## The Dean Writes:

After a cold winter, February eventually gives way to March. March turns into April, and bulbs start to appear and to bloom. Trees begin to bud. A crisp freshness fills the air, and you feel a sense of newness of life. Everything comes to life again. There is seemingly no better time than the energizing season



of spring. As the days become longer. It is a time of transition, of looking forward to summer. And although this season of regeneration may be incredibly refreshing after a long winter, do you fully appreciate spring—and use the time to recharge?

As God's creation comes back to life after dormancy, spring is a great opportunity to enjoy nature's beauty. Also, take time to reflect on God's handiwork. Enjoy the flowers of all sizes, shapes, colours and fragrant scents. There is much about God's creation that can be enjoyed and explored during the spring. In addition to enjoying the outdoors, spring can be a time to prioritize. Spring is naturally when one should think about starting anew.

- Attend our weekly Lenten Services on Wednesdays and Thursdays.

As the Body of Christ, we need to be deeply interconnected so that we can encourage each other in faith; help each other persevere in the face of challenges; broaden and deepen our understanding of the Christian life, so that we can live the Gospel more faithfully. The promise that carries us from Christmas into Lent is that God changes hearts; that God forgives; that God renews every aspect of our life. As one of our Collects state:

'Almighty God, in Christ you make all things new: transform the poverty of our nature by the riches of your grace, and in the renewal of our live make known your heavenly glory.'

Lent offers the invitation to return to God in a very deliberate way and be transformed by His grace. For in the returning, we are healed and through the healing we are renewed.

As Lent can be a time for a 'fresh start' and 'new approach' please make every effort to attend church on Sundays and Mid-week, and if you have not been out for while it would be a delight to see you!




be a source of hope in their local

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## The Pilgrim Course (What is the Bible and how should we read it)

Pilgrim is a teaching and discipleship resource that helps inquirers and Christians explore what it means to travel through life with Christ. A Christian course for the twenty-first century, Pilgrim offers an approach of participation, not persuasion. Following the practice of the ancient disciplines of biblical reflection and prayer with quotes from the Christian tradition throughout the ages, Pilgrim assumes little or no knowledge of the Christian faith. Individuals or small groups on the journey of discipleship in the Anglican tradition can use Pilgrim at any point.



The Bible: What is it, how was it given to us, and how should we read it? These six sessions combine simple prayer, Bible reflection and time for questions and reflection. By the end of the six sessions, it is hoped that participants will have learned how to make reading the Bible a part of everyday life, with the ability to read, pray, and listen to what God might be saying, allowing the words to change each participant. The course continues in the Hilliard Room, Cathedral Hall, on Tuesday's 5th and 19th March from 7.30pm – 9.00pm. A warm welcome awaits you, and refreshments will be served at each session. We look forward to journeying with you.




## **Daily Reading for Lent**

Pilgrim Journeys: The Lord's Prayer takes you on a 40-day journey through the prayer Jesus taught his followers - one which continues to shape the lives of Christians across the world.

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## Mothering Sunday Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> March - Family Service at 11.00am

## Mothering Sunday, what are its origins in the Church?

Each year on the fourth Sunday of Lent, countries around the world celebrate Mothering Sunday. This typically involves lavishing Mums with gifts and attention and celebrating the women who have nurtured us

throughout our lives. But with the day becoming increasingly commercialised, how many people are aware of its very different origins? Here are some of the traditions that have shaped Mothering Sunday into the celebration recognised today:



## The Journey to the Mother Church

In the 16th century, Mothering Sunday was less about mothers and more about church. Back then, people would make a journey to their 'mother' church once a year. This might have been their home church, their nearest cathedral or a major parish church in a bigger town. The service which took place at the 'mother' church symbolised the coming together of families. This would have represented a significant journey for many.

## A day off to visit Mother

Another tradition was to allow those working in the fields on wealthy farms and estates in England to have the day off on the fourth Sunday of Lent to visit their mothers and possibly go to church too. This was a variation on the theme of visiting the 'mother' church and was a move towards a more family focussed occasion. Before the days of cars and roads, family get-togethers were far more rare, (and facetime was still a long way off). In some ways this tradition is still alive today as grown up children often visit their parents on mothering Sunday.

## Traditions today

This Sunday, churches around the country will be sharing their own traditions, celebrating and giving thanks to the huge impact mothers have on each of our lives. The main service on Mothering Sunday in churches across the country is central to the life of the church. The church recognises that the day may be difficult for some people and so it is common place for services to include prayers for those who don't find the day particularly easy. Families across the country will be preparing little presents and cards and in some churches flowers are blessed and handed out during the main service. In St Macartin's Cathedral we now have a tradition of handing out a small plant to all the females present on the day – so please come and worship as a family!

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## Cathedral Bells and Cathedral Clock

#### **Automation of the Cathedral bells**

The new chiming system for the bells has come in for great praise. It took John Taylor and Company's technician, with assistance from Gareth Latimer's electrician and helper, just over one week to complete the installation. Everything is now working perfectly, including the clock which is accurate to a second.

The clock strikes the hour and each quarter, but is silent after Big Ben at 9.00pm until 9.00am. At 12 noon and at 3.00pm, after the time has been struck, there is a short medley of hymns played on the bells. Currently, there are just under 30 hymns recorded on the system. This involved the cathedral's organist, Mr Glenn Moore, in the presence of Taylor's technician, recording the hymn music on a special ten key keyboard. In time, many more hymns can be added to the repertoire.

The hymns currently on the system include such popular hymns as: 'Abide with me'; 'Amazing Grace'; 'Nearer my God to Thee', and 'Rock of Ages'. The bells can be chimed for special occasions. For example, a slow tolling bell can be rung in advance of the cortege arriving for a funeral and then when the coffin is leaving the cathedral a hymn such as

THE eight bells hanging in the Tower of this Cathedral Church have a history all their own. The first two, known in their day as "William and Mary" were manufactured from cannon taken at the Battle of the Boyne, and afterwards given by King William the Third to the Enniskilleners for this purpose. These two were, at a later date. The Earl of Enniskillen of that period gave a hell, and the then Earl of Belmore also gave one. Likewise, the Hon, and Rev. John Charles Maude, who faithfully served the historic Parish for thirtyfive years, presented another, The Misses Hall of Innismore showed their great interest in the Church by presenting no less than three bells, and the eighth was procured from general funds.

All these bells hung from oak beams in the Tower; but in 1934 these beams were pronounced by experts to be absolutely unsafe. Accordingly, the Select Vestry, under professional advice, determined to put in a cast iron frame and all the necessary fittings, and at the same time provide for two additional bells, if ever they should be for the oming, to make the chime ten-complete. But where were these two new bells to come from? Well, Mrs. A. F. Maude, Belgard Castle, Co. Dublin, most kindly gave one in memory of her husband, the late Captain A. F. Maude, recently deceased; and John S. Dane, Esq. of Kildare Terrace, London, gave the other in memory of the late James Whiteside Dane who took a very prominent part in the transformation of the Parish Church into its present form as a Cathedral Church. The completion of the Chime took place in October, 1935. THE Misses Hall, already mentioned, nearly 100 years ago gave the clock,—beautiful in its day,—which adorned the lower and proved a great help to many. This installation results in the bells and clock mechanisms being updated using the very latest technology. It should be noted that the bells can still be rung manually as before.

This has been a costly development and generous donations have been received towards it. However, there still remains a significant deficit in this account and any further donations would be most welcome.




