The Dean Writes:

400th Anniversary Year - Cathedral History Book



The author
Samuel Boyd Morrow OBE BA graduated from Queen's University in 1939. His Civil Service career was in agriculture, finishing as Fermanagh's County Agricultural Officer. In his last two years, before retirement in 1996, he served as Principal of Enniskillen Agricultural College in addition to his role as County Agricultural Officer. His education in Fermanagh was at Clabby Primary School and then Portora Royal School. In his youth he worshipped in St Margaret's Parish Church, Clabby. He has been a member of Enniskillen parish since 1966 and a member of its select vestry since 1968. He has served periods as churchwarden, glebewarden and has been honorary secretary of the select vestry since 1989.

He has written four other books, two on agricultural matters and two on church history. Those dealing with church affairs are titled: *The Church of Ireland Parishes of Tempo and Clabby – a Shared Heritage*, and: *Clabby on the Map – The Church of Ireland Parish of Clabby and its People*.

The cup presented by Edward Davis in 1525 is still in use as the chalice of Holy Communion in St Macartin's Cathedral. The manuscript in Latin by Thomas, Archbishop of Dublin, is dated 1525. Edward Davis's name: The cup of the Parish Church of Enniskillen, the gift of Edward Davis, Gent., in 1525.

This book, in 312 chapters, records the establishment and development of the Church of Enniskillen and its church, now St Macartin's Cathedral. The church was established as part of the plan for the Plantation of Ulster by the Earl of Down, Lord of Enniskillen, in 1600. The church has since been the seat of many of the most important events in the history of the parish and the city.

Scott Elliott appointed Curate of Limerick Cathedral

Scott Elliott, originally from Lisbellaw, and a member of St. Macartin's Cathedral Parish, Enniskillen, was ordained in St Mary's Cathedral, Limerick Cathedral, Diocese of Tuam, Limerick and Killaloe, on Sunday evening by Bishop Michael Burrows. The preacher was Dean Kenneth Hall from St Macartin's Cathedral.

Scott pursued theological studies at Queen's University, Belfast, before entering ordination training. Following his graduation from Queen's, he worked for several years within the Community Wellbeing Department of Fermanagh and Omagh District Council, where he was engaged in initiatives aimed at supporting local wellbeing and development.

For the past seven years, Scott has served as Parish Reader at St Macartin's Cathedral, Enniskillen, assisting Dean Hall in liturgical and pastoral ministry. During this period, he also provided parish cover for both Inishmacsaint Parish Church and the Clogher Cathedral Group. He is the first ordinand to come from the Cathedral in over 75 years.

Scott commenced training for the ordained ministry at the Church of Ireland Theological Institute in Dublin in September 2022 and as part of his training, he undertook parish placements in the Garrison Group of Parishes, in Rathfarnham Parish, and at Salisbury Cathedral. In his final year, he served his placement in Rossorry Parish Church and also completed a thesis focused on the role of cathedrals in outreach within the Irish context, an area of ministry that he is particularly passionate about. Scott has a special interest in church history, particularly in the field of architecture.

He now looks forward to serving under the guidance of Dean Niall Sloane in Limerick.

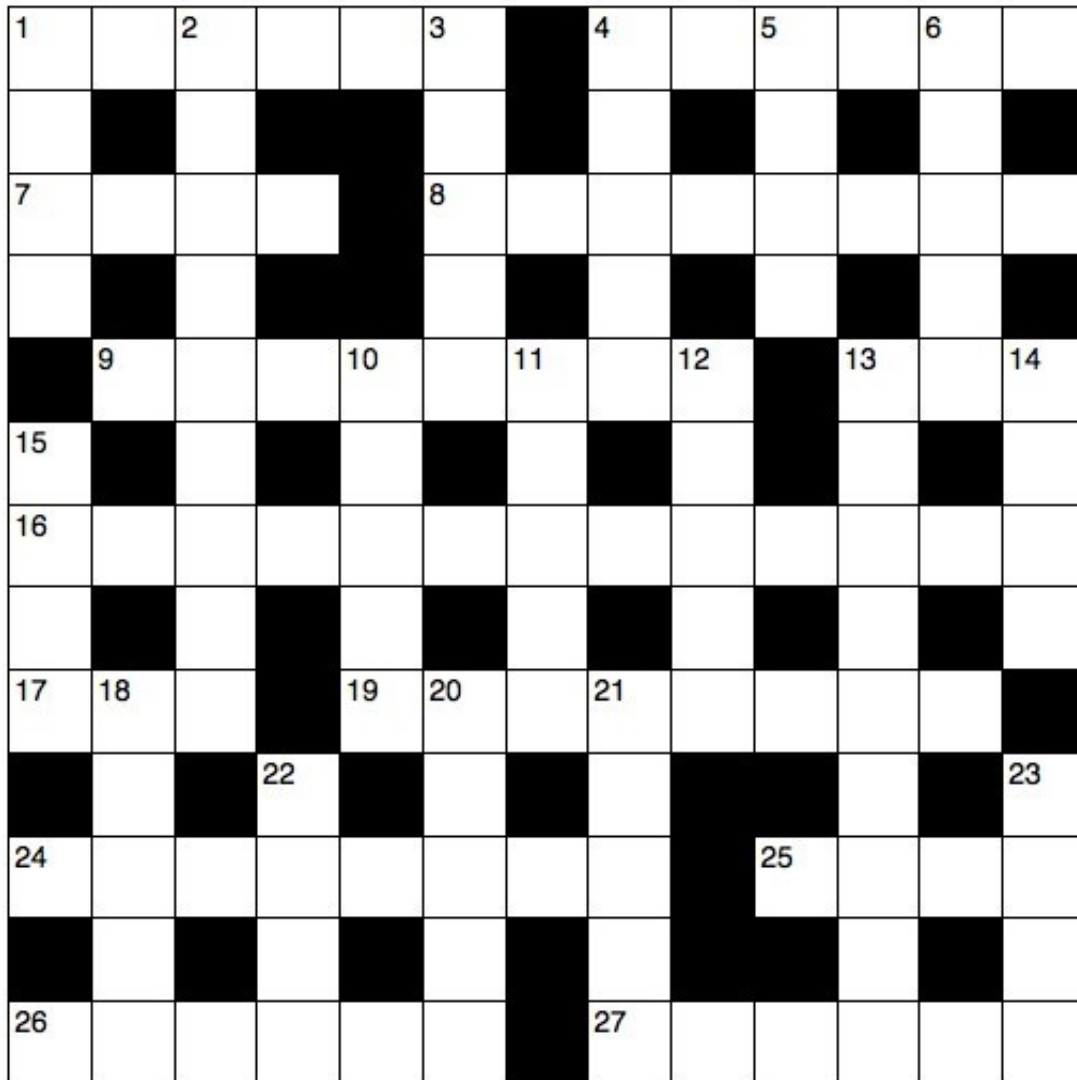

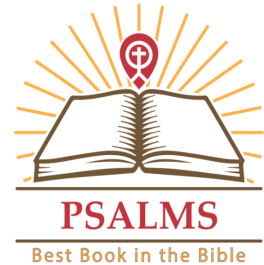


Psalm

Psalm 2

Psalm 2 begins with a vivid portrayal of the nations conspiring against the Lord and The Anointed One. The psalmist asks, 'Why do the nations rage and the peoples plot in vain?' This question resonates deeply as it reflects the constant turmoil and rebellion present in the world. Despite such defiance, the psalm conveys the futility of opposing God's sovereign will. The Lord, seated in the heavens, laughs and scoffs at such rebellion, reaffirming God's supreme authority. As we meditate on this psalm, we are reminded of the eternal kingship of Christ. God declares, 'You are my Son; today I have become your Father' (v. 7), emphasizing the divine relationship and the establishment of Jesus as the eternal King. This revelation offers us hope and assurance that despite earthly unrest, God's plan through Christ will prevail.

In our own lives, Psalm 2 calls us to submit to God's authority and embrace Christ. The psalm concludes with a call to wisdom: "Serve the

Lord with fear and celebrate his rule with trembling" (v. 11). This encourages us to approach God with reverence and joy, acknowledging God's rightful place as King of our hearts and lives. May we find peace and security in God's unwavering sovereignty, trusting that God is in control and that God's purposes will stand.

Knowing Your Cathedral

The Quinton Window

The martyrdom of St Stephen, depicted in the exquisite Quinton Window, serves as a poignant testament to the strength of faith and the ultimate sacrifice for Christ. Stephen, a man 'full of faith and of the Holy Spirit' (Acts 6.5), bore witness to his unwavering belief in Jesus even unto death. The vibrant hues and intricate design of the stained glass captures the essence of his final moments, as he gazed heavenward and saw 'the glory of God, and Jesus standing on the right hand of God' (Acts 7.55). This heavenly vision fortified him, even as he faced the wrath of his persecutors.

The portrayal of St Stephen's martyrdom in stained glass not only memorializes his sacrifice but also inspires us all to hold steadfast in our faith journeys. The light streaming through the coloured glass serves as a reminder that, like Stephen, we too can find strength in divine light and trust in God's eternal presence. In moments of trial, we are called to emulate Stephen's courage, forgiving those who wrong us and entrusting our spirit into the hands of the Almighty, echoing his profound words, 'Lord, do not hold this sin against them' (Acts 7.60).

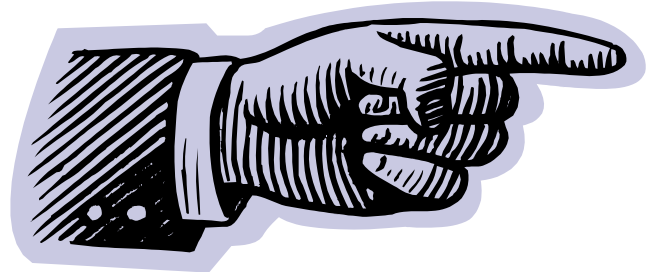

This is a wonderful opportunity to get to know other members of the Cathedral Family. Please add your name to a rota for making the tea!

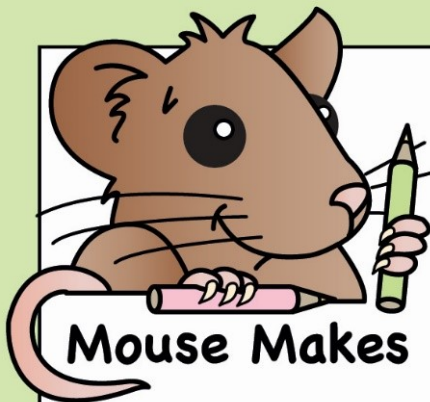
Graveyard Volunteers

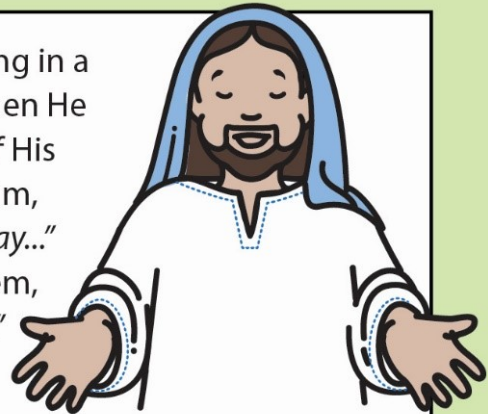
