The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

I cannot believe that it is a quarter of a century since I was Ordained in St Patrick's Cathedral, Armagh, by Archbishop Robin Eames, on the Feast Day of St Barnabas 1998. What an exciting journey it has been - a journey shared with joy for many, but also with great sadness for some.

We are all on a journey— a path of life! Along that roadway, just like an earthy roadway there will be some ups and some downs. Sometimes we will encounter potholes along the way and the unexpected detours caused by road construction. It may sometimes appear that the road is a dead end and we are going nowhere fast, while at other times it will be like a motorway with life flying by at high speed. Every road will have its twists and turns. Every path its unseen dangers and unexpected surprises!

One thing is certain; the road must be travelled by each of us one day at a time. None can rush ahead, nor can we linger where we are. We must all take the journey and walk the path before us. It is not a question of whether we will take the journey, the only decision for us to make is what road will we travel? God has given each one of us the choice as to the path we will take; essentially you and I can choose between two different ways – 'God's Way' or 'My Way'!

The psalmist said, 'You show us the path of life' (Psalm 16:10). God wants to be our guide! God is not indifferent or unresponsive to us. God loves us and



hears us when we cry out for help. God is not aloof or unfriendly turning us away; God has opened His heart to us and calls us to be with Him. God is not angry at us or holding a grudge. God is patient and willing to forgive. God wants to be our guide and lead us in the path of life, but will we let God lead us? Will we accept God's direction for our lives, or do we think we know the path we should follow?

What will we do when we discover that we have gone down the wrong path? Will we continue going that way with the mistaken belief that we can make it right and improve our course? Or will we make a U-turn and change the direction of our life before it is too late? God allows U-turns and that is what confessing of our sins is all about – confessing of our sins and receiving God's forgiveness. That is God's way of setting us upon the right path and if we are on the right pathway of life we are assured that God will travel on that journey with us.



The Dean 25 years Ordained

The Dean grew up in the parish of Termonmaguirke (Carrickmore), Co. Tyrone. He was educated at Royal School Dungannon and prior to his ordination followed a successful career in the business and financial sector. He returned to study in 1995, was ordained for the Church of Ireland in 1998 and then completed a M Phil with University of Dublin (Trinity College) in

Reconciliation Studies. The culmination of his training for the church came with his ordination on June 11th 1998, St Barnabas Day. St Barnabas was an encourager and, on ordination, the Dean adopted the Saint's approach to his ministry. His first appointment as a minister was as Curate of Derryloran Parish (Cookstown) and then for one year as Curate of Drumglass Parish (Dungannon). His first post as rector was the parishes of Brackaville, Donaghendry & Ballyclog (Coalisland & Stewartstown) in the Diocese of Armagh. He was a founder member of both Cookstown & District Clergy Forum and Dungannon & District Clergy Forum (both ecumenical community groups) and continues to be very actively involved in reconciliation work at local level and on a wider basis represents the Church of Ireland on general committees. In 2010 he was Instituted as Rector of Enniskillen and Installed as Dean of Clogher.

Since coming to Enniskillen Dean Hall has immersed himself fully in parish and community development. St Macartin's is both a parish church and a diocesan cathedral and the dean has striven hard to develop both aspects of this role. He is a strong believer in inclusion and endeavours to bring those families on the fringes of the Christian church into the fold. He encourages commitment and this extends to the organisation of the Select Vestry where he introduced a practice of appointing new churchwardens each year rather than in alternate years. This means that an increased number of parishioners are involved in the management of church affairs. He also believes in the importance of music in church worship and has put a substantial effort into developing the choir.

Dean Hall is an elected member of the Fermanagh Protestant Board of Education and a member of the Board of Governors of Portora Royal School and of the Board of Governors of Enniskillen Royal Grammar School. He was the Chaplain of Portora Royal School from 2010 until its merger with the Collegiate. Dean Hall is currently Chaplain at the South West Acute Hospital and served in that role in the Erne Hospital previously. He is an elected member of the Diocesan Council (Clerical Honorary Secretary), Glebe's Committee, Finance Committee and serves as Diocesan Nominator and a Representative on the Electoral College. He travelled with a group from the Church of Ireland to the Church of Kenya in December 2011 to Kajiado Diocese bringing food supplies which were required following the severe drought earlier that year. In October 2014, Dean Hall travelled to visit the Anglican Church in Hong Kong and preached in St John's Cathedral where he delivered a lecture on community relations with reference to the 'Crossing of the Street' by Her Majesty the Queen. Dean Hall devotes an exceptional amount of time to building community life and works very closely with Monsignor Peter O'Reilly on all community matters.

The Flower Festival attracted a large number of visitors from a very wide area in the very fine summer weather. The theme of the Festival was the 'Signs and Sayings in John's Gospel'. Responsibility for arranging the 20 outstanding arrangements rested with members of the Erne Flower Arrangement Society, assisted by two specialists in floral art, Messrs Alan Beatty and James Burnside. Volunteer stewards from the parish were available in the cathedral to give whatever assistance or information required.

A very impressive display at the west porch of the cathedral welcomed visitors with the theme "I am the door". Window displays interpreted a number of important biblical sayings such as: "I am the good shepherd" and the act of "Changing water into wine". At the lectern, a very impressive floral display was associated with Jesus' washing of the disciples' feet. The Crucifixion was depicted in the chancel with an elaborate floral display surrounding a large wooden cross surmounted by a crown of thorns. The central pews had a number of displays ranging from "Healing the blind man" to "Feeding the 5000." Displays in the Regimental Chapel included "I am the bread of life". The Book of Remembrance had a very poignant display featuring Jesus' saying: This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends".

Visitors had the opportunity of having morning coffee, lunch or an evening meal, provided by volunteer ladies from the parish, in the well decorat-





The Battle of Waterloo Day

Battle of Waterloo – 18th June 1815

In St Macartin's Military Chapel you will find the Standards of the 5th Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards. The Dean had the great pleasure of receiving the last one of these standards, one that had been presented to the Regiment by the then Prince Charles, now King Charles and it was the final Standard of the 5th Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards to be laid in our cathedral. That



Standard now placed on the West Wall depicts the battle honours of the regiment dating back to the eighteenth century including Waterloo.

The 6th Inniskillings played a role in just one major action in the battle, but it was an action which was crucial to the outcome of the battle.

They arrived on the battlefield resplendent in newly designed uniforms, issued in 1812. A new helmet was made of black leather, with a peak, mountings and crest made of brass. A flowing horse hair plume reached down the back to protect the nape of the neck. Light grey cloth overalls

and Wellington boots replaced breeches and jack boots. They were issued with a scarlet cloak, lined with white, and their main weapons were a short musket and a heavy sword. In the early afternoon a dangerous situation was developing in the centre of Wellington's line. Some of the allied battalions were shaken by French cannon fire and had begun to waver. Napoleon had launched his main assault of infantry and cavalry, some 20,000 men, who were approaching Wellington's lines. At this crucial moment, Wellington launched two brigades of heavy cavalry, the Union Brigade and the Household Brigade, some 2,500 men and horses. The Union brigade was to attack the French infantry, the Household Brigade the cavalry. The 6th Inniskillings were in the Union Brigade, the other two regiments being 1st Royal Dragoons (English) and 2nd Royal North British Dragoons (Scottish, known as the Scots Greys). Thus the name UNION—Irish, English and Scottish. None of these three regiments had battle experience.

The Union Brigade rode into a hail of bullets and men and horses crashed to the ground, but they cut great swathes through their opponents. The French infantry dissolved into a horde of refugees. Some 2,000 were captured.

Napoleon's major assault had failed. But the cost to the cavalry was high. They burst through into the open and rode on to attack the French artillery. But it was too far. As the blown and scattered horsemen tried to rally and re-group, they were attacked by fresh French cavalry, particularly lancers. The commanding officer of the Union Brigade, General Ponsonby, from Cork, was attacked and killed by lancers. By nightfall, 193 out of 400 Inniskillings were dead or wounded.

A high proportion of the soldiers in many of the regiments in the British army which fought at Waterloo were Irishmen. However, three of the regiments had specifically Irish origins – the 6th (Inniskilling) Dragoons, the 27th (Inniskilling) Regiment of Foot and the 18th Hussars. (We are indebted to Mr Richard Bennett for this information).




