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
The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

An extract from the Dean's address to The Easter General Vestry

Welcome to this Easter General Vestry Meeting. This is the 9th

Easter General Vestry Meeting I have addressed here and as the 28th Rector and 6th Dean of St Macartin's Cathedral.



The role of the church is very much to be part of the community and not apart from the community where we see ourselves as not just looking after ourselves and our own interests - inward looking. We need to be prepared to get out into the world around us and show the love of God reflecting through us, put our Christian beliefs into practice, bring the church into the community and then the community will be more at ease to come into church!

Thanks be to God we have had a year of much activity and growth. Perhaps another one of the continuing challenges is to find ways of engaging our newer parishioners fully in the life and witness of the parish. It was very encouraging to see new families, but we need more integration and social engagement. To that end we have made some advances. We have a vision of a growing, flourishing church in Enniskillen. To help us with that vision we want to equip our parishioners. I mention this to highlight the need to support our various clubs and organisations, to ensure their continuation and to prevent us taking the work of leaders and officers for granted.



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If you want these and other organisations to continue to operate in this parish, get involved in them! To a large degree, our future is in our own hands.

If you want to be part of a parish which offers a really good social dimension – support the events which are organised and be prepared to help out with organizations. If you want a Christ-centred parish that stretches our spirituality and a living faith - come along to the Pilgrim Group or ask for prayer when you need it. I would like to promote 'Pilgrim' as a teaching and discipleship resource. Interestingly almost 100 copies of the Pilgrim Reflections on the Beatitudes were taken by parishioners to read during Lent. Follow up Pilgrim Reflections will be available for our next church season (Easter to Pentecost) – 40 days of reflections on the Lord's Prayer (see page 10). Our Pilgrim Group aims to help the local church create a place where people can explore the Christian faith together and see how it can be lived out each day. Pilgrim takes a different approach to other Christian programmes. It approaches the great issues of faith not through persuasion, but participation in a pattern of contemplation and discussion with a group of fellow travellers! As well as Pilgrim we have at present many successful ventures – Sunday Lights/Sunday Lights Café, Mothers' Union, Men's LIFE, Messy Church, Xplore for our Confirmation Class and the Uniformed organisations.

If you want to be part of a parish whose church attendance continues to grow – come to church more often. The addition of the regular Thursday Morning Service is a great alternative for those for whom Sunday mornings are busy

We have a wonderful parish, with facilities which are second to none, and I have no doubt that God will continue to bless our efforts to build up his kingdom in this place. And while technically he doesn't need our help to do so, he magnanimously invites us to join him in the work of his kingdom, which should be, and is, a pure pleasure and privilege. There is something for everyone – do lend your support and encourage others to get involved. We all need to be actively involved in parish life and if we do not care, we will find ourselves growing cold and indifferent in our relationship with God and with others.

As a Christian community, faith development and spirituality must remain a priority, and while the success of such ventures can never be measured by the numbers attending, I do issue a challenge to those of you who have never attended any of our organisations or groups to give even one of them a try – you might well be surprised by what God has in store for you!

The same can be said about our services, whether on Sunday mornings, Sunday evenings or Thursday mornings – and so I issue a similar challenge to those of you who might not be regular attendees: gathering together in the Lord's House and around His Table is the platform from which springs all our other activities and ministries. Lets us live out our Vision' of

Saint Macartin's at the heart of the Community – Strengthening Commitment, Outreach, Worship and Christian Love.

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Church of Ireland Bishops' Appeal

Development, Relief, Advocacy - Bishops' Appeal is the Church's World Aid and Development Programme. It was set up by the Bishops of the Church in response to the commands in the Bible to bring good news to the poor and relief to the suffering.

Aims:

- To educate the Church at home about the needs and concerns of people in the less developed world and the causes of poverty;
- To encourage Church members to examine the reasons for the problems facing the less fortunate in the world and to consider what we can do to change conditions;
- To reach out in God's name to those who need our help;
- To encourage informed prayer and prayerful action aimed at strengthening the poor; to raise the funds needed to allow Bishops' Appeal to support development projects and alleviate the suffering caused by disasters, both natural and man-made.

Bishops' Appeal works through partner Non-Governmental Organisations and Mission Agencies to implement Christ's "Mission Statement" to feed the hungry, lift the burden of poverty from the poor and bring freedom and hope to the oppressed. It does not fund development and emergency work directly. Our partners have the local knowledge and resources to ensure that projects for which they apply for funding are of maximum

benefit to the peoples and areas in which they work.

Bishops' Appeal contributes to relief of suffering in time of emergencies whether natural or man-made. However, our main concern is to support ongoing development in the fields of sustainable agriculture, health, including HIV/AIDS, and education in many parts of the world. We aim to enable people to have more control over their own lives and futures so that they are less dependent on others than they are today.

Half the world's population live on less than two dollars a day; indeed, over 300 million people in sub-Saharan Africa live on less than one dollar a day. It is estimated that 30,000 people die every day from poverty related diseases. The Christian Church cannot remain silent in the face of this ongoing tragedy and injustice. 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Church of Ireland Bishops' Appeal Supports Response to Cyclone Idai

The Church of Ireland Bishops' Appeal is releasing €10,000 in emergency funds to support relief efforts in Mozambique, Malawi and Zimbabwe in the wake of Cyclone Idai. Further funds will be added in the coming weeks and Bishops' Appeal welcomes support from parishes and individuals who wish to contribute.

The devastation has resulted in over one million people being affected, with more than 100,000 people displaced from their homes. Immediate concerns include access to hygiene kits, shelter, safe drinking water, and food. There are

also major concerns about the spread of waterborne diseases. £12 / €14 could help towards providing much needed clean water: £22 / €25 could provide a blanket and clothing to help keep someone warm; £50 / €58 could provide a month's food for a family of five. Lydia Monds, Education Adviser for Bish-

ops' Appeal, says: "As the waters recede in the wake of Cyclone Idai, the devastation continues to unfold. The death toll has risen to 750 people and 110,000 people are currently displaced and in camps. In Mozambique, Malawi and Zimbabwe, people are now bracing themselves for outbreaks of waterborne diseases. Amidst this hell on earth, we can make a tangible Kingdom difference. With your prayers and support, the most affected communities can receive food, shelter, clean water, water purification tablets, and medical support."

Bishops' Appeal partners Christian Aid and Tearfund Ireland are on the ground providing life–saving aid.


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Reflections for the Period Easter to The Ascension

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The Ascension

40 days after Easter comes Ascension Day. These are the 40 days during which the Risen Christ appeared again and again to His disciples, following His death and resurrection. (Matthew 28; Mark 16; Luke 24; and John 20.) The Gospels give us little of Christ's teachings and deeds during those 40 days. Jesus was seen by numerous of His disciples: on the road to Emmaus, by the Sea of Galilee, in houses, etc. He strengthened and encouraged His disciples, and at last opened their eyes to all that the Scriptures had promised about the Messiah. Jesus also told them that as the Father had sent Him, He was now going to send them – to all corners of the earth, as His witnesses.

Surely the most tender, moving 'farewell' in history took place on Ascension Day. Luke records the story with great poignancy: "When Jesus had led them out to the vicinity of Bethany, He lifted up His hands – and blessed them."

As Christmas began the story of Jesus' life on earth, so Ascension Day completes it, with His return to His Father in heaven. Jesus' last act on earth was to bless His disciples. He and they had a bond as close as could be: they had just lived through three tumultuous years of public ministry



and miracles – persecution and death – and resurrection! Just as we part from our nearest and dearest by still looking at them with love and memories in our eyes, so exactly did Jesus: 'While He was blessing them, He left them and was taken up into heaven.' (Luke 24:50-1) He was not forsaking them, but merely going on ahead to a kingdom which would also be theirs one day: 'I

am ascending to my Father and to your Father, to my God and your God...' (John 20:17)

The disciples were surely the most favoured folk in history. Imagine being one of the last few people on earth to be face to face with Jesus, and have Him look on you with love. No wonder then that Luke goes on: 'they worshipped Him – and returned to Jerusalem with great joy. And they stayed continually at the temple, praising God.' (Luke 24:52,53) No wonder they praised God! They knew they would see Jesus again one day! 'I am going to prepare a place for you... I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am.' (John 14:2,3) In the meantime, Jesus had work for them to do: to take the Gospel to every nation on earth.

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

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Canticles in Worship by Rev Chris Mac Bruithin

A new series of reflections on the Canticles in the Book of Common Prayer - Cantate Domino (Psalm 98)

The Book of Common Prayer has been revised every once in a while since Cranmer's 1549 version. At every turn, some have complained that changes have gone too far, and others that they have not gone far enough. The redactors of the 1662 Book of Common Prayer knew this very well, writing in the Preface 'we know it impossible ... to please all'. Some things never change!



One minor regret I have about the Church of Ireland's 2004 Prayer Book is that the canticle *Cantate Domino* has not been printed in modern language. This, I assume, is why it is rarely used as it once was.

Like Venite and Jubilate, both of which are sung week in and week out, Cantate Domino is a psalm from the Bible which calls us to worship.

Psalm 98 helps us to see that God is bigger than we might think. First of all, in our lives and the lives of his people down the centuries, 'He hath done marvellous things'. He has given His people victory and salvation. As we approach God on Sunday mornings, it is good to remember how we have experienced that personally, and to give our thanks and praise.

However, God is not just our God – He is the God over all people. The word 'heathen' in the traditional language is by no means politically correct today! In Psalm 98, it simply refers to Gentiles, people who are not part if Israel. God cares also about them – all the Edomites and Ammonites, Moabites and all the other 'ites' and 'bites' that we struggle with when we read those difficult Old Testament lessons. The psalmist says in this canticle that God's salvation reaches to 'all the ends of the world'.

In fact, not only does God care for all humans everywhere, but He also cares for all of creation. And so, along with our own hymn-singing, the psalmist incites nature to worship too. The sea is instructed to crash; the rivers are to clap their hands, and the hills are to rejoice. Jesus once said, when Pharisees were telling the crowds to be quiet, that if they did stop praising him, then the stones would cry out 'Hosanna!'

What a shame the 2004 Prayer Book does not include a contemporary language version of this wonderful canticle. All is not lost, however. At Family Services, we quite often sing it in its rousing metrical form as the hymn 'Sing to God new songs of worship'. Also, we can read it in modern language as Psalm 98 on p. 704. We just need one of our talented musicians to teach us the chant and get us all sing-

ing those 'new songs of worship'!

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Psalm 63


If you had to describe our society in a single word, the most appropriate one would be *pressure*. We live with pressure in every aspect of life, from our school, work or family life, to the big issues facing our world.

Best Book in the Bible

King David knew what it meant to live under pressure. His son, Absalom, led a rebellion against him,

resulting in David fleeing for his life into the wilderness of Judah. It was there that he wrote Psalm 63. The psalm demonstrates the priorities a person of God under pressure.



God my desire: 'You, God, are my God, earnestly I seek you; I thirst for you, my whole being longs for you, in a dry and parched land where there is no water.' (v1). David's physical thirst was an expression of his deeper thirst to know God. Even though separated from the worship of the sanctuary, he chose to seek God. When God seems distant or silence in our lives, we too can choose to seek him; this can be a

vital path of growth in our relationship with him.

God my delight: 'Because your love is better than life, my lips will glorify you.' (3). David 's delight in God is expressed in praise, as he recognises God's love for him. What gives us delight in our lives? Does it come from the things of this world or from God himself?





God my defence: 'I cling to you; your right hand upholds me.' (8). David is surrounded by enemies, but confident in God's defence and purpose for him. God uses our troubles and disappointments to fulfil his will, as he develops our character and trust in his purposes.
