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## The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

Many churches across Northern Ireland have played their part in the recent commemorations to mark the 80th anniversary of Victory in Europe (VE) Day. The commemorations on 8<sup>th</sup> May provided an opportunity to honour the sacrifices made

by those who served in the conflict. They also provided an opportunity to pray for lasting peace, echoing the spirit of unity that defined the end of the Second World War in Europe. Across the UK thousands of church bells, including the bells of St Macartin's Cathedral, rang out at 6.30pm on VE Day. This echoed the bell-ringing that swept across the country in 1945, as churches and cathedrals joined in the national joy and thanksgiving.

We were pleased to have at our service His Majesty's representative for Co. Fermanagh, The Viscount Brookeborough, The Parliamentary Under Secretary of State, representatives of several Consulates and Clerical colleagues from the four main churches. The Chairman of Fermanagh & Omagh District Council, other political representatives and many visitors and friends were also present on that very special occasion.

We gathered in a spirit of unity and remembrance as we celebrated Victory in Europe Day. This special joint service was a testament to our shared faith and commitment to peace, transcending the boundaries of our individual denominations. The service began in St Macartin's Cathedral and ended in St Michael's Church – one service in two buildings.



There are 1133 deaths of serving soldiers from the Second World War (equally Roman Catholic and Protestant) recorded in the Book of Remembrance placed in our Regimental Chapel. This service was an opportunity to reflect on the sacrifices made for our freedom and the hope that unites us all, a time to honour the past but also to strengthen the bonds of fellowship among our diverse communities. The walk together across the street to continue our service, symbolised our journey in faith and our collective resolve for a brighter future.

May the light of love and understanding guide our steps as we embrace one another in celebration and gratitude. Let us continue to pray for lasting peace, echoing the spirit of unity that defined the end of the Second World War in Europe, and as we honour the past, so we renew our commitment to building a more peaceful and just world for all.





### New Deputy Lieutenant



Congratulations are offered to Mr David Nixon on his appointment as a Deputy Lieutenant for County Fermanagh. David is married to Julie and they have two grown up children, Christopher and Emma, both university graduates. David is well known within the parish in his various roles. He served as the Rector's Churchwarden in 2002/2003 and was a member of the Select Vestry for several years. He currently assists with the administration at Sunday Communion services and fulfils the very important role as a member and chairman of the parish's Safeguarding Panel. He is also a member of the Diocese of Clogher Safeguarding Trust which

delivers training on Safeguarding issues to parishes across the diocese. David attended Portora Royal School, graduated from Lancashire University and is a postgraduate of Dundee University. He is currently on the Board of Governors of Enniskillen Royal Grammar School, having previously served on the Portora Board. David's career was in the public service and after retiring from a senior position took over the well-known tourism business, Erne Tours Ltd, which is based on the 'MV Kestrel' at The Round O. The business was previously run by David's younger brother, Stephen, who sadly had to give it up due to ill health.

## Scott Elliott appointed Curate of Limerick Cathedral

Scott Elliott has been a life-long member of St Macartin's Cathedral, being Baptised and Confirmed here, and has become a familiar face to everyone as he assists at all our services. He grew up on the family farm just outside Lisbellaw and is the second eldest of six children to Jim and Linda Elliott (His father was Churchwarden in 2014). I became Rector of the parish the same year as Scott was confirmed, and I have watched him grow and mature both physically and spiritually over this past fifteen years. Scott came to me to discuss ordination just before he completed his A Levels in his final year at school. My advice to him then, and he followed it through, was to start and complete his degree at university and then we would further the conversation. After graduating with a B.Th. from Queen's University Scott was back with me to say he now felt the call to ordination was even stronger.

The Bishop of Clogher, now the Archbishop of Armagh, gave me permission to robe Scott every Sunday to assist with all services. That commenced with the reading of lessons and assisting with the chalice at services of Holy Communion. Scott was a quick learner and soon his remit (with the Bishop's permission) extended to preparing and organising services. His confidence grew week by week and once he was accepted on to the Foundation Course for Ministry he was given even more responsibility in the Cathedral leadership – with the youth, confirmation classes, parish visitations and leading services on a Sunday Morning. Scott was also given authority to celebrate Holy

Communion by Extension in Nursing Homes with a pastoral care role of the residents. After he was accepted for full time ministry he completed three years in the Church of Ireland Theological Institute in Dublin and

## Solar Panels on the Cathedral Hall

Parishioners may have noticed that solar panels have been installed on the cathedral hall roof. The system is now fully operational and is generating electricity. After a competitive tendering process, the contract for installation was awarded by the Select Vestry to a local man, Kenny Brownlee, who owns a specialist solar company, KB Electrical (NI) Ltd. Sunlight on the panels generates direct electrical current which then goes through an inverter converting the electricity into alternating current which is the usable form of electricity. The electricity generated can be used directly or if the amount generated exceeds what is required the excess can be sold into the grid. The main purpose of fitting solar panels was to reduce the cost of electricity used in the hall and at the same time reduce dependence on fossil fuels. The use of fossil fuels contributes to global warming and climate change.

In addition to the solar panels, a battery has also been installed as part of the system. This enables any excess of electricity generated over what is being used in the hall to be stored for later use. It has been estimated that the annual saving in electricity will be £2,560 and the income generated from exported electricity to the grid will be £1,445. This gives a total estimated saving of £4,005 per year. The system should therefore pay for itself in less than six years. An 'app' will be supplied which will enable the actual outputs of the system to be remotely monitored on a daily basis. The fitting of the battery may also offer the potential to buy in electricity during night time at lower than daytime costs.

The battery and other electrical equipment associated with the solar panel installation fit neatly into the existing 'electrical' cupboard which is located beside the kitchen at the side entrance to the hall.



### **Cost of installation**

The complete solar panel installation cost just over £21,000 (including Building Control fees). This works out at almost £500 per panel installed. St Macartin's is following the trend set by the Church of England which has adopted a policy to become Net Zero or free from the use of fossil fuels by 2030. In doing so it recognises that the global climate emergency is a crisis for God's creation and is an injustice.

Any contributions towards the capital cost of this important climate conscious environmental project would be most welcome.

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

## Psalm

### Psalm 5

On an initial reading Psalm five can seem quite daunting for all its brevity. It has much of lamentation about it, an acknowledgement of the wickedness and the fallen state of the world and the psalmist feels beset by enemies and surrounded by danger. It is amid this urgency and tumult that the psalmist calls upon God for help. We learn then that God is a place of refuge and shelter for those in need and that it is God's love that enables us to enter his house. God acting as a place of sanctuary foreshadows Jesus' words in Matthew 23 of wanting to shelter an unruly Jerusalem just as a hen protects its chicks under its wings. The psalmist then asks God to lead him, and the theme of God's ready guidance is returned to throughout the Psalms, most memorably in Psalm 23. Although the psalmist feels endangered by the problems of this world, the promise of God's guidance is there to help navigate him through the uncertainties and God's refuge is extended to all who seek Him. The psalmist also reminds us that God's shelter is not a desolate bunker but rather a place of abundance and joy where all sing with exuberance. The psalm that starts as a cry for help finds its culmination in the reassurance of God's blessing which protects the needy like a shield.

## Knowing Your Cathedral

### The Wilkinson Window

The Wilkinson Memorial Window depicts a moment in the Gospels where Jesus welcomes the little children to him despite the disciples' discouragement, as they think that the children will be a distraction to Jesus' teaching. Jesus transforms this awkward moment of disharmony into one of inclusivity, grace and welcome. Indeed, Jesus uses it to give us a powerful message about the kingdom of God; that the invitation is open to all and that all of us are part of God's family. This moment is often used to illustrate how God treasures those who understand their dependence on God, the humble and the meek. What is not as often discussed is how it also foregrounds the blessing of having a childlike enthusiasm for life. God wants us to have life and have it abundantly and the qualities of having enthusiasm and a sense of wonder and an appreciation for the fullness of life is part of understanding the kingdom of God and living it out in our Christian journey on earth. The verdant grass and the lush foliage and flora of the Wilkinson window underscores the theme of the abundance of life. The beautiful colours of the window's variegated sky have also inspired wonderful artistic creations from some of the congregation in the form of vibrant fibre art and it is in these examples of exploring creativity and its part in embracing the fullness of life that brings us all a little closer to God's kingdom on earth.

He has written four other books, two on agricultural matters and two on church history. Those dealing with church affairs are titled: *The Church of Ireland Parishes of Tempo and Clabby - a Shared Heritage*, and *Clabby on the Map - The Church of Ireland Parish of Clabby and its People*.



## The Longest Yarn 2




A visitor who made a special trip to Wonderwool Wales recently was our own Claire Holmes, leader of St Macartin's Cathedral Knitwits Group. Claire was instrumental in bringing The Longest Yarn to Enniskillen in January and February this year, having previously seen it in Normandy last summer.

Thousands of people from across Ireland and beyond travelled to see the exhibition at St Macartin's Cathedral, giving a great boost to town traders during a traditionally quiet time of the year.
