

It is good to have a variety of voices to read lessons so more readers are required!


TEA AFTER FAMILY SERVICE

The Nicene Creed – 1700 years!



This month, 1700 years ago, one of the most important meetings in the history of the Christian Church began in the Bithynian city of Nicaea. It began in May 325 and went on until the end of July 325.

The Council of Nicaea was convened by the Roman Emperor Constantine, and he had an urgent job for the Christian bishops to do. He wanted them to spell out as exactly as they could the core beliefs of the Christian Church, especially with regard to the person of Christ.

Constantine had good reason to do this: a man called Arius of Alexandria was spreading the idea that Jesus Christ was not divine, but instead was a created being. Such a belief, if accepted, would have changed the very heart of Christianity.

After three months of hard work, the bishops at Nicaea had prayerfully and carefully written down as exactly as they could the core beliefs of Christianity. It became known as the Nicene Creed, and it has been the bedrock of orthodox Christianity ever since.

The Nicene Creed is unique in that it is the only Christian statement of faith that is accepted as authoritative by the Anglican, Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, and major Protestant Churches.

the Father, the Almighty,
maker of heaven and earth,
of all that is,

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,
the only Son of God,
eternally begotten of the Father,

of one Being with the Father.
Through him all things were made.
For us and for our salvation
he came down from heaven,
was incarnate by the Holy Spirit of the Virgin Mary,
and was made man.
For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;
he suffered death and was buried.
On the third day he rose again
in accordance with the Scriptures;
he ascended into heaven
and is seated at the right hand of the Father.
He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead,
and his kingdom will have no end.
We believe in the Holy Spirit,
the Lord, the giver of life,
who proceeds from the Father and the Son,
who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified,
who has spoken through the prophets.
We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.
We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.
We look for the resurrection of the dead,
and the life of the world to come. Amen.




Mothers' Union

VE Day 80

Enniskillen's of VE Day 80 is a Community Celebration for All.

On 8 May 2025, we will commemorate the 80th anniversary of Victory in Europe (VE) Day, marking an extraordinary milestone since the end of the Second World War in Europe.

A special programme of events is planned in Enniskillen, highlighting the significance of the anniversary and bringing communities together in gratitude and remembrance. People of all ages, nationalities and backgrounds can reflect on this pivotal moment in history and celebrate the peace and freedoms that were secured in 1945.

The 75th anniversary took place under Covid-19 restrictions, but now neighbours and communities can celebrate safely together with food and music, just like they did 80 years ago!

Victory in Europe Day 80 spotlights the achievements of a unique generation of people who gave so much for our freedom. Millions died at war and millions more families around the world suffered unimaginable physical and mental pain.

The anniversary is a time to reflect on that remarkable collective sacrifice and to learn from the strength and resilience of the communities who united in a common cause.

The planned events mark VE Day 80 whilst strengthening community bonds, thoughtfully and joyfully, and paying tribute to the sacrifice made by many during the tumultuous years of the Second World War.

Enniskillen's programme of events - the most westerly location for the VE Day 80 Commemorations in the UK - balances remembrance with celebration, including a VE Day 80 Commemorative Church Service, Beacon Lighting Ceremony, Pipers Tribute, Beating Retreat and Concert.

Thursday 8th May

9.00am – VE Day 80 Proclamation

Gary Wilson will be joining Town Criers and Toastmasters throughout the County to read the VE Day 80 Proclamation at The Watergate, outside Enniskillen Castle, marking the official start of the day's commemorations.

6.30pm – St Macartin's Cathedral Bells

As part of the nationwide celebrations, the bells of St Macartin's Cathedral will ring at 6.30pm, in a symbolic act of remembrance and unity.

7.30pm – VE Day 80 Commemorative Service, Pipers Tribute & Beacon Lighting

The Inniskillings Museum and four churches on the island of Enniskillen will come together to commemorate the 80th anniversary of VE Day with a special Service of Peace. Enniskillen's Service of Peace will reflect our shared journey towards reconciliation and hope for future generations. The

VE Day 80

Service of Peace will take place across two churches, commencing at 7.30pm in St Macartin's Cathedral. A spectacular parade of 80 pipers and drummers from local areas will form a community-massed band to support the service. The band will gather on Church Street, guiding the congregation to St Michael's Church for the continuation of the service. A significant element of the commemoration will feature the return of the lanterns presented to Enniskillen's churches in 2018, marking the 100th anniversary of the Armistice. These lanterns, in line with the official VE Day 80 promotion of "Lamping Lights of Peace", will light the way from St Michael's Church back to St Macartin's Cathedral. There, the service will conclude with the lighting of a ceremonial beacon by Viscount Brookeborough, Lord Lieutenant for County Fermanagh. The beacon will symbolise hope as the light that emerged from the darkness of war. In essence, this echoes the service that was held in November 2018 to mark the centenary of the end of the First World War, which included the lanterns of peace and a memorable tribute by 100 local pipers & drummers. Enniskillen's Service of Peace is open to all, and we welcome our community members and visitors to join us in commemorating this historic occasion.

9.30pm – Illumination of Council Buildings

Enniskillen Castle and the Strule Arts Centre will be illuminated blue, a symbolic colour of peace and unity, by Fermanagh & Omagh District Council. This action serves as a mark of respect for the sacrifices made during the Second World War, as well as our community's ongoing commitment to peace.


Saturday 10th May

7.00pm – VE Day 80 Commemorative Concert

The Band, Bugles, Pipes & Drums of the Royal Irish Regiment will perform a special concert in St Macartin's Cathedral hosted by The Royal Air Forces Association (Fermanagh Branch). It will be compered by Gary Wilson with guest soloists Lauren Kells and Clara Wilson. This event is free, with an invitation extended to everyone and no tickets or pre-booking is required. 


Psalm

Psalm 2

Psalm 2 begins with a vivid portrayal of the nations conspiring against the Lord and The Anointed One. The psalmist asks, 'Why do the nations rage and the peoples plot in vain?' This question resonates deeply as it reflects the constant turmoil and rebellion present in the world. Despite such defiance, the psalm conveys the futility of opposing God's sovereign will. The Lord, seated in the heavens, laughs and scoffs at such rebellion, reaffirming God's supreme authority.

As we meditate on this psalm, we are reminded of the eternal kingship of Christ. God declares, 'You are my Son; today I have become your Father' (v. 7), emphasizing the divine relationship and the establish-



ment of Jesus as the eternal King. This revelation offers us hope and assurance that despite earthly unrest, God's plan through Christ will prevail.

In our own lives, Psalm 2 calls us to submit to God's authority and embrace Christ. The psalm concludes with a call to wisdom: "Serve the Lord with fear and celebrate his rule with trembling" (v. 11). This encourages us to approach God with reverence and joy, acknowledging God's rightful place as King of our hearts and lives. May we find peace and security in God's unwavering sovereignty, trusting that God is in control and that God's purposes will stand.



Knowing Your Cathedral

The Quinton Window

The martyrdom of St. Stephen, depicted in the exquisite Quinton Window, serves as a poignant testament to the strength of faith and the ultimate sacrifice for Christ. Stephen, a man 'full of faith and of the Holy Spirit' (Acts 6.5), bore witness to his unwavering belief in Jesus even unto death. The vibrant hues and intricate design of the stained glass captures the essence of his final moments, as he gazed heavenward and saw 'the glory of God, and Jesus standing on the right hand of God' (Acts 7.55). This heavenly vision fortified him, even as he faced the wrath of his persecutors.

The portrayal of St. Stephen's martyrdom in stained glass not only memorializes his sacrifice but also inspires us all to hold steadfast in our own faith journeys. The light streaming through the coloured glass serves as a reminder that, like Stephen, we too can find strength in divine light and trust in God's eternal presence. In moments of trial, we are called to emulate Stephen's courage, forgiving those who wrong us and entrusting our spirit into the hands of the Almighty, echoing his profound words, 'Lord, do not hold this sin against them' (Acts 7.60).

The author Samuel Boyd Morrow OBE FRCGS graduated from Queen's University in 1939. His Civil Service career was in agriculture, finishing as Fermanagh's County Agricultural Officer. In his last two years, before retirement in 1996, he served as Principal of Enniskillen Agricultural College in addition to his role as County Agricultural Officer. His education in Fermanagh was at Clabby Primary School and then Portora Royal School. In his youth he worshipped in St Margaret's Parish Church, Clabby. He has been a member of Enniskillen parish since 1966 and a member of its select vestry since 1968. He has served periods as churchwarden, glebewarden and has been honorary secretary of the select vestry since 1989. He has written four other books, two on agricultural matters and two on church history. Those dealing with church affairs are titled: *The Church of Ireland Parishes of Tempo and Clabby - a Shared Heritage*, and *Clabby on the Map - The Church of Ireland Parish of Clabby and its People*.






