keeping with Anglican theology, our beliefs and

practices derive from **Scripture**, **reason and tradition**.

We are **Catholic** in holding all the Christian faith in its fullness and being part of the one worldwide Church of God.

We are **Reformed** in believing that the Church's life should be aligned with Scripture and that the Church should only require its members to believe those doctrines to which Scripture bears witness.

We are disciples of Jesus Christ, worshippers of God the Holy Trinity and subscribers to the Creeds of the early Church.

The Church of Ireland is a member Church of the **Anglican Communion**, a family of independent Churches in full communion with each other and with the See of Canterbury.

We rejoice in the progress on **unity** made by the ecumenical movement and we seek to remove obstacles to full communion between Christians and to gain from the insight and experience of others. We provide a context in which people of diverse views on theology and liturgy can live and worship together.

We regard **worship** as a priority for every Christian. In particular, we see the Holy Communion (the Eucharist) as the main way in which church members celebrate their love for God and for each other and become renewed as the Body of Christ for mission and service.

The Book of Common Prayer is a source of unity within the Church and an expression of a liturgical language, traditional and modern, which over the years has captivated people by its beauty and spiritual power. We see a direct relationship between the language of common prayer and the language of doctrine: the words that church members themselves pray and own become the expression of what the Church itself believes. 
Book of Common Prayer (BCP)

Perhaps contrary to popular belief, the **Book of Common Prayer (BCP)** has not remained unchanged since its first publication during the turmoil of the Reformation in the 16th and 17th centuries. The BCP in English made its first appearance in 1549 with revisions following in 1552, 1559 and 1662. After the disestablishment of the Church of Ireland in 1871, changes were made to the 1662 Prayer Book and a new edition was published in 1878 to reflect the changed times and circumstances of the Church. A further revision was initiated by the General Synod in 1909 and was published in 1926, again with the intention of adapting services 'to the requirements of the present time'. Two alternative forms of Evening Prayer were then added to this revision in 1933 to produce the BCP in use in many churches of the Church of Ireland today.

In 1962 great liturgical changes were underway in all the major Churches of Christendom and in that year the General Synod set up the **Liturgical Advisory Committee (LAC)** to bring forward proposals for a further revision of the services of the Church of Ireland. In their work the LAC gave attention to the use of modern language in worship and the result was the **Alternative Prayer Book (APB)** published in 1984.

In the preface to the APB it was clearly stated:


'This book does not replace the Book of Common Prayer but provides authorized alternative services for use in public worship.'



Continuing this work of modernisation of language and forms of worship, the General Synod passed a number of statutes between 1986 and 1992 providing for alternative or additional forms of service for 'pastoral occasions'. These were gathered together and published as **Alternative Occasional Services (AOS)** in 1993.

In 1997 the General Synod of the Church of Ireland requested the LAC to prepare a new edition of the BCP. This new Book of Common Prayer was to include not only services of the Church handed down through the centuries but also services in contemporary language. Thus the new book would represent the cumulative labours of committee and of synod over many generations.


This new edition of the BCP was published in 2004 is now the only prayer book authorised for use in the Church of Ireland with effect from Trinity Sunday, 6th June, 2004.

Half Term



28th February @7.30pm – St Macartan's Cathedral, Clogher



Breandrum Court Parish Retirement House




The Parish Retirement House at Breandrum Court is vacant and is available to rent.
