The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners.

As we come into Remembrance season, we reflect on the significance of the 80th anniversaries of VE Day and VJ Day earlier this year. These days remind us of the sacrifices made by countless individuals during the turmoil of war. However, they also com-



pel us to remember the ongoing struggles faced by many, particularly those affected by the Troubles in Northern Ireland. While we have witnessed significant changes in our own society, we must acknowledge that the shadows of conflict still linger, revealing the fragility of peace.

Remembrance Day offers us a moment to pause, honour, and reflect on all lives lost—not just in the major wars, but also in the smaller, yet equally impactful, conflicts of our time. As we come together this Remembrance season, may we honour the memories of those who have gone before us, while also committing ourselves to the pursuit of peace. Let us be inspired by the sacrifices made and the love shown, and may we carry this spirit into our daily lives and our actions.



The Nicene Creed: The Church and the Future

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

'We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church': The Creed affirms the four marks of the church, defining a truly orthodox Christian community:

one: despite the many different churches and traditions, there is only one Church to which we all belong. 'There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus.' (Galatians 3:28).

holy: the church is a holy community set apart for God (ekklesia, lit 'called out'), whose mission is to reflect God's holiness in worship and live out His love in the world.

catholic: this doesn't refer to the Roman Catholic church, as the word means 'universal', reminding us of the unity of the church across the whole world and all denominations.

The church aims to apply the same gospel in whatever situation, context or culture it finds itself.

Apostolic: The apostolic ministry of the church ('apostolos') is one of being sent to communicate the good news of the gospel: 'Therefore go and make disciples of all nations.' (Matt 28.19).

'We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins': As baptism is a sign of belonging to the church, it can only happen once. The issue addressed in the Creed is that of Christians who left during persecution, but wanted to be accepted back by rebaptism. It affirms the principle 'one Lord, one faith, one baptism' (Ephesians 4:5). Today, those baptised as children, theologically can't be re-baptised to demonstrate an adult commitment. However, they can be confirmed or reaffirm their baptism vows.

'We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to

come': The Creed ends with a statement of hope, that we will share in Jesus' resurrection life after death.

It is not simply about the immortality of our soul, but the resurrection of our bodies. They will be transformed to fit us for life of heaven for eternity: 'The body that is sown is perishable, it is raised imperishable...it is sown in weakness, it is raised in power; it is sown a natural body, it is raised a spiritual body.' (1 Corinthians 15:42-44).



Psalm 147

Psalm 147 is one to read when life is difficult and we need reminding just how bountiful, powerful and loving our God is. It is here that we read of God healing the broken hearted and binding up their wounds, of his care for the humble and his 'unfailing love.' When we are at a loss the psalmist tells us that God's understanding 'has no limit' and



his power is such that 'he determines the number of the stars and calls them each by name.' This is revealing; not only is the Lord powerful but he is also deeply invested in his creation and in our lives. The abundance



of his care is everywhere, the psalmist points to the Lord's provision in clouds for the sky, rain for the fields, food for the cattle and the ravens. The psalmist bids us to give thanks for this bounty and to 'make music to our God on the harp.' In our own lives what cares can we leave with our merciful, loving God and what thanks could we offer up to a creator who wants us to live fulfilled and joyful lives? Psalm 147 prompts us to ask both of these questions.


Have you a favourites bible verse/hymn?

Messy Church


Messy Church will meet again on Thursday, 20th November, in St Macartin's Cathedral Hall from 4.00-6.00pm.

Parenting Wellness Group




Shoebox Appeal

Operation Christmas Child began in the UK in 1990, a tangible message of hope for children in the toughest of circumstances.

Every year since, Samaritan's Purse has collected shoebox gifts filled with toys, school supplies, and

hygiene items for children around the world. Since 1990, more than 178 million children in more than 150 countries have received an Operation Christmas Child shoebox. The project delivers not only the joy of what, for many kids, is their first gift ever, but also gives them a tangible expression of God's love. Get an empty medium sized shoebox, and wrap the box and lid separately in colourful wrapping paper or order preprinted shoeboxes online. Attach the appropriate boy/girl label, marking if your gift is for a boy or a girl. Select an age category 2-4, 5-9 or 10-14 and attach the label to the top of your shoebox. Fill your shoebox with a selection of fun toys, hygiene items and school supplies. If possible, include one or two special items you know a child will love such as a doll, cuddly toy or deflated football with pump. A suggested donation of £5 is essential to cover project costs, including shipping, to enable a local church or group overseas to lead a safe, well-organised children's event where your shoebox will be given to a child in need.

Leaflets and boxes are available in the church porch. You can collect these on a Sunday or Thursday morning. All shoe boxes need to be returned at the latest on Sunday 16th November.
