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The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

The month of November is a month of 'Remembering'. It begins with 'All Saints' Day' and ends with 'Christ the King Day'. Midway is Remembrance Sunday. Remembrance is a fundamental

part of being human. We do this not just on our own with our personal memories, but with others. We do this on happy occasions, as when we remember a birthday by inviting others for a party, and we do it on sombre occasions, when we give thanks for someone with a memorial service.

On Sunday 12th November we will come together as a community here in Enniskillen, as communities will come together all over the country, to remember those who died or were wounded in the two great wars of the 20th century and the conflicts since then, including the Troubles in N.I. There are still some who will have poignant, personal memories of one of the later conflicts, whose families have been affected, and suffered the huge tragic loss at that time. We remember the victims and all those who have died to help bring freedom and to help make the world a better place to live in, but we must also remember that our world is deeply broken and divided because of human violence. For the Christian, remembrance also presents a unique opportunity for us to meditate on the way of peace.

Edmund Burke (a former MP) said that society is a partnership, a partnership between the past, the present and those yet to be born. We have acknowledged our debt to the past. So, let us also acknowledge our duty to those yet to be born. For this we renew our own commitment to be peacemakers.

In the life and teachings of Jesus we see that God establishes peace in his world in an unconventional way. Jesus does not enter into violence in order to defeat the enemies of God. Instead, Jesus chooses the way of nonviolence. Jesus lays down his life and dies at the hand of God's enemies in order to defeat evil. Only then does God raise Jesus from the dead, in the victory over sin and death. In the person of Jesus, we see the perfect example of humble obedience, sacrificial love, and life-giving peace. After His resurrection and before His Ascension Jesus said 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I am sending you.' Therefore, we are called to be God's messengers, and what is more, we are called to embody God's peace in the world we live in, and to be His peacemakers! So, in this season of 'remembrance' let us use the opportunity and prayerfully take to heart the radical message of the Prince of Peace and follow His way of reconciling love. Let us discern together the ways in which God is calling us to be peacemakers in His world!





Cathedral 100 years old

The Parish Church of Enniskillen will celebrate its 100th anniversary as St Macartin's Cathedral in December 2023. To mark this special event a concert, presented by Mr Glenn Moore, organist and choirmaster, and the cathedral choir, will be held in the cathedral on the evening of Tuesday 12th December (see page 21).



This feature, and one to follow in next month's Cathedral News, will trace the history of Enniskillen Parish Church from its foundation until is it was made a Cathedral in the Diocese of Clogher in 1923.

In the Plantation of Ulster, Enniskillen was granted to William Cole in 1611. He had the responsibility of providing a church along with certain other obligations. Enniskillen Church was operational in the 1620s and subsequently became known as St Anne's Church. It was a much smaller building and had a totally different layout from the cathedral. The entrance was from a porch facing Church Street. The pulpit and communion rail were on the south wall which faced a north transept. Mr Richard Pierce's drawing of the first church shows the layout of the building.

With the growing population of the town, it was found necessary to en-

large the church. This major project was initiated in 1839 with the new church being completed and consecrated for worship on 7th June 1842. Parts of the original church were incorporated into the new building, including the base of the tower and the south wall. The internal layout of the 1842 church differs from that of the cathedral. The choir stalls were within the nave and at right angles to the pews. The chancel was much smaller than that of the cathedral. The robing room did not exist.

Next month's feature will deal with the decision to create a second cathedral in Clogher Diocese and the work involved in bringing St Macartin's up to cathedral standards.

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New Archdeacon of Clogher

The Bishop of Clogher, chose the Clogher Diocesan Synod to announce the name of his new Archdeacon.

The new Archdeacon of Clogher is Canon Paul Thompson, Rector of Derryvullen North and Castle Archdale. He succeeds Archdeacon Brian Harper, who moved to Connor Diocese to be Rector of Dunluce Parish.

The Bishop, The Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis who made the appointment described Canon Paul as having gifts of administration and pastoral care and was a muchrespected Rector in his parishes of Derryvullen North and Castle Archdale. The Bishop said:

"Within the diocese he is

currently our Warden of Readers and Support officer for Lay Ministry. He is a member of Diocesan Council, a Diocesan Nominator and is our representative Canon in St Patrick's Cathedral Dublin. Canon Paul is a Clogher representative on the RCB and on the Church of Ireland Safeguarding Board. Canon Paul has many other gifts; he maintains a very creative Facebook presence for his parishes, and I know will bring to this role not only experience of parish ministry in Ireland but also many years as Prison Chaplain in the Church of England".

Archdeacon Thompson will be installed by the Dean, The Vey Rev Kenneth Hall in St Macartin's Cathedral, Enniskillen on Advent Sunday (3rd December) at 7.00pm.

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Shoebox Appeal

Attach the appropriate boy/girl label, marking if your gift is for a boy or a girl. Select an age category 2-4, 5-9 or 10-14 and attach the label to the top of your shoebox. Fill your shoebox with a selection of fun toys, hygiene items and school supplies. If possible, include one or two special items you know a child will love such as a doll, cuddly toy or deflated football with pump. A suggested donation of £5 is essential to cover project costs, including shipping, to enable a local church or group overseas to lead a safe, well-organised children's event where your shoebox will be given to a child in need. Leaflets and boxes are available in the church porch. You can collect these

on a Sunday or Thursday morning. All shoe boxes need to be returned at the latest on Sunday 12th November.

Significant achievements?

Psalm

Psalm 19

(Verse 1) This psalm of David begins by referring to the heavens and the sky as proofs of God's creative work. The first verse uses Hebrew terms similar to those found in the first verses of Genesis. The existence, structure, and






details of nature shout the reality of a Creator.

(Verses 2-6) David states this revelation continues both night and day. The point is not merely that nature looks impressive. The function of the universe also announces the incredible design of God. A vivid example of this is how earth is af-

fected by the sun. The sun rises in full strength, traverses the sky, and sets at the opposite end of the horizon. The sun's warmth and rays touch everything on earth.

(Verses 7-11) As well as nature, God can be seen in the inspired Word He gives humankind. God's revelation in Scripture is perfect, trustworthy, right, pure, clean, and true. It revives the soul, brings wisdom, creates joy in the heart, gives enlightenment, and endures forever. God's written revelation in Scripture is more valuable than the finest gold and sweeter to the taste than honey. These are framed in a poetic, repeated structure, which echoes some of the book of Proverbs. God's servant finds warning and great reward in His written revelation.

(Verses 12-14) David concludes the Psalm with prayer. He asks for deliverance from the grasp of presumptuous sins meaning the kind of arrogant actions that invite harsh consequences. He asks God to accept his speech and the meditation of his heart. David not only wants to obey God, he seeks to please Him, in



words and thoughts, as well. David addresses God as Lord, rock, and redeemer. This final verse has served as a model, not only for prayer, but also for songs of praise for much of Christian history.





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Advent Sunday

The Season of Advent begins on Sunday 3rd December (Advent Sunday).



Advent is a time of impatient waiting, of holding our breath for what is waiting for us just around the corner. We are making preparations to celebrate Christmas Day, of course, but most importantly, Christians spend this time preparing and waiting for Christ to be born again into the world which so desperately waits for Him. We are not the first people who

have longed for a different world – all through history people have waited, just as eagerly, for peace, hope, joy and love. The season of Advent is above all a time of watching and waiting for the coming of the Kingdom of God in power. It shares with Lent a certain spirit of restraint, preparation, penitence, but it is one shot through with confident joy as Christmas approaches. The readings reflect this dual aspect. In the early part of Advent they focus upon Christ as judge on the Last Day. As the season progresses, the readings in company with the lectionary look towards the birth of the promised Messiah, and reflect upon the unique roles played by John the Baptist, the Lord's forerunner, and of Mary, the Mother of Jesus, in the plan of salvation.

The wreath and its candles are the visual focus of Advent.

One of the candles is lit each week as Christmas approaches. The circle of the Advent wreath has no beginning and no end. It portrays for us God's timelessness and His eternal plan of salvation.

The evergreen colour denotes eternal life that we are granted when we come to know Christ as our Lord and Saviour. The shape of the wreath is round, reminding us of the fellowship of believers around the world who share with us the celebration of His coming. The four outer candles represent the gifts of His spirit in us, which are: Hope, Peace, Love and Joy. If you will notice, on the outside there are three purple candles. This colour reminds us of sorrow and repentance. The fourth outer candle is pink, which reminds us of joy. The centre candle is called the Christ candle - it is white. This candle will be lit during our Christmas Eve service or on Christmas Day.

So may this season of Advent be very special to us and help to prepare and greet the birth of Christ with joy, to live in the light of Him, and to share the good news of His love, with all of those around us.

On 28th November our guest speaker is Mrs Adele Moore who will share her skills and tips on 'Cooking'.


Bible Reading Notes


