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The Dean Writes:

*An extract from the Dean's address
to The Easter General Vestry.*

Dear Parishioners,

I sometimes wonder if there is anything new to say but it is good to look back over the past year and to give thanks to Almighty God for His faithfulness, love, and blessing upon us as a congregation. As always at this meeting I want to thank people for their work during this past year. I want to remind us all that each one of us is valued, important and essential to the life and ministry of this parish. I hope you believe that your contribution is as important as anyone who leads from the front or leads an organisation. Without all of you the work of the kingdom of God would not be advanced in this parish or in this community. Thanks be to God we have had a year of much activity and growth, and perhaps another one of the continuing challenges is to find ways of engaging our newer parishioners fully in the life and witness of the parish. It was very encouraging to welcome new families but we need more integration and social engagement. To that end we have made some advances. We have a vision of a growing, flourishing church in Enniskillen. To help us with that vision we want to equip our parishioners. In particular I would like to promote 'Pilgrim' as a teaching and discipleship resource. It aims to help the local church to create a place where people can explore the Christian faith together and see how it can be lived out each day. Pilgrim takes a different approach to other Christian programmes. It approaches the great issues of faith not through persuasion, but by participation in a pattern of contemplation and discussion with a group of fellow travellers! As well as Pilgrim we have at present many successful ventures – Sunday Lights/ Sunday Lights Café, Mothers' Union, Mens' LIFE, Messy Church, Xplore for our Confirmation Class and above, Youth Club, Uniformed organisations, Tuesday Club and Bowling Club. There is something for everyone – do lend your support and encourage others to get involved. We all need to be actively involved

in parish life and if we do not care, we will find ourselves growing cold and indifferent in our relationship with God and with others.

Following the example of our Lord and Saviour, the Christian life necessarily involves service, and in order for this parish to continue to serve the needs of our own parishioners and the wider community, all who consider themselves parishioners must in turn be willing to serve in whatever capacity they can. An increased team effort in running our various events will also have the positive effect of building up our sense of community, and serve as a means of getting to know each other better – a task which can be challenging in a busy parish such as this. As a Christian community, I believe we must strive to provide 'cradle to grave ministry', and there are identifiable gaps in this ministry at present. New initiatives such as the Men's LIFE Group which started this year, and the Mother and Baby classes are attempts to fill in these gaps, and I am always open to new suggestions as to how to fill in others. The Sunday morning crèche needs some extra attention/leadership, however I am really pleased that 18 teenagers are now attending Xplore. Sadly, the most obvious gap in the ministry of the parish continues to be to our young adults, and I would particularly welcome assistance in trying to rectify this situation.

As a Christian community, faith development and spirituality must remain a priority, and while the success of such ventures can never be measured by the numbers attending, I do issue a challenge to those of you who have never attended any of these to give even one of them a try – you might well be surprised by what God has in store for you!

The same can be said about our services, whether on Sunday mornings, Sunday evenings or Thursday mornings – and so I issue a similar challenge to those of you who might not be regular attendees: gathering together in the Lord's House and around His Table is the platform from which springs all our other activities and ministries.

In this our 396th Anniversary year, we have much to give thanks for. We have also much to look forward to and we want to make a special effort to do everything in our power to make the 400th Anniversary of this parish a year for all to remember in parish, town and community. Planning for that will have to begin soon, however in the meantime let us now use both the Cathedral and our new Cathedral Halls to the full extent, with every means possible, with every imaginative idea and in so doing continue and fulfil 'Our Vision' of

Saint Macartin's at the heart of the Community –

Strengthening Commitment, Outreach, Worship and Christian Love.

I conclude by thanking you all for your ongoing support, friendship and prayers. I thank God that He has seen fit to bring me to this wonderful parish, and pray that all of us together may build up His Kingdom in this place, to the honour and glory of His name. Yours very sincerely,

Thy Kingdom Come



The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, writes: *"If we're honest, most of us would admit that prayer is not always easy, or enjoyable, and rarely comes naturally. We struggle with distractions, anxious thoughts and commitments"*

and he continues

"prayer is not about us making efforts to knock on the door of a God too busy or distant to listen, but instead, it is responding to a God who has already started the conversation with us. A God who wants nothing more than to spend time with us, help us grow, and surprise us."

Prayer begins with presence. When we turn up, God is already there waiting to hear our concerns, share in our joys, and respond to our questions; he is there to listen, comfort, and encourage.

In recent years, the Archbishop has encouraged people to make prayer a priority in their private and public worship, and has endorsed and supported the Thy Kingdom Come prayer initiative. This takes place every year in the 10 days prior to Pentecost beginning on Ascension Day; the period when the disciples were told to pray and await the coming of the Holy Spirit (see Acts 1).

We wish to join with Christians around the world to pray "Thy Kingdom Come", and we have organised a series of prayer initiatives to run between Thursday 10th May and Sunday 20th May. We do hope that you will join with us in prayer, either in the privacy of your own home, by spending time in the Iona Prayer Room, or joining us in public worship.

The Iona Prayer Room will be open daily from 10am until 7pm every day for private prayer.

- We encourage everyone to just turn up and pray for 15-30 minutes.
- Resources will be available to help those who want a time of structured prayer.

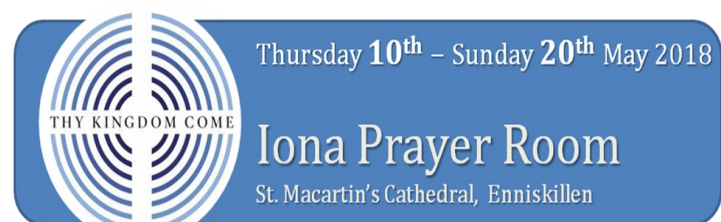
- This will take place every evening, except Sundays, beginning at 7.00pm.

Church of Ireland Bishops' Appeal

Bishops' Appeal is the Church's World Aid and Development Programme. It was set up by the Bishops of the Church in response to the commands in the Bible to bring good news to the poor and relief to the suffering.

Aims:

- To educate the Church at home about the needs and concerns of people in the less developed world and the causes of poverty;
 - To encourage Church members to examine the reasons for the problems facing the less fortunate in the world and to consider what we can do to change conditions;
 - To reach out in God's name to those who need our help;
- To encourage informed prayer and prayerful action aimed at strengthening the poor; to raise the funds needed to allow Bishops' Appeal to support development projects and alleviate the suffering caused by disasters, both natural and man-made.

Bishops' Appeal works through partner Non-Governmental Organisations and Mission Agencies to implement Christ's "Mission Statement" to feed the hun-

gry, lift the burden of poverty from the poor and bring freedom and hope to the oppressed. It does not fund development and emergency work directly. Our partners have the local knowledge and resources to ensure that projects for which they apply for funding are of maximum benefit to the peoples and areas in which they work.

Church of Ireland Bishops' Appeal

Bishops' Appeal contributes to relief of suffering in time of emergencies whether natural or man-made. However, our main concern is to support ongoing development in the fields of sustainable agriculture, health, including HIV/AIDS, and education in many parts of the world. We aim to enable people to have more control over their own lives and futures so that they are less dependent on others than they are today.

Half the world's population live on less than two dollars a day; indeed, over 300 million people in sub-Saharan Africa live on less than one dollar

a day. It is estimated that 30,000 people die every day from poverty related diseases. The Christian Church cannot remain silent in the face of this ongoing tragedy and injustice. Bishops' Appeal is the Church of Ireland's voice calling for an end to this suffering and working with others to make a difference where it can.

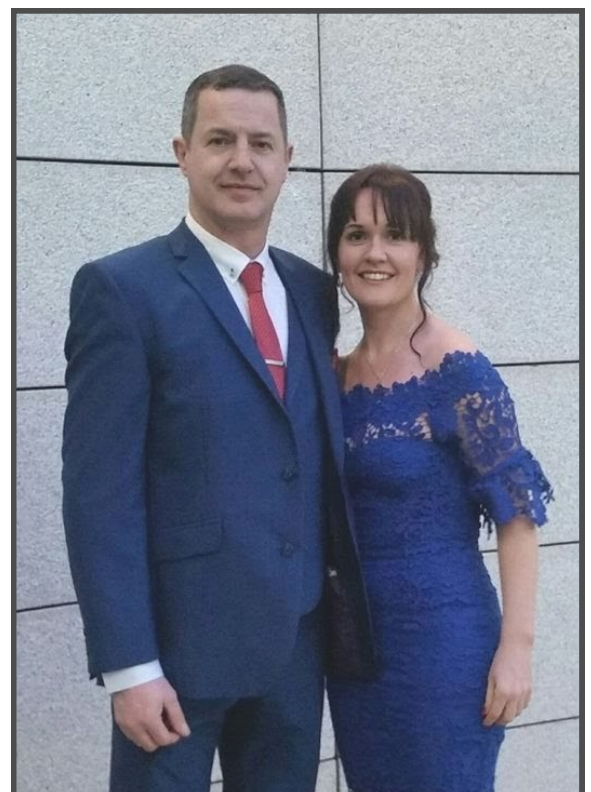

Collect of the Month by Rev. Chris Mac Bruithin

Our series exploring some of the Church's most beloved prayers continues with the Collect prayed at Confirmation Services

*Heavenly Father,
by water and the Holy Spirit
you give your faithful people new life:
Guide and strengthen us by that same Spirit
that we who are born again
may serve you in faith and love,
and grow into the full stature of your Son Jesus Christ,
who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever. Amen.*

This is the Collect prayed at Confirmation services, and we will pray it together on 27th May when twenty one candidates from the Cathedral community present themselves to the Bishop to be confirmed.

But where is the word 'confirmation'?

The title used to address God is one of the plainer ones – 'Heavenly Father'. This is similar to the beginning of the Lord's Prayer: 'Our Father, who art in heaven'. In Jesus' day, it was particularly striking. In a time and place where people prayed to the 'God of our fathers Abraham, Isaac and Jacob' or 'God of Israel', Jesus opened up the prayer to all people, Jew and Gentile, by simply calling God 'Father'. It is very apt for prayers used in Christian initiation (baptism and confirmation), because as St Paul writes (Eph. 4:5), there is one baptism and we all begin at the same starting point in relation to God.

The following lines that focus on God's action in history are unmistakably about baptism. Why? The pastoral introduction to Baptism (BCP page 357) portrays the Christian life as a journey. Baptism is the first step. Then on page 382, we have the Bishop's introduction to the Service of Confirmation, which states the purpose of Confirmation. Candidates make their own those baptismal promises previously made on their behalf by parents and godparents.

At Confirmation, the Bishop also calls on the Holy Spirit to 'confirm, strengthen and guide them' as they take this next step along the journey that is Christian faith.



Collect of the Month

The specific petition in the collect is 'that we who are born again' may serve God and 'grow into the full stature' of Christ. Again, the Prayer Book tells us what the Church of Ireland believes about Baptism. In it, we are 'born again' to a new life. This is a prayer, not only for the candidates, but all God's baptized people present. For all of us, a Confirmation service is a wonderful opportunity to renew our own baptismal promises. Even those of us for whom Confirmation is a distant memory, we are not there yet, but still on that journey towards full union with Christ.

It is fitting that the collect ends in good Trinitarian style, as we are all baptized in the name of God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

Laura and I have really enjoyed sharing in this part of the journey with our 'Class of 2018'. We look forward to being with you on Sunday 27th and beyond.

'safeTALK' suicide alertness training will take place in St Macartin's Cathedral Hall from **7.15pm - 10.30pm** on **Tuesday 29th May**. On completion of this training you will be a trained suicide alert helper. You will be better able to:

- identify people who have thoughts of suicide
- move beyond common tendencies to miss, dismiss or avoid suicide
- apply the TALK steps (Tell, Ask, Listen and KeepSafe) to connect a person with suicidal thoughts to suicide first aid, intervention caregivers.

To register your place please contact the Cathedral Office – only thirty places available on the course but if we exceed thirty names we will hold your name on reserve and run a second training night as soon as possible. It is a shocking statistic that eighty four men commit suicide each week in the UK. Suicide is the biggest killer of men under the age of fifty in the UK. More information can be found at

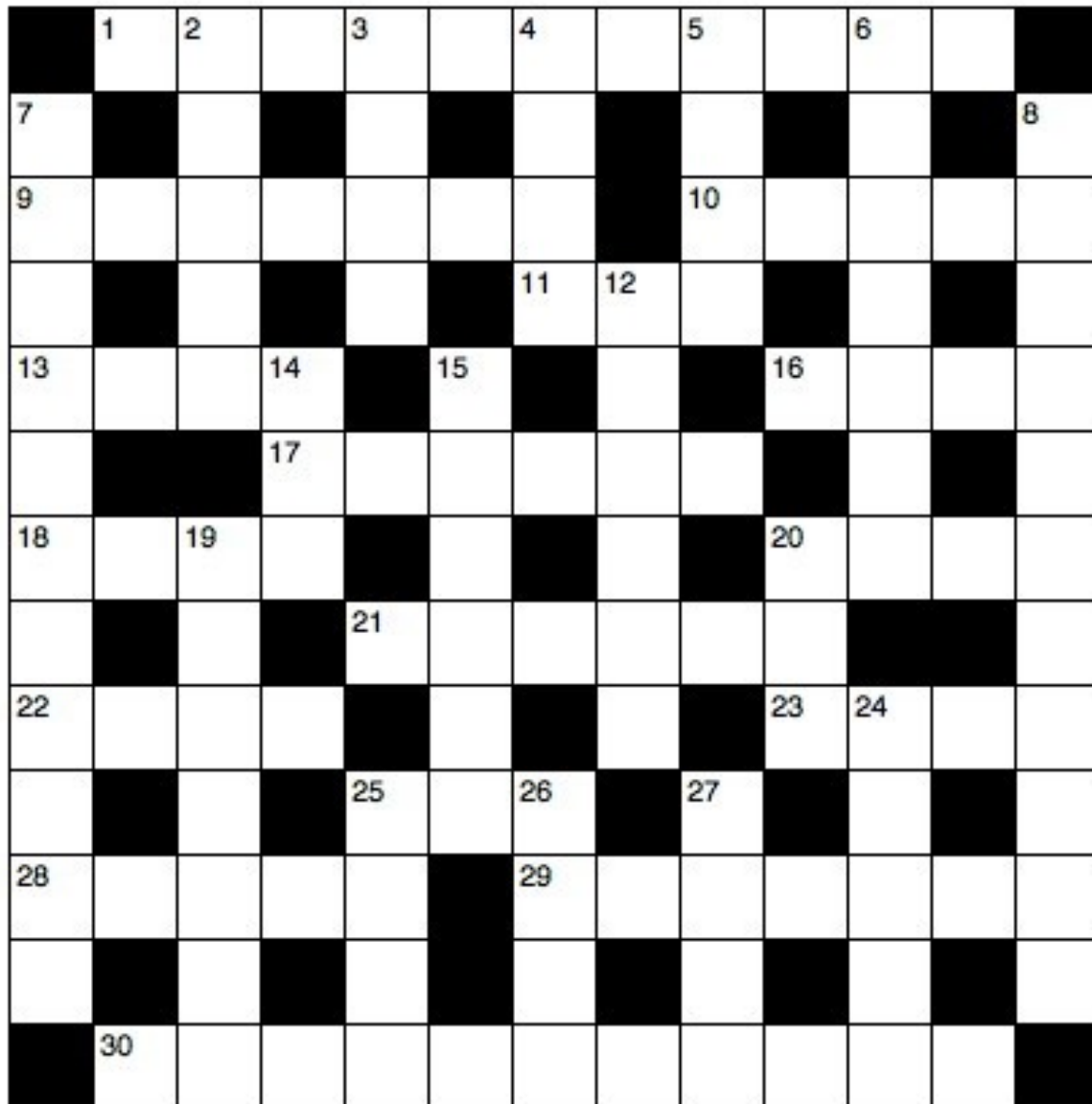

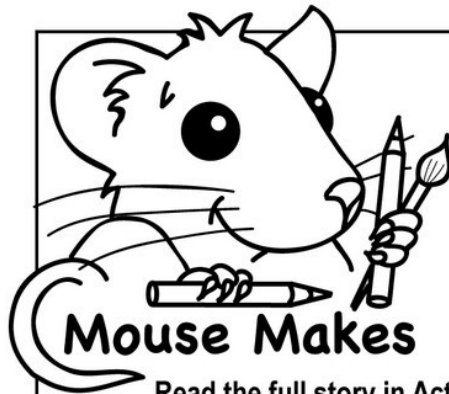

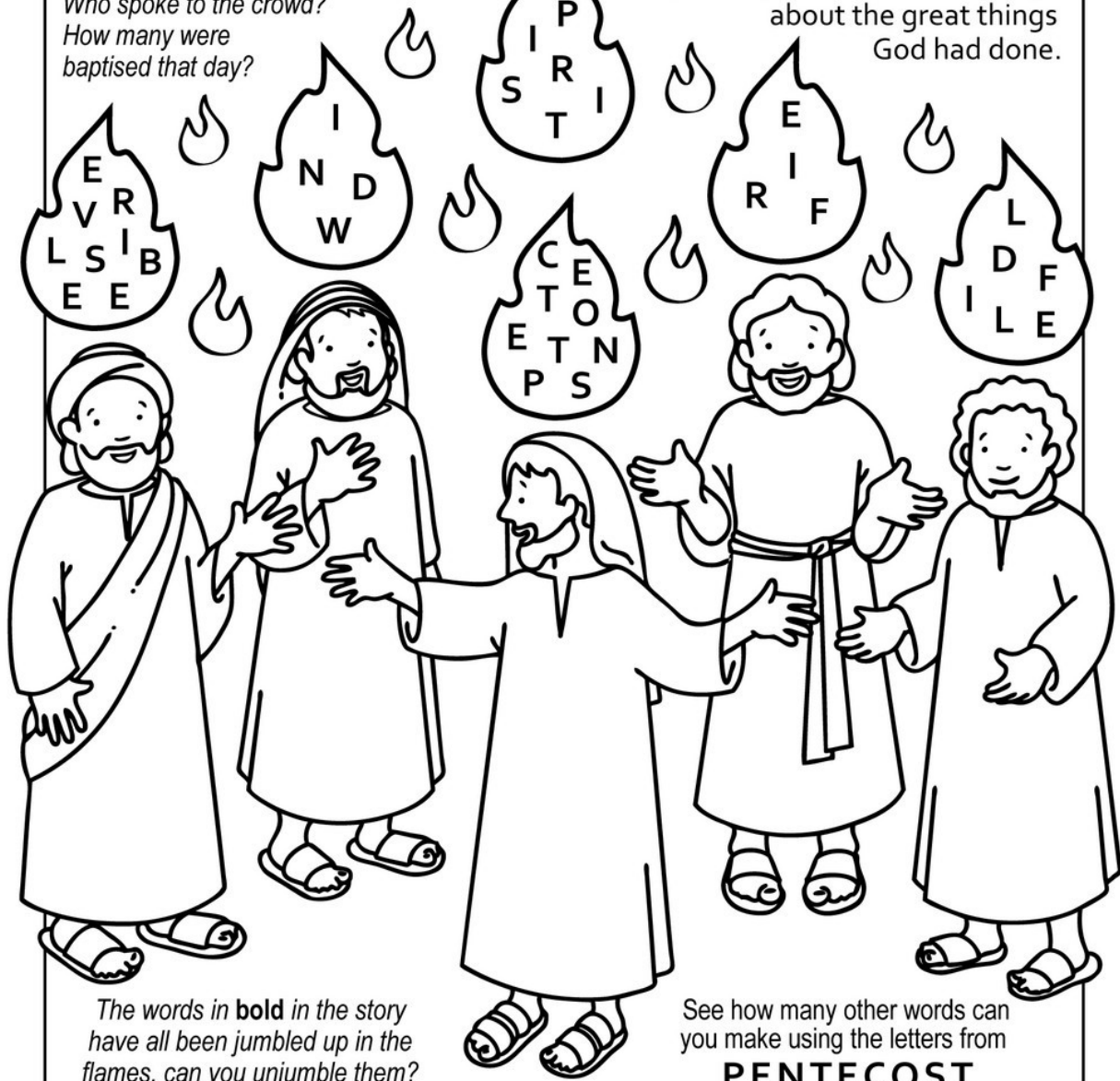
