## The Dean Writes:

Dear Parishioners,

Every day we read or hear something about money. It is really quite hard to escape the subject. In the context of the Church it is not easy to talk about our finances. It is not easy to get the message across in simple terms about how the church balances the books, and some parishioners misunderstand the message! (see the article on page 4 *'The Church is always asking for money.'*)

Every Church community seeks to be faithful with the resources it has, both in buildings, money and most importantly people. Giving and generosity are vital issues for churches and for church members. Generous giving provides resources to enable the mission and ministry of the Church and fosters distinctive Christian lifestyles that enable others to be touched by the overflowing generosity of God. Every Christian is called to 'give' to further God's Kingdom here on earth.

Harvest time is a good time to reflect on this. Any reflection on giving must start with God. God gives to us abundantly and graciously in creation and redemption, and in sustaining life, day by day. Scripture shows that God's giving is characterised by extravagance, both for nations and for individuals. Life itself is a gift of God, part of His creation. This leads on to the practicalities about how we live. In the Old Testament, the Israelites were instructed to offer a proportion of their harvest (the first fruits) in thankfulness to the Creator. It was a reminder of stewardship of the Creator's world, and through 'thanks-giving', they were promised blessings; they knew Whose they were and Whom they served. A little later, in the history of Israel, the people were instructed to give a tenth of their income - a tithe. Tithing has never been universally practised in the Christian Church, but a number of Christian traditions and many individual Christians adopt it as a pattern and testify to its influence on their faith journey.

Many of Jesus' parables and, indeed, his own actions involve celebrations, meals, parties and a sharing of food, financial resources and time, especially with those who might least expect to be included. It is striking that the writers of the Gospels record Jesus reserving his sternest warnings for those who see the need of others and refuse to respond. The incarnation, the cross and resurrection, and the coming of the Holy Spirit reveal to us the astonishing depths of God's generosity toward humankind. It is the earthly life and parables of Jesus that show what this generosity looks like translated into human behaviour. There is no shortage of biblical material on giving, with over 2,300 verses in the Bible on money, wealth and possessions. Jesus talked about it frequently, and over one-third of his parables relate to these topics.

The challenge for a follower of Jesus is to be prepared to do whatever is needed to align him or herself with ways of living and giving that release rather than obstruct the flow of God's generosity. Have you ever compared your weekly Church giving to the money you spend on newspapers and magazines, holidays, nights out or sport? Is your giving to "the work of God" the first priority in your spending or does it come out of your loose change? These are serious questions about discipleship as well as about money. Giving with a thankful heart, because God loves a cheerful giver, leads to a new freedom about finance and faith. We hope that all our parishioners will be willing to take a step in faith in considering Christian Giving. The amount you give is entirely a matter for your personal decision but it should be:


- Given thankfully and cheerfully
- In proportion to your means
- Regular and committed.

At this Harvest Season may we take time to reflect and to enjoy all that God has given us? Harvest Thanksgiving means nothing until you give back to God the gratitude due to Him. We need to commit ourselves to be His faithful followers, never taking God for granted.

Many parishioners are now able to return to church on Sundays, and some prefer to attend the quieter Thursday Service. Some however are more cautious and feel they are not yet ready to make the outing. Some are able to watch and join in on our online service each Sunday, but many do not have the facility (see the article about online viewing on page 23). Since regular visiting is not recommended at present, I would appeal for parishioners or family members to let us know if anyone is unwell. We can arrange some form of contact to be made depending on what restrictions are in place at that time.

I'm glad my church needs money. If it didn't, it would mean it wasn't interested in preserving a sound structure to stop it falling into disrepair.


I'm glad my church needs money. If it didn't, it would mean it wasn't interested in spreading the Good News and had no hope.






## Bible Reading Notes

## Cathedral Restoration Project

The restoration work on the cathedral is progressing satisfactorily under good weather conditions. The high roof with its new slates, and new gutters, is largely complete. The pinnacles at the east end of this roof have been re-pointed and re-leaded as necessary.

The condition of the structural timber in the high roof was generally very satisfactory, although a section of wallplate that had decayed required replacement.

New secondary glazing has been fitted on the north side of the cathedral. This will provide protection for the stained glass, improve insulation, and, looking from the inside, will result in much brighter stained glass.

The next stage of the restoration process is to remove the scaffolding from the high level roof to the lower roof level. This will enable the lower roofs to be stripped of slates. The battens and breathable felt will then be replaced. This will lead to the major task of picking the very best of the old slates taken from the high roof and from the lower roofs for re-slating the lower roofs. As the re-slating progresses the existing copper valleys between the lower roofs and the walls supporting the high roof will be replaced with new lead valleys.

Meanwhile, work has been undertaken on the four stone pinnacles on the tower. These pinnacles have been in position since 1842 and over time have become loose. Three of them required dismantling and then rebuilding including replacing the corroded iron dowels used to stabilise the structures with stainless steel rods. This was a very difficult and skilled undertaking which involved the erection of a complex and very strong scaffolding structure so that the sections of the pinnacles could be removed and put back into position using block and tackle equipment.

### Outside Painting

The spell of good weather provided an excellent opportunity to repaint the cathedral gates and railings. The Wilson lamp will require specialist cleaning before it is painted.

### Finance

As the work progresses on the cathedral restoration the contractors involved require stage payments. This puts pressure on parish finance which depends largely on parishioners continuing to contribute generously. This should secure the structure of the cathedral as a place of worship for the parish, community, and diocese. It is also of course the most significant building in the streetscape of Enniskillen.


We need to gather in all the stubs or unsold tickets. Please make your returns as soon as possible.





## Samuel Becket

The **Isle of Enniskillen Beckett Chess Set** is a 21st century public artwork created in bronze by sculptor Alan Milligan and originally commissioned by Arts Over Borders for its 2013 Happy Days Enniskillen International Beckett Festival. It is the world's exclusive chess set devoted to the characters (the back rows) and props (the pawns) from the plays of Nobel Laureate Samuel Beckett (the Isle of Lewis chess set were also human figures with the pawns as geometrical shapes). Beckett's lifelong obsession with chess included titling arguably his greatest play *Endgame*, a nod to the third final part of a chess game. Beckett regularly played with the great artist and chess champion Marcel Duchamp. As a boy Beckett attended Enniskillen's Portora Royal School (1920-23) excelling in the sports of cricket (the only Nobel Laureate in Wisden's Almanac), rugby, rowing, boxing (won the gold medal) – and chess.

To mark the 100th anniversary of Beckett's early 'sporting' years in Enniskillen, Arts Over Borders is gifting its 32 figurative bronzes (value £40,000) as a long-term loan to the island town of Enniskillen, effectively transforming the island town's tight matrix of little shops, pubs and coffee houses, churches and castles into a splendid giant art gallery. Sixty-four of the Enniskillen's island town landscape of community, cultural and socio-political spaces will mark out the 64 squares of the chess board, 32 black and 32 white cube 'shadow boxes' mounted on walls as hosting niches for the Beckett chess pieces.

As an added performative twist to the installation, the Beckett Chess Set will also be a kinetic piece of public art. It is an artwork that will be choreographed to move through the town at three points in the year, Good Friday (Beckett's Birthday), midsummer/August (Happy Days Festival) and December 22nd (Beckett's death), respectively paralleling the three segments of chess: Opening Game, Middle Game and End Game. The moving of the chess pieces will be carried out in response to a secret online chess game between two world grandmasters who send their digital moves through to Enniskillen for local sportsmen and sportswomen – dressed in monk like robes and cowls evoking Beckett's dance piece *Quad* – to move the Beckett pieces walking through the town carrying the heavy bronzes to their next square.

The origination of the Beckett Chess set and its installation for Enniskillen comes from artistic imagineers Doran Browne (Seán Doran and Liam Browne) on behalf of Arts Over Borders. In recent years, the duo have curated a series of Happy Days Beckett Festivals in Enniskillen, the Opening Year *12 months 12 Books* for the Seamus Heaney HomePlace and the hugely acclaimed festival celebrating the Beatles album *Sgt Pepper @ 50* for Liverpool City Council.

## Samuel Becket

The 32 pieces are sculpted and designed by Alan Milligan. Cast in bronze, they undergo the lost wax process where the figurines are modelled by the fingers using melting wax to make the initial models. There is wit and fun in each figurine that will appeal to a passing child as much as a Beckett scholar. The finish is Verdigris green bronze. Created by Alan Milligan, when he was based in Fermanagh, Alan has relocated to America.


## Beckett and St Macartin's Cathedral

All three achieved worldwide fame in arts and literature. They are featured on page 200 of our Cathedral History book by Samuel B Morrow.

## Choral Scholarships

If you have the talent and interest, you can help to form an integral part of St Macartin's Cathedral Choir, Enniskillen, and benefit from our new choral scholarships.

The Cathedral Choir sings at the weekly Sunday morning service at 11.00am, and occasionally at additional services throughout the year.

Once or twice a year the choir visits churches and cathedrals further afield, to sing. Each year, commencing in September, St Macartin's offers up to eight Choral Scholarships;

ideally two of each voice part (Soprano, Alto, Tenor, Bass). It is useful, but not essential, for potential Choral Scholars to have relevant experience of singing in a choir, for example a church, school or community choir. For all Scholars, good sight-reading skills are desirable. All Scholars are obliged to take lessons from an approved professional vocal tutor of their own choice, or

from the Cathedral's designated vocal tutor, Mr David Robertson.

## Psalm

### Psalm 125

#### *The people of God and Mount Zion*

Verse 1 - **Those who trust in the Lord are like Mount Zion, which cannot be moved:** What follows is a promise

made to those who put their trust in the Lord. We cannot properly put our trust in Him until we remove our trust in other things. He alone is our refuge and strength.

The pilgrim who came from afar was impressed with the stature and standing of Mount Zion, the prominent hill upon which Jerusalem was established. The one who believes and trusts in the Lord is promised the same security, and he or she abides forever. Our place in His love, His new life, and His gracious purpose lasts forever and cannot be moved.



Verse 2 - **As the hills surround Jerusalem, so the Lord surrounds His people from this time forth and forever.** As the mountains surround Jerusalem: Jerusalem


is not set upon one hill, but established among a series of hills. God's people can trust that He will surround and protect them as the mountains surround Jerusalem. So the Lord surrounds His people: God promised not only to be present with His people, but also to be all around them. He would surround them, so that nothing can get to them unless it first

pass through Him.

Verse 3 - **The scepter of wickedness shall not rest on the land allotted to the righteous, lest the righteous reach out their hands to iniquity.** For the scepter of wickedness shall not rest on the land allotted to the righteous: This was the protection God promised to His people who trusted in Him. In Israel's history, that scepter of wickedness only rested on the land when God's people were stubbornly unrighteous and untrusting in Him.

Verse 4 - **Do good, O Lord, to those who are good, and to those who are true of heart.** One of the primary features of the Old Covenant God made with the Israelites at Mount Sinai was the principle of blessing their obedience and cursing their disobedience.

Verse 5 - **Peace be upon Israel:** The Psalm ends with a prayer pronouncing peace upon Israel – essentially, that they would be the good that enjoy blessing and not be the wicked who suffer exile.
