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The Parish of Enniskillen

The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

As I write this letter the snowdrops in my garden are in bloom and the green shoots of daffodils, tulips and crocuses are bursting through the ground. A sure sign that spring is not far away. Signs of new life are all around us. Also, the season of Lent has just

begun. The modern word "Lent" comes from the Old English word "lencten" meaning – springtime. It is right that Lent comes with the start of spring because Lent culminates with Easter when we celebrate the ultimate example of new life - the resurrection of Jesus.

Lent is a time of preparation as we look forward to Easter and is often a time when people 'give things up', often drink, chocolate or cakes. The idea of giving something up for Lent comes from the Christian tradition of Lent being a time of fasting as we remember Jesus fasting in the wilderness for 40 days as well as part of our preparation for Easter. We generally think of Lent as 40 days, but the period from Ash Wednesday to Holy Saturday is actually 46 days. This is because there are 6 Sundays during that period and in the early Church it was felt to be completely inappropriate to fast on a Sunday as Sunday is the day when we celebrate Jesus' resurrection. This means that if you are giving up something for Lent, you get a break each Sunday as the Sundays between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday are not really part of Lent! Enjoy!

However, I do not really want to think about giving things up for Lent,

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personally I do not. Although if you decide to do this you have my admiration and best wishes. This year I wanted to encourage you to think about doing something positive in Lent. How about taking a copy of our Lenten booklet on the Beatitudes and follow the daily readings, try and attend the mid-week services on a Wednesday night at 7.30pm or the Thursday Holy Communion at 11.00am, and then make every effort to be regular every Sunday?

As well as that you might decide to make a point of visiting or ringing someone who you would not normally see, or you have not spoken to for a while. Taking this on in a thoughtful way could make a huge difference to folks who are lonely. Let us not grow tired of doing good in active charity towards others, giving joyfully and generously, especially to those in most need.

During this Lent, may we practise charity by giving joyfully (2 Cor 9:7). God who "supplies seed to the sower and bread for food" (2 Cor 9:10) enables each of us not only to have food to eat, but also to be generous in doing good to others. Lent is a favourable time to seek out – and not to avoid – those in need; to reach out – and not to ignore – those who need a sympathetic ear and a good word; to visit – and not to abandon – those who are lonely. Let us put into practise our call to do good to all, and take time to love the poor and needy, those abandoned and rejected, those discriminated against and marginalised! Whatever you decide to do or not do during Lent, I hope it is a useful time for you as you think about your relationship with God and prepare for Easter.

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Service for Week of Prayer for Christian Unity held in Enniskillen

A Service for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity took place in the Cathedral Church of St Macartin, Enniskillen, on Wednesday 18th January.

Among those taking part were the Bishop of Clogher, the Right Rev Dr Ian Ellis; the Dean of Clogher, the Very Rev Canon Kenneth Hall; Monsignor Peter O'Reilly of St Michael's Roman Catholic Church and the Rev Lorna Dreaning of Enniskillen Methodist Church.

Also taking part were members of Fermanagh Churches Forum, which represents the main churches in the county.



The preacher was the Rt Rev Trevor Williams, former Bishop of Limerick and Killaloe, who, in his address, said he admired the work of the churches in Enniskillen for Christian unity so clearly demonstrated by the symbolism of Her Majesty The Queen's visit to the town in 2012.

He said they needed those symbolic aspects because of the world of division with people hearing daily of the differences of race, culture, politics and those of different educational social backgrounds. These, he said, often became hostile barriers resulting in violence and bloodshed.

He reminded the congregation that the service was written by the churches of Minneapolis in the US. In May 2020, George Floyd was murdered by a police officer in the US city because of personal and also of institutional racism against Afro Americans. The churches of Minneapolis contributed to the service content "to explore how the work of Christian unity can contribute to the promotion of racial justice across all levels of society."

One of the readings selected for the service was well known, the parable of the Good Samaritan in St Luke's Gospel set on the road from Jerusalem to Jericho.

He said everyone should treat each other as Christians and learn from each other. This is one of the world's greatest needs. Everyone will learn from those who are different.

He went on to discuss how to promote unity between different people. Visiting was one way of promoting unity and hospitality, another was "Always think; who is not in the room? The work of Christian unity is not an

event or a destination, it is a way of living," said Bishop Williams. He appealed to people to find ways in their lives to work for Christian unity and that by doing so they were not only loving their neighbours as themselves but witnessing to a broken, divided and difficult world of a new way, offering a new possibility, a new hope and a new peace. People needed to hear that, he added.

Prayers were offered by representatives of Enniskillen post primary schools under the themes of community relations, victims of violence, the sick, families, economic uncertainty, refugees and endangered people and endangered planet.

The service ended with the singing of "Be thou my vision, O Lord of my heart."



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Donation to Air Ambulance



Local Air Ambulance volunteers were in attendance at the 11.00am service on Sunday 22nd January when a cheque for £6,000 was presented to George Irvine, representing Air Ambulance, being one third of the money raised by the Dean at his pre Christmas 'Sit Out.' George gave a very interesting talk on the work of the Air Ambulance and how they rely entirely on sup-

port from the public and local businesses to fund this vital work.



The previous day, the Dean and local volunteers visited the base in Lisburn where they saw and heard how the Air Ambulance, who work in partnership with the Northern Ireland Ambulance Service, provide Helicopter Emergency support in serious, life threatening situations in Northern Ireland. They can reach anywhere in the province within 25 minutes providing critical care until the patient reaches hospital. If a pa-

tient reaches hospital within 60 minutes (the golden hour) after their injury their chances of surviving are significantly increased. The service costs approximately $\pounds 5,500$ per day to run. The crew consists of the pilot, a doctor and a paramedic and operates 12 hours per day, 365 days of the year.

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Renaissance Chamber Choir Concert Music of Stillness

We were very pleased to welcome the Renaissance Chamber Choir, from Belfast, to the Cathedral on Friday 3rd February. Simon Neill-O'Brien BEM, an acclaimed musician, is the Artistic Director and Conductor. Fifteen year old Senan Sheridan, a classical pianist, was the accompanist. Viscount and Viscountess Brookeborough, Lord and Lady Anthony and local Choral Societies were among those in attendance.



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
Lenten Project – Mission Focus Mothers' Union Overseas Fund

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

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The Church of Ireland

Our Worship

Worship is central to the life of the Church. We have a rich variety of forms of worship through which we hear the Word of God read and preached and we receive the sacraments.

The Church of Ireland in its corporate worship makes use of *The Book of Common Prayer*, which was originally published in 1549 and has subsequently been revised on four occasions, most recently in 2004. Our most common forms of worship are the Holy Communion (or Eucharist) and


Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer.

Holy Communion is the central act of worship of the Church of Ireland. We warmly invite all communicant members of Christian churches to join us at the Lord's Table.

Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer date back to the Reformation when the medieval monastic daily prayer routine was adapted by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer and subsequently adopted by the Church of Ireland.



What we believe



We are disciples of Jesus Christ, worshippers of God the Holy Trinity (Father, Son and Holy Spirit) and subscribers to the Creeds of the early Church.

In keeping with Anglican theology, our beliefs and practices derive from **Scripture**, **reason and tradition**.

We are **Catholic** in holding all the Christian faith in its fullness and being part of the one worldwide Church of God.

We are **Reformed** in believing that the Church's life should be aligned with Scrip-

ture and that the Church should only require its members to believe those doctrines to which Scripture bears witness.

We are disciples of Jesus Christ, worshippers of God the Holy Trinity and subscribers to the Creeds of the early Church.

The Church of Ireland is a member Church of the **Anglican Communion**, a family of independent Churches in full communion with each other and with the See of Canterbury.

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
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The Church of Ireland

We rejoice in the progress on **unity** made by the ecumenical movement and we seek to remove obstacles to full communion between Christians and to gain from the insight and experience of others. We provide a context in which people of diverse views on theology and liturgy can live and worship together. We regard **worship** as a priority for every Christian. In particular, we see the Holy Communion (the Eucharist) as the



main way in which church members celebrate their love for God and for each other and become renewed as the Body of Christ for mission and service.



We regard worship as a priority for every Christian. The Book of Common Prayer is a source of unity within the Church and an expression of a liturgical language, traditional and modern, which over the years has captivated people by its beauty and spiritual power. We see a direct relationship between the language of common prayer and the language of doctrine: the words that church members themselves pray and own become the expression of what the Church itself be-

lieves. We affirm the ancient three-fold ministry of **bishops, priests**

and deacons.

The ordained ministry serves the whole people of God, to facilitate and encourage its members in their worship, and to enable each of

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The Knitwit's Sock Tree



The Knitwits meet on Saturday afternoons in the Cathedral Hall to share and enjoy a love of knitting, crochet and other fibre arts.

In 2022, the Knitwits were asked to participate in 'Knitting the Land' – a cross border, creative, project that brings together women from different communities and traditions along

the Leitrim-Fermanagh border to knit/crochet items representing places that are special to them.

The Knitwits came about because of a desire to make socks. The name 'Macartin' is thought to mean 'son of the Rowan tree'. St Macartin's Cathedral has become the Knitwits' home. 
