#### The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners.

We are all different despite our trying to conform, we look different, we think differently, we talk differently and have different values. These differences have consequences and often fuel conflict and dis-



agreement, despite the saying that variety is the spice of life. We disagree about little things, and we argue about big things. For example, dress codes, ethnicity, politics, and religion. Though we are probably a bit more reluctant to make our views known mindful of the consequences, we have learned to navigate some difference and we live with it. At our best, we may even celebrate it, because sometimes difference enriches us!

However, in various parts of the world and through time, the differences have been pushed to the limit leading to violent clashes and bloodshed in two world wars and many other wars. Therefore Remembrance Day is held as a day to commemorate the contribution of millions who lost their lives – both military personnel and civilians.

Whatever we think if we are to reimagine the future of our community, our nation and our world, then we must continue to live on that well-worn path of being able to argue well and live creatively with difference, without ending up with casualties. We must recall those times when arguments have gone beyond words. We must also remember with thanksgiving and sorrow those who lost their lives, in world wars and conflicts past and present.

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We long for love, friendship, welcome, acceptance, mercy, forgiveness, hope and, perhaps most important for today, and peace. These are words that unite rather than divide and as God's followers today we are challenged to live them and so in some small way anticipate the Kingdom of God of which Jesus often spoke.

That means being determined to attain and maintain peace, we must keep trying to argue well and hold what differences we have creatively. We are all different and thank God we are, for if we were all the same then life would be rather dull.

However, at this Remembrance time we come together as one, to renew our commitment to seek all that makes for peace. However, faced with the evil of the world we can sometimes feel powerless. Even when we cannot do much about the war-torn regions of our world we can, in our lives, in our arguments and disagreements, strive to live a different way, a way of peace and reconciliation.

As 1st Thessalonians 3:11,12 says - 'May our God and Father himself and our Lord Jesus direct our way to you. And may the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, just as we abound in love for you.'

While we will always argue or debate, let us strive to play our part in building a world in which all have a valued place, where none is left behind and where all can live in peace.



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### **Shoebox Appeal**

Operation Christmas Child began in the UK in 1990, a tangible message of hope for children in the toughest of circumstances.

Every year since, Samaritan's Purse has collected shoebox gifts filled with toys, school supplies, and hygiene items for



children around the world. Since 1990, more than 178 million children in more than 150 countries have received an Operation Christmas Child shoebox. The project delivers not only the joy of what, for many kids, is their first gift ever, but also gives them a tangible expression of God's love.

Get an empty medium sized shoebox, and wrap the box and lid separately in colourful wrapping paper or order preprinted shoeboxes online. Attach the appropriate boy/girl label, marking if your gift is for a boy or a girl. Select an age category 2-4, 5-9 or 10-14 and attach the label to the top of your shoebox. Fill your shoebox with a selection of fun toys, hygiene items and school supplies. If possible, include one or two special items you know a child will love such as a doll, cuddly toy or deflated football with pump. A suggested donation of £5 is essential to cover project costs, including shipping, to enable a local church or group overseas to lead a safe, well-organised children's event where your shoebox will be given to a child in need.

Leaflets and boxes are available in the church porch. You can collect these on a Sunday or Thursday morning. All shoe boxes need to be returned at the latest by Sunday 17th November.

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## Psalm 48 The Psalm

Part of what gives the Psalms their enduring beauty and power is that in any one Psalm, at any one moment, we are invited to think, and do, and be, more than one thing at the same time. Our liturgy recognizes this multi-layered spirituality at every single



service where we are invited to worship: the Psalms is the only book of the Bible from which we read (or sing!) at every service. Psalm 48 is this manifold mysticism at its best.

Psalm 48 is a pilgrim psalm, and we can journey with the psalmist towards Jerusalem and into the city, eventually into the Temple and back out into the city, to read its architecture and structure with eyes newly-sensitized to the divine. Pilgrimage is of course about what we bring, what we experience and what we take away from the journey. This pilgrim band clearly loves their city, loves the closeness of God that they feel there, and loves to tell others about it. And yet if we leave our understanding of the Psalm at that level, we quickly run into problems: to praise the pre-eminence of Jerusalem guite so strongly in political terms was just as problematic when the Psalmist wrote as it would be today. Even if we consider the psalmist as a zealous nationalist, or simply a naïve patriot, there are still problems. Jerusalem is certainly built on hills, but only in a spiritual sense could Zion be considered a mount. The city is definitely an enduring site of settlement, but no one could say that its attackers, of whom there have been many, flee in terror at its sight, nor have they been regularly repelled. And the psalmist knew this too. While it captures the joy of experience and togetherness that pilgrims had and still have today, this psalm is asking us to look beyond that to something more fundamental. The psalmist is using the gift of poetry, and a poetic imagination, to lift our thoughts beyond the everyday. Here the physical world is reshaped by spiritual experience. Here poetry offers us an alternative view of the world around us, and, as we might expect, it's about God. One small and ordinary city becomes the focus for God's rule in all times and in all places. No one who visits Jerusalem can leave unchanged, despite its apparent ordinariness. In Christianity we have no city like Jerusalem: and yet, we can understand the Psalmist's paradoxical perspective. For us what appeared to be the routine execution of a common criminal in the distant past is an event that has marked time and space in a way that nothing else has. In a way that is just as specific, as ordinary and as strange as the devotion to a middle eastern hill town, we claim a universal importance for the life and death of a particular Jewish man from more 2000 years ago. The same set of events means more than one thing at once. Neither the idolization of Jerusalem nor the worship of Jesus Christ will immediately end the suffering of humanity or the guard against the fragility of human life, but in common with the writer of Psalm 48, we proclaim the sovereignty of God, and we claim to live by that reality.

## Solar panels for the Cathedral Hall


The Select Vestry is currently making arrangements to have solar panels fitted on the south west facing roof surface of the Cathedral Hall. This will save expenditure on electricity used in the hall. Furthermore, it will help to reduce the Cathedral properties' dependence on fossil fuels for heat and lighting. The cathedral properties have a high dependency on oil and electricity for heating and lighting and powering equipment. Government policy is to reduce dependency on fossil fuels as they contribute to global warming.



The Church of England has already adopted a policy to become Net Zero or free from the use of fossil fuels by 2030. In doing so it recognises that the global climate emergency is a crisis for God's creation and is an injustice. The installation of the solar panels on the Cathedral Hall will make a worthwhile contribution to reducing the Cathedral properties' carbon foot print. Estimates obtained indicate that the installation will reduce carbon dioxide emissions in excess of 4,000 kg per year.

Sunlight on the panels generate direct current which then goes through an inverter converting the electricity into alternating current which is the usable form of electricity. The electricity generated can be

## Solar panels for the Cathedral Hall




used directly or if the amount generated exceeds what is required the excess can be sold into the grid. It is proposed to install a battery with the solar panels so that excess electricity beyond immediate requirements can be stored for future use. The installation of a battery also opens up the potential to buy in electricity under a night tariff which is considerably cheaper than daytime rates.

It has been claimed that the installation costs of the solar panels (£21,000) will be recovered within six and half years and over a 25 year period the savings could be in excess of £50,000.


A fund had been opened for those who would like to contribute to this worthwhile project.

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## **Choral Scholarships**

If you have the talent and interest, you can help to form an integral part of St Macartin's Cathedral Choir, Enniskillen, and benefit from our new choral scholarships.

The Cathedral Choir sings at the weekly Sunday morning service at 11.00am, and occasionally at additional services throughout the year. Once or twice a year, the Choir visits churches and cathedrals further afield, to sing. Each year, commencing in September, St Macartin's offers up to ten Choral Scholarships; ideally at least two of each voice part (Soprano, Alto, Tenor, Bass). It is useful, but not essential, for potential Choral Scholars to have relevant experience of singing in a choir, for example a church, school or community choir. For all Scholars, good sight-reading skills are desirable.

There are three types of scholarship available: Choral Scholar (Fulltime), Choral Scholar (Part-time) and Organ Scholar.

- Fulltime Choral Scholars receive an annual scholarship of £500 to assist with costs of tuition.
- Part-time Choral Scholars receive an annual scholarship of £250 to assist with costs of tuition.
- Organ Scholars receive an annual scholarship of £100 to assist with costs of tuition and have use of the Cathedral Organ for practice purposes provided the cathedral is available at the time and prior booking of the organ for practice has been made. Organ Scholars will also receive some introductory sessions from the Cathedral Organist to the Cathedral Organ and the musical aspects of worship at the Cathedral.

Choral Scholars, either fulltime or part-time, may also be Organ Scholars if they apply for and are awarded both scholarships.

All Scholars are obliged to take lessons from an approved professional tutor in their chosen field of music. These lessons should be paid for by the Scholar/Parent/Guardian and financially assisted by the Scholarship award.


